IT'S CRUNCH TIME FOR WILLIAMS LAKE!!

Word has it that the draft environmental impact statement for the development planned by Hudson River Valley Resort at Williams Lake in Rosendale is expected to be released very shortly—perhaps by the time you receive this newsletter.

That means that thousands of dollars will be needed to obtain legal help and present expert witnesses during the upcoming SEQRA hearings. Although the process is supposedly designed to ensure that the public interest is fairly represented, in reality, it takes considerable money to present an objective scientific analysis of all the ways a development of this magnitude is likely to harm the environment and character of a community.

In short, without considerable public support, one of Ulster County's most extraordinary natural and cultural resources will be lost forever—to a development that doesn't appear to be either economically or environmentally sustainable. Mid-Hudson Sierra, with some help from the Atlantic Chapter, has contributed a substantial amount of money to help support studies done by the well-known hydrologist Paul Rubin, on how this development is likely to impact the area's extremely complex karst aquifer system, as well as its fragile lakes, wetlands, and endangered species. But thousands more dollars will be needed in order to present a comprehensive case to the DEC.

Because the local group known as Save the Lakes has undertaken the principal responsibility for defending the area, we are asking that our members support this effort by sending donations directly to that group. To quality for a tax deduction, make your check payable to Friends of the Shawangunks, and mail it to Save the Lakes, P.O. Box 153, Rosendale, NY 12472.

Although the negative impacts of this development are far too numerous to list here, a truly comprehensive analysis and all relevant documents can be found on the website www.savethelakes.us.

My New Year's Enviro-Resolutions

These are some of the commitments I have made, most of them already in process, some of them for many years already. For us North Americans, there are hundreds, even thousands of steps that we actually could take to ease up on our consumption of our planet's goods. I think we all know that it's 'crunch time.' I hope that some of my New Year's Enviro-Resolutions are also yours, too. Here are some of mine.

- To eat vegetarian more and more.
- To buy nothing that has UN-recyclable packaging or that is itself un-recyclable and to inform
 myself of what is and what is not recyclable packaging.
- To de-consume: buy very little new except food.
- To drive less and pool my driving whenever possible. For some trips, I would bicycle if I thought I could do so safely, as I live only three or four miles from "town"
- To do everything in a non-caffeinated way.
- To turn off the water tap (or shower head) unless I am or my hands are actually under it using it.
- To use a dishpan to wash my dishes, conserving soap and water.
- To use a washing machine only for full loads (acknowledging that I could wash clothes by hand using a plunger and a tub).
- To use the "breeze dryer" (clothesline) instead of a machine whenever possible.
- To turn off the lights unless I am in the room using them.
- To install low wattage lights for dark and night times to light frequently used paths in my home.
- To use task lighting so I don't have to (pay to) light the whole room.
- To turn my home thermostat down to 66 degrees or lower (I have an oil-fired boiler with 4 inch water pipes in my Victorian's basement) and wear sweatshirts, etc.and light-weight caps.
- To put sized pieces of shiny one inch foam (2 inch if it fits) behind each big, old radiator to radiate/mirror the heat into the room instead of outside
 through the wall behind the radiator.
- To shop yard-sales, antique shops, etc. in order to give only re-cycled, appropriate special occasion gifts and to otherwise give not stuff, but eatable or service or favor gifts.
- To renew now my commitment to being part of the solution and to stop being part of the problem.
