Rappahannock Group's Special Tribute Honoring Doris Lindsey Whitfield

On Thursday, March 11, the RGSC honored departing former Chairwoman Doris Lindsey Whitfield at a special recognition tribute and reception. The meeting kicked off with a presentation on the Climate Change conference in Copenhagen (COP15) by Tyla Matteson, Political Chair of the Virginia Chapter Sierra Club. During "intermission" between programs, local singer/songwriter Bob Gramann played one of Doris' favorite songs: "Rappahannock Running Free".

Presentations

Doris' enthusiasm and tireless advocacy on behalf of the environment has translated into a large bounty of environmental programs and projects through-out the Rappahannock Region. Several organizations were represented and on hand to pay special tribute to Doris including: UMW Ecology Club by Laura Pilati, Dahlgren Railroad Heritage Trail by Jim Lynch, City of Fredericksburg Parks and Recreation by Linda Bailey, Friends of Rappahannock Wildlife Refuge by Jim Lynch, Virginia Chapter Sierra Club by VA Chapter Director Glen Besa.

As an engaged citizen-lobbyist, Doris challenged and encouraged local, state and national elected officials to take up the cause of protecting and conserving the environment. Past RGSC Chair Scott Howson read the special letters of Commemoration honoring Doris received from area elected officials. Letters of Commemoration were received from:

Congressman Rob Wittman (VA 1st), Virginia State Senator Edd Houck (17th District), and Virginia House of Delegates Albert Pollard (99th District). Additionally, a letter of commemoration from Lisa Guthrie, Executive Director of the Virginia League of Conservation Voters was read by Linda Muller. (con't pg 2) Locally, the George Washington Regional Commission issued Resolution No. 10-19 "Recognizing The Contribution of Doris Whitfield", and signed by the GWRC Chairman, Hap Connors on January 25 2010.

Redwood Tree

Seen on the Sierra Club logo, the Giant Sequoia Tree is symbolically tied to Sierra Club's founder John Muir. Through the assistance of Ann Little of Tree Fredericksburg and RGSC Board member Paula Chow, a Dawn Redwood Tree was presented to Doris for future planting at Alum Springs Park in her honor. The tree will be planted near the John Whitfield Memorial Bridge at Alum Springs Park.

Green Award

The final tribute and award of the evening was presented by the RGSC Executive Committee. The Green Award is special to RGSC with only one prior recipient: Del. Albert Pollard. This years Green Award was created and hand crafted by Sierra Club member Ruth Carlone. Having worked with Doris over the years on numerous projects, Ruth wanted to create a piece that "captured a history of Doris' environmental activities, interests and accomplishments". Included in the framed award: a picture from Crow's Nest encircled by a necklace composed of pottery shards from the late Potomac and Rappahannock Era, fragment from a fossilized stingray dental plate (donated by Patricia Kurpiel), mollusk fossil, worm fossil, Ferry Farm Trail button, Crow's Nest Button, Stafford County button, and a brass commemorative plate (assisted by Linda Hiross).

At the conclusion of the Tribute, Doris offered words of gratitude and reminded everyone that more work needs to be done on behalf of the environment. Bob Gramann concluded the tribute with Doris' favorite song :"The Battle of the Squirrel and the CEO". We wish Doris a restful "retirement" in Raleigh, N.C., and we are certain Doris will be visiting in the near future. # #

Have a Green Summer!

Vacation, travel, picnics, family gatherings, weekend excursions, camping - summer is full of activities and green opportunities, too. It takes conscious effort to make a green summer happen, but once you figure it out, it's easy and convenient. Establishing different habits teach your children and grandchildren ways to incorporate activities of daily living into responsible and healthy habits for the environment they will inherit.

Here are some "quick tips" for a Greener Summer:

Remember when your parents or grandparents brought picnic baskets of durable plates and utensils? Today you can find reusable plasticware and lightweight ceramicware (Corning Ware Corelle is excellent). Inexpensive cloth napkins can be tossed in the wash along with your dishtowels. And try to eliminate those "use only once" resealable plastic bags.

With outdoor entertaining at home avoid the "disposables". Its easy because you can use the same dishes you have in your cupboard!

Camping is all about the environment - enjoying the fabulous pristine outdoors. The camping kit is a must, eliminating disposables. Campfires pollute but if you must have one, keep it to a minimum. Rechargeable batteries for your flashlight are ultimately a better value economically and reduces excess.

When vacationing by car, keep a fully stocked picnic basket in it. Bring it to your motel/hotel room and use your personal cups and utensils instead of the disposable plastic cup provided. We have made it a practice to bring our cups and bowls to the motel breakfast bar and, no, we don't get strange looks. There is a little "dish washing" involved but it's not a big deal.

When traveling by vehicle, a bag can be easily kept for the recyclables you generate on your trip. While it's easy to just get rid of the empty cans, bottles and newspapers, it's just as easy to toss them into a bag in the car to await recycling back at home.

Recycle brochures, maps and literature you pick up from the Visitors Center and/or the motel lobby. The ones from the motel can be returned before leaving rather than tossing them into the trash. Others can be recycled to your bag in the car.

Green travel basics include carrying your reusable water bottle, a travel mug if you're a coffee or tea drinker and a reusable shopping bag or two. You say it's inconvenient. It is initially.
