It has been a privilege and a joy over the past 15 years, to be a part of what has become, the Rappahannock Group Sierra Club.

What started as a Nature Club by a small group of dedicated persons at Lake of the Woods in 1994, has over the past 16 years evolved into the RGSC that includes the entire Fredericksburg region and neighboring counties.

Our Executive Committee with members input Identify and set priorities. Land conservation, "sprawl" ie. Smart Growth, transportation, air, water and more recently "clean" efficient energy continue to be our top priority issues. Politically involved, we lobby & help elect Virginia's General Assembly members, the Governor, and local officials.

Our Groups' history includes helping to Save the Mattaponi, establish Widewater State Park, the Dahlgren Railroad Heritage Trail, Save Crow's Nest and by adopting Alum Spring Park, we continue to support a special natural resource right In the middle of Fredericksburg.

The establishment of the national SC program, The Green Government Commission by the George Washington Regional Commission will have a lasting impact on how environmentally sound our region grows and develops.

The Spotsylvania Greenway Initiative due to strong leadership and county support is rapidly moving forward, connecting communities while conserving energy and reducing our "carbon footprint"

Supporting local CSA's (Community Supported Agriculture) has been a movement gaining universal support across the US. We are fortunate to have a number of CSA's & local markets that provide fresh and organic produce. The King George Farmers Market opened successfully last spring and is part of a world wide trend.

You will appreciate our local fresh markets even more after reading Paul Roberts' The End Of Food. This best seller is both an eye-opener on how the majority of our food purchased in our stores is produced, as well as how detrimental it is to the US & world "food economy", to our health & to our well being. MICROACTIVISM

Reflecting upon this year's extremes in weather, I feel the urgency for action to contribute to solutions towards the slowing of global warming. Influence . . . friendly persuasion . . . peer pressure . . . the power of one. Yes, we've all heard "One person can make a difference." What you do affects me and my environment. No longer can we just wait for others to get onboard with changing daily habits that are earth friendly. We need to nudge the culture of resistance to change. It is truly easy because the ideas are not new and the information has been around so no one should be shocked but one must be committed.

Start with family and friends. Gatherings usually involve meals. Since most folks have dishwashers, why not use your dinnerware and glasses? Assure that no water bottles and styrofaom makes its appearance. If recycling is not the practice, initiate taking the recyclables home to recycle taking the opportunity to educate. Cloth napkins are easily thrown into the washer. Offer to be the one to help with the cleanup as a way to change how its done after the event.

Gift giving could be another arena for helping family and friends change their habits. The market is full of products that encourage the reduce, reuse, recycle efforts. Reusable bags are real cheap, can make a fashion statement if you shop around, some can be stuffed within itself to carry in the pocket or purse and this is the most used daily item that can make a difference. There are eco-towels to help wean people off paper towels. Stainless steel water bottles now come in all colors and shapes and are reasonably inexpensive. One can never have enough cloth napkins and they also are inexpensive. (con't)

Throw your own birthday party. As a gift ask each person to announce one practice she/he will change to an earth friendly practice. Or have a gift exchange only of items you already own.

The workplace is an excellent place to take the lead. Eliminating the appearance of water bottles, having ceramic mugs at the coffee/tea station, having a recyclable bin for paper and other recyclables, using the backsides of paper, suggesting take out only from eateries that use biodegradable containers are a few ways to nudge the business into eco-friendly practices. This can have a domino effect on the empolyees in their homes.

At church functions initiate a recycling bin that also includes paper and cardboard. Suggest that the church newsletter include an article about recycling which you could write. With your children's team sport coaches, problem solve ways to include recycling of plastic bottles and aluminum cans at events and encourage the use of stainless steel water containers.

This is a start. Microactivism. It really takes no more time than if you do the same thing you've always done. Be the change. Be the leader. It's the power of one.
