Williams Lake Report

Rosendale Town Board Accelerates Approvals for Williams Lake Project

On October 2, the Rosendale Town Board passed the zoning amendment (BLCPDA), which will allow the Williams Lake Project to be built. It appears that comments submitted by our attorney, David Gordon, were instrumental in making changes to the amendment, as the final version is substantially more restrictive in potential development acreage and thus more environmentally protective than previous versions. It does not, however, reduce the size, scope or likely ecological damage of Hudson River Valley Resort's project: a 130-room luxury hotel, with spa, fitness center, and other amenities, and an upscale housing development of 89 townhomes and 65 detached houses, priced from \$642,000 to \$1.4 million.

Then, on December 4, the Town Board approved the project's Master Development Plan (MDP), immediately following a public hearing during which additional comments had been submitted. Although the MDP had been amended since its first inception, none of the comments submitted by the public on Dec. 4 were taken into consideration. These included comments presented by our attorney, David Gordon, regarding the need for further protection of ecologically sensitive areas and reasonable fees for public access, as well as several comments submitted by board member Manna Jo Greene. The MDP was approved with 3 board members in favor (one being absent), and Manna Jo abstaining.

The one major improvement to the MDP, in response to pressure from the Sierra Club and other commenters during two previous hearings, is the provision of on-site parking for daypass users at Williams Lake. The previous version did not allow for that. No determination has been made, however, on the cost of day-pass access, other than to say it will be "on par with fees charged at the Mohonk Preserve and/or the Mohonk Mountain House", which may be unaffordable for many local residents. No commitment has been made to offer any sort of seasonal or annual membership.

The Wallkill Valley Rail Trail, as of Sept. 4, now extends thru the property (bordered by fencing and private property signs), so hikers and bikers can at least get a partially-obstructed view of the lakes and forests that were once such a vital recreational resource for the Rosendale community.

Although attorney David Gordon had previously objected to the Town Board's inappropriate acceleration of approvals for the project, which resulted in several procedural errors, the Board was determined to move the project along as far as possible before two new members take office in January. Jen Metzger and Chris Pryslopski, both elected with Sierra Club support, have been much more critical of the project than the present Board, of whom four out of five members openly favor it. Perhaps with oversight from these two new board members and continued diligence on the part of Rosendale residents, the developers can be held to the many promises they have made over the years to build a sustainable development, enhance public access, and protect the site's significant ecological features.

Our endorsement of 5 candidates in Ulster County and one in Dutchess County began with the executive committee looking over our political questionnaire from 2012 and slightly modifying it. Local races with important environmental issues were suggested by me and confirmed by the ExCom. Once the official ballot was decided at the county level, I emailed political questionnaires to those candidates for whom I had edresses and contacted county party committees to ask for other edresses. During this process Rosalyn Cherry of New Paltz suggested another candidate, whom I had thought had no opposition because there was no Republican candidate.

This year one contender asked for our endorsement and one Republican candidate asked for our political questionnaire, although only Democratic candidates emailed me filled-out political questionnaires.

For the first time, several candidates asked to do a mailing to Sierrans in their districts. Since I had trouble finding out exactly what to do, the mailings went out a few days before the election. Peter Fiorentino deserves our thanks for his hours of comparing

our Group members to the voting list in one district. Andy Moss inserted two endorsement letters into our letterhead for me to email to the candidates for printing.

I wrote a press release about our endorsements, which was emailed to selected news media, modified it with requests for Group members to volunteer and contribute and emailed to Bibi, our membership chair, who sent out an email blast. I picked up one batch of mailing and return address labels from Tillson and drove them to Ellenville, where the envelopes were stuffed, labeled and stamped and then I found the post office and mailed them. The other batch was taken care of in Rosendale.

The three Rosendale winners thanked us for motivating voters with our endorsements to go out and vote. We are pleased that five out of our six endorsed candidates won.

More could be done if others would join our Political Committee. Help is needed to strengthen the value of a Sierra Club endorsement in local races. Contact me to join.

Dollars and Cents at the Root of our Grass Roots Group

Our local group of the Sierra Club (The Mid Hudson Group) works to be involved in local environmental issues. While much of this involvement is "sweat equity" there is a portion that requires funds. Our group's funding comes from several places:

- 1. The Atlantic Chapter (which is the state organization of Sierra Club) provides financial support based on our specific group's membership (currently 1736). This year's total is \$1,100. Most of your annual dues go to National and Atlantic that work on national and state-wide issues; our local group is not enabled to do this. This leaves a small portion for our Group, which is why we need your support to fund our local grassroots programs.
- 2. From time to time we receive special grants for our work from the Chapter. We received such a grant this year in the amount of \$1,000 to assist with our efforts on Williams Lake.
- 3. The Majority of the funds for our group come from our local fund raising projects. The largest of these is the annual tag sale, and those who buy and donate goods and the volunteers who make the tag sale successful are much appreciated. Following is an approximate breakdown of our locally obtained funds:

Tag sale income: \$2,000
Calendar Sales: \$500
Special Events: \$350
Individual Gifts: \$250

Total local funds: \$3,100

These funds, along with the funds that come to us from the Chapter are used to advocate for and benefit our local area. While the National Club and the Chapter are able to do direct solicitation of contributions, our local group is not able to do this. You can however make direct contributions to the Mid Hudson Group. Doing so will have a very positive effect on the environment and our ability to advocate for important work right here in the Mid Hudson region.
