First, I would like to thank Dave Blouin for serving as Chair of the Four Lakes Group. And to all the Four Lakes Group Executive Committee members who help behind the scenes. Thank you! Volunteers make it happen both out in the community but also in the day to day operations of the Sierra Club. Our Executive Committee generally meets monthly to discuss environmental events and the Club's involvement in our nine county region. One regular issue on the agenda of the Executive Committee is climate change, including clean energy resolutions and projects.

The Four Lakes Group and its members are in the thick of the local engagement and action on the climate crisis. Individual members have helped to put forward and support the passage of sustainability and clean energy resolutions in their communities – many in response to the Trump Administration's withdrawal from the Paris Climate Agreement.

The Sierra Club's **Ready for 100** campaign is underway to pass 100% Clean Energy Resolutions and invest in local clean energy and efficiency solutions. This national movement embraces a vision of healthier communities powered with 100% renewable energy. This campaign gets mayors, CEOs, religious leaders, principals, civic and community leaders, parents and students to commit to solutions that help achieve 100% clean and just energy across the United States by 2050.

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**Hike:** Join fellow hikers on a 4.5-mile hike of approximately 2 hours on Lost Canyon and Stephens Falls Trails. The trail is rated moderate with several steep grades. You will journey through mostly wooded areas and into scenic Lost Canyon fed by Stephen's Falls, a highlight of the park, you can view from below and above. Due to potential wet conditions, wear sturdy footwear that you don't mind getting wet or dirty. Also, bring along drinking water. Refreshments will be available after the hike.

**Service project:** This will involve cutting smaller woody invasive plants at Gateway prairie. Tools will be provided, but bring work gloves and fluids to drink.

We have also been engaged in developing a Climate Action Plan for Dane County which will lay out steps to achieve emission reductions and mitigation goals. We need more communities in the Four Lakes Group region to get on board! Let's encourage our local communities to go down the path from resolution to planning to implementation, and take real steps towards energy efficiency, conservation, reducing greenhouse gas emissions and implementing clean energy alternatives. These next few years are critical!

The Sierra Club is dedicated to reducing carbon emissions and moving to 100% renewable energy as quickly as possible. This requires changes in our energy use, from electricity to heating to transportation and more. We need to rapidly increase energy efficiency across the board and move to renewable energy. The Club advocates for both distributed energy generation (mainly rooftop solar, on site turbines and geothermal etc.) as well as larger renewable energy projects including solar and wind in our region. All of these will be necessary to meet our very ambitious, but critical, climate goals.

One of our current challenges is regarding the many large-scale renewables proposals, and to consider potential negative impacts. In the Four Lakes Group region, we are excited about the proposed clean energy wind and solar projects. Using guidance from national, and the expertise of staff and volunteers, we hope to support as many projects as possible as we simultaneously encourage efficiency and distributed energy in our communities.

## **Clean Energy, Wherefore Art Thou?**

Climate change is a huge problem, but are we responding quickly enough? The UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change clearly spelled out the dire straits we are in and how rapidly we need to respond. The federal government's own Climate Impact Assessment report likewise details the threats in our country. Let's look at what is occurring closer to home.

### **Utilities – Where they're not at**

Where are Wisconsin's utilities? Still heavily invested in coal and other fossil fuels. They're making progress on renewable energy, but when we really need 100% clean electricity ASAP, is 30% by 2030 enough? If your plane leaves at 10 am, will getting to the airport at 11 work? Will Mother Nature hold off on climate change because we lack the will to move to clean energy fast enough? As Washington state is realizing, we have to change the utility business model and reward utilities for taking the right actions on efficiency on distributed energy, rather than paying them more and more to continue with their business-as-usual plan.

### **Local Government – Where it's at**

The Dane County Climate Action Council will shortly release a report on proposals to take effective action at the County level. Dane County has also put in significant solar arrays, with plans for even more major installations, and is taking other steps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Dane County sees this as a model that other counties can emulate.

Throughout Wisconsin, a number of local governments have passed 100% renewable energy resolutions, including Madison, Middleton, and Monona. But people in other communities are expressing similar interests, including Lodi, Baraboo, and Verona. With the lack of progress at the federal and state level, local action is the way to go. ### **Beyond Coal Activism – Where you Come in**

Both the Columbia and Elm Road Generating Stations had water quality permits up for renewal recently. Activists from the Sierra Club testified that the utilities should not be given a pass on polluting our waters or exceeding permitted levels of mercury (as was asked

for at Elm Road on Lake Michigan). Coal ash dumps continue to pose hazards to groundwater and to Lake Michigan and the Wisconsin River. Rather than continuing to invest funds to mitigate damage from coal, perhaps it's time to turn to renewable energy.

