Threat to Shawangunk Ridge

Called by the Nature Conservancy "one of the last great places" on the planet, the wild ridgeline of the Shawangunks may see an expensive resort/housing development complete with golf course in its future.

The owners of the 2,700 acre Awosting Reserve, in Gardiner and Shawangunk Townships of Ulster County, are floating plans for the largest project since the Marriott Corp.'s proposal that culminated in the creation of the Minnewaska State Park in the 1980s. No actual proposal has been presented to any governmental agency, so there is little factual information available.

However, any project on the ridge or its environs would be opposed by groups that have been increasingly successful in their efforts to protect the entirety of the ridge, especially the sections north of State Rt. 52. Keith LaBudde, president of Friends of the Shawangunks, one of the principle groups advocating protection, is quoted as saying: "This could have an horrendous impact on the ridge, depending on how it's handled." He went on to say that the primary environmental concerns could include the visual impact, as well as questions about water and how sewage is handled in the impervious strata of the region.

The Mid-Hudson Sierra Club has been a long time supporter of protection for the ridge, being one of the organizations behind the creation of the park, and more recently involved in the reconstruction of the power line that crosses the park near Gertrude's Nose.
