

FREE & OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

The 2019 RVA Environmental Film Festival will showcase over twenty local, and national films that raise awareness of environmental issues relevant to Richmond, our nation, and our planet. They will be shown throughout the week at various venues.

Movie goers at WCVE Studios will see the premiere of The *Swamp*, showing the destruction and possible resurrection of the Everglades. The Festival will also feature *Hometown Habitat--Stories of Bringing Nature Home*, illustrating why native plants are critical to the survival and vitality of local ecosystems. Other films include *Minimalism: A Documentary About the Important Things, A Man Named Pearl, and The Devil We Know.*

The Festival is one of the few free film events in Richmond due to the generosity of major sponsors -- the Community Idea Stations, Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens, Sierra Club's Falls of the James Group, and the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.

Big Yard Sale Wins Award

The University of Richmond's *Big Yard Sale* is the recipient of the Virginia Recycling Association's 2018 "Lemonade Award", a category recognizing programs that create "something wonderful from a bad situation." Sierra Club's Falls of the James Chapter, one of the local groups involved in promoting and organizing the sale, has been involved since the Big Yard Sale's inception 21 years ago.

As VRA describes in its press release about the award ceremony, "Every year, thousands of pounds of furniture, clothing, school supplies, and non-perishable food items are left behind at the end of each spring semester. Rather than send these items to the landfill, for the past 21 years, the University of Richmond Office of Sustainability teams up with the local Sierra Club and Goodwill to collect and sell items left by students at an event called the 'Big Yard Sale.' Proceeds from the sale are split between the Sierra Club and student sustainability groups at University of Richmond. Any items left at the end of the sale are donated to Goodwill.

"This program is no small-time lemonade stand. More than 1,000 people from the community came to shop at the May 2018 sale. While so many thousands of unwanted items could create a tremendous amount of waste each year—more than 12 tons were diverted from the landfill in 2018."

FOJG Announces Grant Recipients

In December 2018, the Falls of the James group continued its ongoing grant campaign by making two \$1,000 grants to two commendable local organizations.

One went to Capitol Region Land Conservancy for the purpose of including several islands in the James River under the easement which protects the James River Park System.

The second grant went to Shalom Farms, which harnesses many volunteers to grow produce and distribute it to areas which have little access to healthy food. They will use the grant to acquire solar panels on two buildings at the farm. We will learn more about Shalom Farms when director Dominic Barrett will be the speaker at our March 12 general meeting at Science Museum of Virginia.

We have the ability to support such initiatives because of the time and talents that many of you bring to the Big Yard Sale each Spring. Thanks to you, our members, for making our name shine in the community!
