Environmental Justice: Its Time has Come

The Crossroads Group recently hosted a Zoom program with Reverend Julie Brock to talk about environmental and social injustices she has witnessed as a resident of the city of Detroit. These issues have plagued our nation from colonial days to the present. To this day, race plays a major role in whether you breathe clean air and drink safe water.

Rev. Brock pointed out some disturbing statistics. In Detroit, infant mortality is up due to water shutoffs in the city during a pandemic that has already caused a proportionately higher death rate for people of color. In fact, the dirtiest zip codes in the United States typically are home to much higher percentages of people of color.

How did this happen? Centuries of bigotry, segregation and government programs that made it harder for people of color to succeed and have the resources to live in cleaner areas. Meanwhile, government neglect and insufficient regulations have left dirty zip codes still dangerous to live in with much higher rates of disease.

The Sierra Club and other environmental organizations recognize these injustices and have in recent times focused their energies and resources on addressing these issues. Why? It's a moral issue. It's the right thing to do. It's the humane thing to do.

Protecting human life is everyone's business as is protecting the environment. When tens of millions of Americans do not have the leisure time or resources to visit our national parks- "America's Best Idea"- they will have little interest in working on environmental issues. When even state and local parks remain beyond the reach of so many Americans who worry about paying the rent, paying for medical bills, affording safe water, this is an inequity that calls for our full attention.

It will take all of us working together to take care of our people and protect our planet.

The Howell Nature Center "Team Nature" staff will be presenting their four most popular programs, all with live animals. Great entertainment for the whole family.

In Your Backyard - Wednesday February 24 - 7pm

Meet a variety of wildlife species that you may find in your own backyard! In this program you will learn about the wildlife we share our yards with, including their characteristics, behaviors, their important roles in the ecosystem, and what you can do to live in harmony with them.



MythCrackers - Wednesday March 10 - 7pm

Are owls truly wise? Do turtles come out of their shells? You'll find the answers to these questions and more in this live wildlife presentation. This program addresses common wildlife myths, and we'll find out if they are "correct" or "cracked".

Lords of the Sky - Wednesday March 31 - 7pm

See a variety of species of live birds of prey in this program as we explore unique characteristics, habitat, diet, and the importance to the environment of the different types of raptors.

Wild Super Powers - Wednesday April 7 - 7pm

What do Batman, Spiderman and Cat Woman have in common? They base their powers on amazing wildlife abilities! In this mixed wildlife presentation, we look at each animal's "super power" that helps them survive in the wild.

Backyard Birds by Lee Burton - Tuesday March 16 - 7pm

Across our country, tens of millions of Americans put up feeders to attract birds. Why we do so is obvious. They bring joy to our lives and beauty to our yards. In our area, with the right kind of feeders, as many as 30 species or more could show up over the course of a year. At this program you will learn about our backyard birds, their songs, what to feed them and how to attract them. You'll even get a few tips about keeping squirrels from hogging all the food.

This program will be hosted by the Huron Valley Sierra Club Group, and presented by our Crossroads Sierra Club leader and birding enthusiast Lee Burton.



Spring Garden Clean-Up for a Natural Backyard by Stephanie Kozak - Wednesday March 24 - 7pm

Stephanie Kozak is a Certified Interpretive Guide for Kensington Metropark Nature Center in Milford, Michigan. Our Changing Climate Art Show

The Sierra Club Crossroads group together with the Huron Valley Council for the Arts (HVCA), are holding the second annual Our Changing Climate Art Show. The virtual show last year was visited by more than 1200 art lovers and climate awareness enthusiasts.

This year, the show will be virtual *and* in-person by appointment only at the HVCA in Milford. Entries will be received until February 28 (unless extended), so if you know artists of any age, please encourage them to consider entering their art in the show.

Conservation Update

PFAS: At this point in time, there are eight known sites being investigated for known or suspected PFAS contamination in Livingston and western Oakland counties. They are Diamond Chrome Plating in Howell, Thermofil in Brighton, Livingston County Airport in Howell, Livingston County Landfill in Howell, Brighton Township Dump in Brighton Township, March Coatings in Brighton, Hi-Mill Manufacturing in Highland Township, and Michigan Seamless Tube in South Lyon. Line 5: As this pipeline under the Straits of Mackinac begins its 68th year of operation, its status is still being debated. In November Governor Whitmer gave Enbridge until May of 2021 to vacate the State of Michigan easement that Line 5 occupies. As expected, Enbridge is opposing this order and requesting that the United States District Court dismiss the State of Michigan's action. In the meantime, Sarnia-area politicians and labor leaders have asked Prime Minister Justin Trudeau to appeal directly to U.S. President Joe Biden to intervene in the matter. As I write this, on Inauguration Day, it isn't clear what our newly elected president will do. Knowing that the president has plans to cancel the much-disputed Keystone-XL project as one of his first acts as president is good.

SB 431: This bill, which would have removed any oversight and authority of local municipalities over sand and gravel mining operations, seems to be stalled for now.

President Biden climate actions: As of this writing, the Keystone XL Pipeline permits have been revoked, the USA has rejoined the Paris Climate Accord, a moratorium has been ordered on oil and gas drilling permits in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, and the President has reinstated more than 100 environmental regulations that were weakened or rolled back under Trump. What a great start!
