Find The Treasure In Trees Every Saturday In April

There's Treasure in Trees! Come join Richmond Tree Stewards in treasure hunts every Saturday in April to celebrate the spirit of Arbor Day.

The "treasure hunts" will start with a free family-centered festival, tree climbing and other kids' activities, and tree walks from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. April 7 at Forest Hill Park in South Richmond.

Then on April 14, a four-hour Tree Academy in the Carillon at Byrd Park will feature three seminars, an Arbor Day ceremony and keynote speaker Rex Springston, the Times-Dispatch environmental reporter. Participants will receive a "tree degree" certificate. Advance registration is required (a box lunch is included) and a \$40 fee will be collected at the door. A free tree walk in the Carillon area will follow at 2:15 p.m.

Bryan Park and its spectacular trees will be the featured treasure from 10 a.m. – noon on April 21. Tree Stewards will then join the Earth Day festivities in Manchester. The "treasure hunts" will conclude in Capitol Square at 10 a.m. April 28. This tree walk will also highlight the rain gardens and "green street" innovations to reduce stormwater runoff that were installed last year.


Beachy Clean

Falls of the James Group Sierra Club member Jody Rathgeb has written a novel that adds a bit of environmental awareness to a rollicking beach read.

Fish-Eye Lens, set on a remote and stillpristine Caribbean island, tells the story of how the islanders manage to thwart the efforts of a sleazy developer who wants to pave paradise. It's a light tale laced with booze, sex and gossip, but it's also underpinned by a serious concern about unthinking development.

Rathgeb, a full-time journalist for 16 years, served as the restaurant reviewer for the Richmond Times-Dispatch from 1995 to 2003 before spending five years living on North Caicos Island in the Turks and Caicos Islands, inspiration for the novel. As a freelance writer, she has been published in a number of magazines and writes a weekly blog on her website, www.jodyrathgeb.com.

View from the Chair by Co-Chair Adele Maclean Inspiring Each Other to Live Our Green Principles



As most no doubt know, "Explore, Enjoy, and Protect" is the slogan the national Sierra Club uses to summarize our organization's mission and our intended relationship with the Earth. This catchphrase is clear, memorable, and fits nicely on a bumper sticker. It also serves us well by tying together the educational benefits of Sierra Club membership, the social and recreational aspects, and the critically important role of advocacy. What it leaves unstated, though, is a facet of club affiliation that strikes me as equally important—in a word: Inspire.

There is nothing automatic or easy about being a committed environmentalist in this culture. We are bombarded with messages encouraging us to shop, to consume, to waste, to ignore, even to exploit. Environmental issues are complex and urgent, yet public discourse seems to deteriorate more and more into simplistic sound bites that trivialize environmental issues ("Drill, Baby, Drill!")—or else, just as disheartening, to overlook them altogether. Ironically, as the resistance we face continues to harden, the importance of protecting the planet becomes clearer by the day. The preamble to the Earth Charter puts it eloquently: "We stand at a critical moment in Earth's history, a time when humanity must choose its future. As the world becomes increasingly interdependent and fragile, the future at once holds great peril and great promise" To accomplish the job ahead of us, we need to draw strength and inspiration from one another.

So how do we do that? Fortunately, it can happen in a variety of ways. An obvious one is through words (including tone of voice, gestures, eye contact and the like), since what we say to each other when we talk directly with one another can be encouraging and motivating. I have heard interactions like that on countless occasions at our aeneral membership meetings as one member gently supports another's efforts with advice, praise, stories, reminders, and other reassuring words. Such positive person-to-person exchanges can move a member from hesitant uncertainty to action. Similarly, the presentations we give and the words we write can make an important difference.

A second way we buoy one another is through collective action. Whether writing letters, phone-banking, turning out for a protest, fundraising, or otherwise advocating for a cause we all support, we show the world and each other how much we can accomplish as a team—and grow individually in the process. The more we achieve, the more we inspire one another to undertake even greater challenges. In that way, win or lose, active participation can be a heady, transformative experience.

A third source of inspiration, and one that especially moves me, is the way club members I know manifest their val-

ues in their personal lives. For example, I am inspired by the young member of our group who travels exclusively by bike, despite the difficulties of this bicvcleoblivious region. I am cheered by the half-dozen or more members I know who insulated their attics and crawl spaces of their homes last year to conserve energy and reduce their carbon footprint. Likewise, I am encouraged by the member I know who sold her home in the suburbs and moved to the city primarily to reduce the number of vehicle miles she and her family traveled routinely. The same is true of the various members of our group who have installed solar panels in their homes, who compost, who raise worms, who drive hybrid cars, who carpool, who capture and reuse rainwater, who lower their thermostats in the winter, who raise their own food, who recycle religiously, who The list is long and includes some inventive solutions that have challenged me to reconsider what I do in my own life. Every case I see inspires me.

I am extremely grateful for the chance to work with all the models within our group who are making a difference in so many ways, leading the effort, and showing me how to live my green principles, too. Without the opportunity to work shoulder to shoulder with such like-minded environmentalists, I am not sure I would be able to bear the news I hear each day about this aching world.
