EARTH DAY ON THE RAPPAHANNOCK

Climate change is upon us and perhaps this may be the perfect opportunity to make yet one more commitment to take action. Come to Earth Day on the Rappahannock at Old Mill Park on Saturday, April 12th from 11:00am to 3:00pm (rain date is April 19th). This is **the 11th anniversary** of the festival organized by Fredericksburg Parks and Recreation's Nature Education Coordinator Linda Bailey. Rappahannock Group is a co-sponsor of the event.

This will be the second year the Earth Day Festival is applying for a "Green Event" certification. The festival and all of its participants must meet certain standards, ie., minimal brochures and handouts, all beverages must be sold in recyclable or biodegradable containers (including aluminum, plastic and glass), no polystyrene, no straws and more. This year's theme is "Don't Treat Soil Like Dirt" and exhibitors are encouraged to work the theme into their displays. Rappahannock Group will also present a "Living Green" award to a local business and/or organization that demonstrates a commitment "green" practices.

Fredericksburg Mayor Greenlaw will open the event with a brief presentation. This is also the second year of awarding a prize for best display booths, one in each category of non-profit/private and commercial.

The first Earth Day was held across the country on April 22, 1970 as an action to increase awareness about pollution and other environmental concerns. In December 1970, in response to the public's demand for cleaner air, water and land, President Nixon created the Environmental Protection Agency. (cont pg 2)

Our home room teacher, Mr. Adelman, didn't offer any plans or events for the special day. We gazed out of the classroom window with envy as we watched another class conduct a litter pick up in the school courtyard. It was a beautiful spring day and I remember wanting to be outside (and away from the confines of the classroom) "I'll have to plan something next year.", Mr. Adelman promised.

We didn't know on that first Earth Day over 40 years ago that care and concern for our planet's ecosystems and natural resources would encompass more than one day of the year. The Ecology Club at the University of Mary Washington is one of several on-campus organizations that promote environmental sustainability. Members attend trash hikes along the Rappahannock River, work on community gardening, and participate in promoting RecycleMania, a national recycling event. Weekly meetings keep students engaged and focused on working towards a more sustainable future.

A greenhouse made of recycled 2 liter bottles is the focal point of the oncampus community garden that the Ecology Club has been working on since this past fall. Ecology Club has made sure to involve the wider student body in the process, by working on construction of the greenhouse during school wide events. The garden, with the help of the greenhouse, will hopefully be able to provide fresh produce to students in the coming months.

RecycleMania is an eight week competition aimed at promoting sustainability on colleges across the country, running through February and March. During this period, recycling from campus receptacles is collected, weighed, and tallied. According to the most recent data, the University of Mary Washington was ranked first among 311 colleges in per capita recycling for the 2014 competition. This is a vast improvement from finishing 233rd in 2011 and then 18th in 2012. This success reflects the huge strides that the University has made in recent years in regards to sustainability.