We're also continuing to organize in our communities to push back on MGE and We Energies for their reliance on coal. ### **MGE 100% Clean Energy Shareholder Resolution**

Guess what won't be presented at the annual MGE shareholder meeting on May 14? A resolution the MGE Shareholders for Clean Energy had submitted asking MGE to prepare a report on how they could get to 100% renewable energy by 2050. Rather than giving their shareholders a voice, MGE asked the Securities and Exchange Commission to exclude the resolution from the annual meeting, and the Trump-dominated SEC decided that asking for such a report was micromanaging the company! This ruling is despite the fact that MGE has no plan to get off coal and how to get to 100% renewables. The requested report would have allowed MGE to propose a number of solutions, or potentially show if 100% renewable energy by 2050 is not feasible, but instead they chose to quash it.

### **Renewables are Here and Now**

MGE's reticence to do a renewable energy study and plan for the future is all the more surprising since recent studies are now showing that, in many cases and areas, installing new wind and solar is *cheaper* than operating an existing coal power plant. Unfortunately, the burden of paying for MGE's over-investment in coal falls to ratepayers, not shareholders.

Although they are unwilling to do the requested study, MGE is building a new 66-megawatt wind farm in Iowa and is purchasing 100 MW of solar – 50 MW at the Badger Hollow solar farm in Iowa County, and 50 MW at the Two Creeks solar farm in Sheboygan County. The Public Service Commission altogether approved 450 MW of new solar, which is four times the total of what our state currently has. While significant steps, much more is still needed, including shutting down coal plants. We're asking MGE and Alliant Energy to shut down the Columbia facility in Portage by 2030.

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### **Office of Sustainability and Clean Energy**

Governor Tony Evers' budget includes a request for an Office of Sustainability and Clean Energy. Rather than potentially provide a \$4 billion subsidy to a foreign corporation with questionable practices and results, investing just 0.1% of that amount to fund clean energy research could provide a major economic stimulus for Wisconsin. Going to 100% renewable energy could more than double the number of clean energy jobs to over 160,000, bring in an added \$570 million in tax revenue annually, and not send over \$14 billion out of the state every year for fossil fuels. Contact your state legislators and tell them this makes too much sense not to do. (See Budget, page 6.)

### **Youth Climate Movement and Strike**

The people who have most at stake from climate change are the youth. On March 15, about 2,000 youth from around the state participated in a climate strike, marching from East High School in Madison to the State Capitol, where they were joined by such dignitaries as U.S. Rep Mark Pocan and state Rep. Chris Taylor. This was followed by the youth appearing at the Madison City Council meeting on March 19, and urging the Council to pass a resolution supporting a national Green New Deal.

This is just the beginning for these impassioned youth, who are planning another climate strike and other actions to demonstrate their concerns, and who have been pushing for solar on schools in the Madison Metropolitan School District.

We'll be continuing to support them, and we hope you will encourage and support youth in your area as well. How can we not – when it's their future.

### **Our Future**

There's no doubt we have to move farther, faster. Please consider getting involved in your community. Let your utility and your municipality know you want them off coal and to take strong clean energy measures, including increase your energy efficiency, helping get solar on your house, business, church, or school, or investing in other clean energy measures. Get involved with our current efforts, or contact us to find out how we can help you.

## **Stop Wasting Away!**

Waste not, want not. No wonder we want so much – we waste so much! Way too much!

It's no wonder people worry about or feel so strongly about waste. We seem to be an over-consumptive, throw-away society. A minor problem though there is no away. However, it is a problem we can do something about. Likely you recycle (and perhaps compost) at home, and elsewhere as well. But reducing waste at home isn't enough, we need collective action, and to act everywhere.

Not only is there no away, there is no Planet B. One thrown away cup or bottle won't destroy the planet, but add them all up – and it's not so pretty. If you feel frustrated with our disposable society, consider joining our RAH – Recycling Away from Home – team. We work with several east side Madison neighborhood music festivals to reduce waste and make sure recyclables go to the recycling center, not to the landfill. It's a fun and easy way to make a difference!

