CONSERVATION CORNER by Roberta Clements

With the presidential election over, environmentalists may have a long hard road ahead, but locally we can celebrate the reelection of some of our finest representatives.

The Mid-Hudson Group had a great success in our presentation to the Planning Board in Woodstock, who are looking at amending their town wetlands law that was passed last December. This presentation was praised by all who participated who had previously only been involved in adversarial relationships in such a situation. This marks the beginning of positive partnerships between activists and government that is rarely seen. Let's all look forward to a new perspective for municipalities who may begin to see organizations such as ours as a useful resource rather than antagonistic "troublemakers".

Another positive partnership is our participation in the updating of the Ulster County Open Space Plan. The plan was last revised in 1972. This project is on the fast track, looking for completion within the next year. The Mid Hudson Group has joined the Recreation Committee to address what has always been near and dear to all our hearts; enjoyment of the great outdoors in as many ways as possible. In this way Ulster County can continue to benefit from soaring development but still maintain the quality of life that makes it such a desirable place to live.

There was an informative session held by the City of Kingston related to development of the Rondout Waterfront in the downtown area. It was unanimously presented that the 2 proposed condominum type developments (on the Tilcon property and the former Brickyard property, which adjoin each other and encompass about 600 acres of Hudson River waterfront) should be carefully reviewed, should be downsized, and should be revised to be appropriate to the surrounding community in size, height, appearance, and price. Riverfront access that is available to all was repeatedly discussed as a neces-

sity. Protection of the viewshed, water supply, river water, and proper management and financial responsibility for community services (such as sewage, trash collection, road maintenance, and the demand on the school system) were repeatedly introduced as major concerns of the citizens and of activist organizations. A public hearing will occur in the future when anyone concerned should attend and show

how much we care about the river and about our community.

In Gardiner, the Awosting Reserve developers continue to lay low; however, repeated assaults of somewhat smaller scale continue at the base of the S h a w a n g u n k

Mountains. A 2-3 lot subdivision off Aumick road with a mile-long driveway is under review and could set a precedent for development on the ridge. An 80 house subdivision with new road construction will likely occur just below the very steep slopes near Upper Mountain Road and Peaceable Hill Road. The town of Gardiner passed a moratorium on large lot subdivisions in the ARR-200 (Ridge Area) district but even upcoming completion of the town's comprehensive master plan cannot stop the snowball of development.

This November I hope you join me in grieving for so many losses that are now inevitable. Please contact me as I'm open to optimistic suggestions. Peace and happiness to all for the upcoming holidays.
