Alarming Ground Water Study

Four Lakes Group members should take note of the important and alarming early results of the Southwest Wisconsin Groundwater and Geology Study (SWIGG) released late in 2019. The SWIGG study is designed to determine whether there is bacterial and/or nitrate contamination in the water of the 44% of residents who have private drinking water supplies in Grant, Lafayette and Iowa counties. The study is also looking at how contamination reaches groundwater and wells where soils are generally thin and bedrock is highly fractured.

The first round of testing in November, 2018 found pollution in 42% of tested wells, and a second round in April, 2019 found 27% with pollution. These results demonstrated wells polluted by fecal material from humans and livestock along with nitrates and indicates that farm and field runoff and septic systems are contributors. Some of the sampled wells tested positive for salmonella and/or cryptosporidium. The study will ultimately sample in all four seasons to help determine seasonal factors. Updates will be available at each county's land conservation office website.

In mid-November, Lafayette County officials attempted to prosecute journalists and discipline local officials for how they handled information about the ongoing groundwater research. A furious public backlash from local residents and free speech advocates forced the officials to back down.

Results of an Environmental Law and Policy Center public survey released in December show 82% of voters in SW Wisconsin ranked safe drinking water as very important. The survey polled voters in the 3 SWIGG study counties, along with voters in Crawford and Richland counties. Voters there also strongly supported measures to such more protections from livestock feedlots and allowing counties to adopt stricter local standards to protect drinking water.

The water testing and polling results show the importance of holding local officials and the legislature accountable for the steps they take to address these issues. Thanks to the many members who attended state budget and the Speaker's Task Force on Water Quality hearings in 2019. We'll all need to step up this year to support any clean water measures in 2020, especially legislation based on recommendations by the Task Force.

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Beyond Coal – And Gas!

It's now old news – but the planet's heating up. The latest International Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report is a dire warning that we must respond quickly. But how to react? Now is the time to stop burning not only coal, but all fossil fuels. Adding decades more CO2 and methane is simply not an option if we are to avoid the worst climate change impacts.

A lot occurred last year, with even more to come this one, so let's bring you up to speed on what's occurred, what's planned, and what you can do. The key thing is, with the help of our volunteers, we ARE making a difference, and putting pressure on the utilities and our state and communities to act more proactively.

Madison Gas & Electric

A basic fact is that Madison Gas and Electric still uses way too much coal. (Of course, any is too much!) Of the electricity MGE delivers to customers, about half is from coal plants they own. They also purchase a fair amount of electricity off the grid, mostly from coal and fracked gas. MGE's plans for 30% renewables in 2030 is well behind what's needed. And their intent to have net zero emissions for electricity by 2050 still falls short of the optimal 100% renewable energy.

In part due to continued pressure from Beyond Coal and our MGE activist's team, MGE is installing and purchasing more renewable energy, including a new wind farm in Iowa, and will be purchasing a total of 100 MW of power from two solar farms. But with a number of cities and Dane County in MGE's service territory aiming for 100% renewable energy, we need MGE to do better. MGE is still part owner of the old, dirty Columbia coal power plant in Portage, and the rate case coming up this year provides an opportunity for us to demand that they do better and get off coal.

We Energies

Despite shutting down the Pleasant Prairie coal plant in 2018, We Energies still has two large dirty coal power plants in Oak Creek that have been showering local residents with coal dust as well as creating large amounts of other toxic pollutants and global warming emissions. That's unacceptable, and a strong coalition led by support from the Sierra Club's Beyond Coal team is keeping up the pressure to shutter these plants.

As part of We Energies rate case last year, they (again!) proposed a fee for solar homeowners, despite any supporting evidence. We helped convince We Energies to withdraw this proposal. Unfortunately, despite a Sierra Club analysis showing that continuing to operate their coal power plants would cost customers \$75

million per year more than moving to renewable energy, the Public Service Commission voted to allow We Energies to continue to profit off dirty coal. However, we were successful in stopping the proposed regressive fixed fee increases.

Proposed Gas Plant in Superior

Not to leave northern Wisconsin out of the fossil fuel fiasco, Minnesota Power and Dairyland Power Cooperative are seeking to build the Nemadji Trail Energy Center (NTEC), a 525-megawatt (fracked) gas power plant, in Superior. At a time we need to get off fossil fuels, and Dairyland and other utilities are acquiring additional renewable energy, this would be fossil foolish, and be a major step backwards.

This is especially true since fossil fuel-based plants are quickly becoming costly dinosaurs. A report by the Rocky Mountain Institute last fall found that 90 percent of 88 proposed natural gas plants, including NTEC, would cost more than if the utilities instead invested in wind, solar and energy efficiency. That makes the NTEC proposal an especially dubious proposition – for the environment – and ratepayers.

Since the power would be used by both a Minnesota and a Wisconsin utility, it requires approval by the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission and Wisconsin PSC. Due to NTEC being sited in Wisconsin, the Minnesota PUC initially punted on an Environmental Impact Statement to the Wisconsin PSC. The PSC's EIS found issues of environmental concern, and the new PSC appointment by Governor Evers may offer more hope the PSC will reject NTEC. In addition, a Minnesota's Court of Appeals said the Minnesota PUC must also include climate change impacts before approving the contract. Hopefully, the Minnesota PUC will prove rate payer friendly and respond to climate change concerns, and reject the NTEC plant.