Joining our RAH team is an opportunity to connect with and educate festival goers, not only about waste, but about many other environmental concerns and issues. But there are also opportunities to work with festivals and vendors to choose materials that are more environmentally friendly or perhaps work with Madison or other cities to take additional policy steps.

Can you help our RAH team? In addition to volunteers at the Festivals, we need people to help coordinate volunteers and be day captains, and to take a stake in making sure things run smoothly. If you're troubled by waste and dedicated to reducing it, this is an opportunity where you choose your own involvement and time frame, but you can also take on a long-standing problem and make a difference. Plus, at the festivals, you get free refreshments and pizza!

We have opportunities to be at four east side Madison festivals this year – Waterfront Fest, June 8-9; AtwoodFest, July 27-28; Orton Park, August 22-25; and the Willy St Fair, September 14-15.

## Wisconsin State Budget

The State Budget provides a critical point of input for people to make their wishes known about how our tax dollars will be spent. With a new governor who is more environmentally friendly, this year we see a lot more in the budget to like and support.

The John Muir Chapter had a strong volunteer presence at the Joint Finance Committee's four budget hearings. If you were one of those people who turned out, thank you. And while the hearings are over, there will still be debates over what to fund and how much, and you can still make your views known to your state legislators and other elected officials, whether an in person visit or letters to the editor.

What were some key items we were asking for?

- ✓ Renewal of the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Fund for another 10 years. This has been instrumental in protecting many valuable lands.
- ✓ Better DNR staffing to oversee water quality permits for CAFOs and to charge CAFOs higher fees to cover the costs of the permit. CAFOs have been a major source of highly polluted water in many areas of the state.
- ✓ Better funding and support for replacing lead water pipes in municipal systems. This has been the source of major health problems, especially in children that has lifetime affects.
- ✓ Funding for a state Office of Sustainability and Clean Energy to help fund research and direct resources to clean energy development and adoption. With the threat of climate change, we badly need to adopt more clean energy now. In addition, we spend over \$14 billion for out-of-state fossil fuels we could keep in Wisconsin.
- ✓ Our state parks deserve proper funding. After what was taken away in the previous administration, our parks are in bad shape and poorly maintained and staffed. Wisconsin is known for its great natural resources that our tourism industry depends on.
- ✓ Better funding for transit systems and for our failing transportation infrastructure. This is both an equity and a climate change issue.

We can do better to protect our environment and our future, and with your support, we will.

Featuring a plethora of workshops and exhibits, as well as a great clean transportation show, this is as much a sustainability fair as an energy fair, with a wide variety of information about low impact living. This year's fair features Naomi Oreskes of "Merchants of Doubt" fame, and Curt Meine, one of Wisconsin's noted environmental historiographer, who wrote Aldo Leopold's biography. And when you need a break from all the learning, there's plenty of great food, beer and music.

## Tar Sands Tour

Tar sands pipelines can wreak havoc on our waterways and our communities. In some cases, they already have. The 2010 Kalamazoo tar sands spill taught us that tar sands oil can't be cleaned up like traditional oil (which is already toxic enough). The St. Croix, the Namekagon, the Wisconsin, and the Rock Rivers, and others crossed by pipelines are at all at risk from being contaminated in ways that can't be cleaned up and made safe for decades. Tar sands oil is so carbon-intensive that former NASA scientist James Hansen said development of tar sands oil would mean "game-over for the climate". Recent approval processes for the Dakota Access Pipeline and the Line 3 Pipeline in Minnesota have shown how pipelines jeopardize treaty-protected resources and sacred sites, and discriminate against tribal governments in permitting and subsequent impacts.

We're bringing these potential impacts together through visual storytelling. Ten artists from across Wisconsin have come together to tell the story of tar sands in our state. The art exhibit is comprised of ten, 2 ft. x 4 ft. mixed media panels from these visual artists. Each artist researched and reflected on one aspect of the often-unrecognized tar sands oil pipeline Line 61 which pumps over 1.2 million barrels of tar sands oil through the state each day. The result is a diverse, powerful, and nuanced look at the oil pipeline story which affects each and every Wisconsinite.

There will be a number of showings of this terrific art tour in this area, including May 1 in Baraboo, May 2 in Madison, and May 3 in Whitewater. If you miss these, there may be more opportunities in the future to see it.
