Tow about this "crazy weather"? There's no shortage Hof climate change warnings happening all around us. According to a draft United Nations report, Nations have so dragged their feet in battling climate change that the situation has grown critical and the risk of severe economic disruption is rising. The authors of the report also state that another 15 years of failure to limit carbon emissions could make the problem virtually impossible to solve with current technologies. They found that the risk of severe economic disruption is rising and further delay would likely force future generations to develop the capability to suck greenhouse gases out of the atmosphere and store them underground to preserve the livability of the planet. However, they acknowledge that it is not clear whether such technologies will ever exist at the necessary scale, and even if they do, the approach would likely be wildly expensive compared with taking steps now to slow emissions. The question is, expensive for who? The fossil fuel industries won't put up with stranded assets without a fight. That job is ours, yours and mine, (yes, it is inconvenient). We must step up our efforts to stop the fossil fuel industries from anything further than stepping off the stage. We must make our government redirect the enormous subsidies of fossil fuels industries to the ready, environmentally sustainable wind, solar and other such energies. Right now, we are dealing with hydrofracking, droughts, compressor stations, LNG terminals for exporting our American gas to higher-priced foreign markets, destruction of sand ecosystems for hydrofracking material, the Keystone XL pipeline, natural gas pipelines, electric High-lines, water desalination plants, wetlands destruction, coal waste spills, over-development on fragile lands, plastic micro-beads, the overreaching Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP), and many more... Phew! Write letters to your representatives!

Over a million gallons of crude oil was spilled in train derailments in 2013, more, according to the Pipeline and Hazardous Material Safety Administration, than the combined total spilled in the prior 38 years. These "oil-bomb" trains carry Bakkan Shale fracked crude oil from North Dakota and the heavier Canadian tar sands oil, a hundred oil cars or more at a time (no limit required), though Kingston and many other cities nationwide. The DOT-111 rail cars are not reinforced (replacement not required) and rather than spend the \$3.6 billion for safer rail cars, the petro-industry is pushing for approval of the Keystone XL pipeline. Yet, the North Dakota Mineral Resources Department estimates that in 2014 around 90% of the state's crude oil, nearly 1 million barrels a day, will move by rail. This amount exceeds the estimated capacity of 830,000 barrels a day of the Keystone XL Pipeline which is already intended for use by the heavier Canadian Tar sands oil, the production of which in 2012 exceeded 1.2 million barrels per day. Attorney Anthony Swift (National Resources Defense Council) notes that the Bakken Shale Energy companies prefer rail transport, finding it more flexible than pipelines. Based on capacity alone, it's obvious that the rail shipments will continue. This leaves us with the thin-skinned DOT-111 rail cars which, from the derailments, have been found severely corroded on their inside walls, covers and valves. Write more of those letters to your representatives! Yes, we can all do this!

Our government may require oil companies to upgrade aging oil tank cars to help prevent explosions. Railroads and oil refiners are negotiating now over costly proposals to update/replace the aged DOT-111 cars. President Obama could urge federal regulators to quickly come up with new safety rules. Congress could pass legislation. However, Obama has been mostly silent on the issue, and congressional leaders haven't pushed bills to increase rail safety. Williams Lake Subcommittee Report by Marie Caruso On January 29th, as promised, the developers of the Williams Lake Project, Hudson River Valley Resorts (HRVR) announced the placement of an additional 105 acres of their land into a conservation easement held by the Rondout-Esopus Land Conservancy. A stipulation of their project approval, this easement will protect the hibernacula of the endangered Indiana bat. According to the DEC, the Williams Lake hibernacula complex is used by 50% of the east coast Indiana bat population and is crucial to the continued survival of the species in this region.

On the political front, the project-supporting Republicans on the Rosendale Town Board maintained their majority in December by reappointing Ken Hassett to the Board as Deputy Supervisor, despite his loss in the November election. Hassett was appointed to take the place of a member who resigned to become highway superintendent. Thus the Town Board remains under the control of project supporters despite their loss to two more conservationminded Democrats in November. This action underscores the importance of keeping a watchful eye on what our local elected officials are doing.

Is More Development Coming?

Another large property in the Binnewater Lakes region, the 232-acre Rosendale Retreat Center, whose property includes First Binnewater Lake, has recently been placed on the market for \$4.6 million. Unless protective measures are put in place, the entire Binnewater Lakes region could be threatened by overdevelopment which would do irreparable harm to the area's significant ecology. **Strong conservation-minded individuals are desperately needed to advocate for the protection of the Binnewater Lakes.** For more information, please contact me at mariehv@verizon.net or 845-452-9086.

The following information must be very significant, because I had to call not only my county Board of Elections but also the state Board of Elections. Nobody at the county BoE knew the answers and at the state BoE the staffer had to go off and find out. All of our statewide offices are in play: governor and lieutenant governor, comptroller, and attorney general. All positions in our state legislature, state senate and state assembly seats, are in play. At the federal level, all congressional seats are in play, but neither of our federal senators is up for re-election.

Congressional primaries will be in June, but state primaries may

be again in September or perhaps moved to June, which would save taxpayers the costs of two primary days. In 2012 we offered our political questionnaires to candidates in the 41st state senate district, and 103rd. 104th, 105th and 106th assembly districts. We also offered political questionnaires to the candidates in our new 19th Congressional district. So find out which state senate and assembly districts you are in as well as which Congressional district. There's a lot of work to be done before and after candidates are endorsed, so your help would be appreciated.

Science Snippet...

CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT IN THE U.S. ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT was analyzed for political motives. A comparison of species petitioned by citizens for listing versus species identified by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) for listing determined that species litigated for listing were more threatened than species listed without litigation. Citizen-initiated listed species were more likely to be in conflict with development than those listed by FWS initiative. Species in conflict with development face significantly greater biological threat levels than species not in conflict with development. *Science*, Vol. 337 (8/17/12), p. 803. *This information is provided by Dr. Andi Weiss Bartczak.