Taking Action !!!

As the latest IPCC report made clear, the time to speak up and act is now. Not by chance, we have a number of excellent opportunities to get involved and push back on utilities and forward on clean energy.

MGE Activist Team

MGE still uses far too much fossil fuel, and falls short of Wisconsin's new goals. (Any is now too much!) We have an appropriately named MGE Activists Team which is a great opportunity to get involved since we need a lot of different skills and capabilities, so if you're interested in clean energy solutions, there's a

Parks, Trails and Public Lands

The importance of our public lands cannot be underestimated, both for the health and well-being of people and wildlife, but also for the fight on climate change and developing resilience in our region.

The John Muir Chapter has a Land and Wildlife team that will be kicking off 2020 with a full day skill building and campaign planning. On January 25th, you can join the team and meet other activists from around the state. There will be trainings by staff and other volunteers, campaign and strategy planning, and getting down to work! In 2020, The Four Lakes Group will be working on forests, public lands and land use as it relates to climate change and climate adaption in our region. Public lands and land use go hand in hand with transportation, our other main focus area. So, in addition to the ecological value of lands for carbon sequestration and resilience, we will be advocating for all abilities to have access to our parks, and the value of public land as green infrastructure.

Updates

Blue Mounds State Park Master Plan Update

In 2019, the Four Lakes group mobilized comments on the Blue Mounds State Park Master Plan revision. There was a second round of comments that closed in December 2019. Currently, we are awaiting the next version of any proposal for the park.

This gem of a park lies close to large population centers in southern Wisconsin, and also connects with the Military Ridge bike trail. Its location makes it a premier site for hiking and biking in the summer, and skiing and snowshoeing in the winter. It is very popular (for good reason!) and heavily used in all four seasons.

The Sierra Club Four Lakes Group has taken a position opposed to the proposal to create a new snow-mobile trail through Blue Mound State Park on the basis of our support for silent sports, concern for public safety, the existence of snowmobile trails already nearby, and the need to preserve the ecological integrity of the park.

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The DNR is currently compiling input and will post a summary on their web site. We anticipate that the update of the Master Plan will move into its final phase sometime in 2020, so stay tuned for updates, and possibilities for further input.

Southwest Savanna Ecological Landscape Regional Master Plan

This is a regional master planning process for the Southwest Savanna region of Wisconsin. The region includes state parks, state trails, state natural areas, fish and wildlife areas, and the Southwest Grassland & Stream Conservation Area. This major landscape area covers all of Lafayette County, and portions of Grant, Green, Iowa, and Dane counties.

Two public meetings were held – June 5 at New Glarus Village Hall and June 6 at Mineral Point City Hall – and an online form and paper Public Input Form were available for the public to provide their feedback regarding this plan. Go to the Wisconsin DNR's website

We anticipate that a draft Master plan will be released sometime this year for public review and comment. Lower Yahara River Trail: Phase 2 Public Meeting – Information & Input

This included an environmental review, topographic survey, design and engineering for a proposed segment of multi-use trail extending between Fish Camp County Park and Lake Kegonsa State Park. Dane County Parks is also coordinating with the Wisconsin DNR to plan an additional trail through Lake Kegonsa State Park to Williams Drive in the Town of Pleasant Springs. Public input on the plans and information is welcome.

Statewide Energy Opportunities

At the state level, there are important avenues to weigh in on climate change, fossil fuels and clean energy solutions. The Governor's Climate Change Task forces provides opportunities to impact policies and programs, as does the Public Service Commission on the regulatory environment.

Governor's Climate Change Task Force

Last August, Governor Evers signed an Executive Order to create an Office of Sustainability and Clean Energy, and set a statewide goal of 100% clean electricity by 2050. In addition, he signed an order to create a Climate Change Task Force to strategize how best to achieve this goal and help Wisconsin's economy, adding an energy equity and justice lens.

This task force is being headed by Lt. Governor Mandela Barnes, but includes several other legislators, members of organizations, and private citizens with expertise on climate and justice issues. They will be holding a number of hearings around the state, and with 31 members, there will be opportunities to attend hearings or speak with members of the committee to provide your thoughts and views.

Public Service Commission

As the regulatory body that oversees investor owned and municipal utilities, the Public Service Commission has a lot of (discretionary) power over utilities and what they are allowed to do. For the most part, the PSC has been very utility-friendly, especially under Governor Walker when he had appointed all three commissioners. However, the chair of the PSC, Rebecca Valq, has been appointed by Governor Evers, and has made clear she wants to hear from the public on rate cases. And with the news that current Commissioner Mike Huebsch is retiring, Evers will now get a second appointment to the PSC. (Hooray!) In our area, this may especially pertain to the MGE rate case this year. (See Beyond Coal article.)

We invite you to track utility rate cases this year, and weigh in. With two Commissioners appointed by Governor Evers, now is a critical time for them to hear from you as to what we want as ratepayers and citizens. As clean energy is becoming cheaper than even operating existing fossil fuel power plants, the PSC needs to hear from you that it's time to move off of fossil fuels and on to renewable energy. In addition to ratepayer costs, they also need to account for the costs of climate change when making decisions.
