

#### New Year's Letter from FOJG Chairman Joe Brancoli

January, 2018

Hello to all members of the Falls of the James Group (FOJG), one of twelve Sierra Club local groups in Virginia. To welcome in the New Year, I would like to address something you may occasionally wonder about: What does FOJG do with its resources? By

resources, I mean money and people.

The money resource (what we have on hand, which has recently been moved to a local bank with no ties to large corporations) comes from years of organizing the Big Yard Sale at the University of Richmond, from holiday auctions and from members' contributions. Furthermore, in the past few years, by switching to an emailed newsletter and returning our monthly meetings to the Science Museum, we have reduced expenses to near zero. That allows us to spend small amounts on projects like those listed below, and to offer grants up to \$1,000 to local groups doing good work. Four such grants were funded in the past year; now several more are under consideration. The groups who received a grant are the Tree Lab, Virginia Farmers Markets Association, United Parents Against Lead, and Virginia Interfaith Power & Light.

Our more important resource is the 2,000 members who can be engaged in many ways: **Service Projects** 

The largest of these is the Big Yard Sale in May that could not be done without 100+volunteers each year. This also serves as our primary fundraiser.

The Environmental Film Festival, a week-long run of free environmental films shown at various venues in Richmond, is an educational effort which FOJG sponsors with several other groups.

An exciting new opportunity is beginning on January 20th as we partner with other groups in ongoing monthly work like invasive species removal, trash removal and planting in the Bellmeade area of south Richmond.

Several rain garden projects have been done by members in the past 18 months, and we would like to continue that effort.

#### **Political Action**

This is fresh on everyone's mind: many of our members helped elect pro-environment candidates to state and local office in November. This is annual work in Virginia and recent results are very encouraging. Join us in connecting with the Sierra Club's VA State Chapter for advocacy at the General Assembly or working on upcoming campaigns.

#### **Meetings and Outings**

We would like more people to join these events and help plan them.

#### FOJG's Committee Organization

I left this to last so as not to scare you, but we need more people willing to sit in rooms with friendly fellow members to plan all of the above. The *Member Engagement Committee* directs outings, programs, fundraising, and meets the final Thursday of the month. *Advocacy Committee* includes local demonstrations, campaigns, letter writing and brainstorming. It's conducted on the 4th Wednesday at K-Town restaurant downtown RVA.

The *Communications Committee* publishes the monthly newsletter, updates the website and calendar, and communicates through social media. We could use some help on this committee to expand publicity and public relations.

In 2018, we want to become more diverse, more collaborative, and more involved in local efforts like encouraging the use of green technology in school construction and renovation. Please join these efforts by contacting any of the nine Executive Committee members listed at the end of each newsletter, or by speaking to one of us at a meeting at the Science Museum. It's your group; it's our year; let's make it a wonderful one.
