Georgia Water Coalition's 2015 "Dirty Dozen"



group of more than 200 organizations representing well over a quarter of a million Georgians-compiles a list of the twelve worst offenses to Georgia's water. The annual Dirty Dozen shines a spotlight on threats to Georgia's water resources, exposes polluters and state policies that harm property owners, downstream

communities, fish and wildlife, and many others.

This year, the Georgia Chapter nominated <u>Cooper Creek Watershed Project</u>, a plan that would cut 3,500 acres of trees in the Cooper Creek, Coosa Creek, and Youngcane Creek watersheds in Union County, Georgia. The project was selected along with eleven others, including:

- 1. Cooper Creek: Timber Harvest To Muddy Mountain Streams
- 2. Georgia's Stream Buffers: Confusing State Law Leaves Some Streams Without Protection
- 3. Chattahoochee River: EPD Water Grab Threatens Health of State's Most Critical Water Supply
- 4. Georgia's Hazardous Waste Sites: Toxic Legacies Pose Public Health Risk
- 5. Chattahoochee River: Chattahoochee Tubers' Trash Draws Ire of Riverfront Landowners
- 6. Altamaha River: Rayonier Pulp Mill Fouls Altamaha; State Allows Pollution to Continue
- 7. Georgia's Coast: Offshore Drilling Poses Threat to Coastal Tourism, Fisheries
- 8. Coosa River: Power Plant Killing Fish on the Coosa
- 9. Little Satilla Creek & Penholloway Creek: Strip Mine Threatens Property Values, Water in Wayne County
- 10. Bear Creek: Reservoir Deal in Newton County a Boondoggle for Taxpayers
- 11. Withlacoochee River and Floridan Aquifer: Gas Pipeline Invasion in Southwest Georgia Risks Drinking Water
- 12. Georgia's Groundwater: Legislative Inaction Leaves Well Water At Risk

In addition to listing threats to our water, the report also includes a "Clean #13" which celebrates the decision by the Georgia Department of Transportation to deny a petroleum pipeline company the authority to use imminent domain to build the Palmetto Pipeline, a pipeline running from Augusta through coastal Georgia to Florida.

EPA and Georgia Congressmen submit strong comments against Sabal Trail Pipeline

In our <u>last issue of Footnotes</u>, on October 21, we included an action alert to send comments to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) on the draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Sabal Trail natural gas pipeline project, which would include over 500 miles of new natural gas pipeline in Alabama, Georgia, and Florida.



Just a couple of days afterward,

Georgia Congressmen Sanford Bishop, John Lewis, Hank Johnson, and David Scott sent a letter to FERC raising environmental justice and health concerns, and demanding alternatives to the proposed pipeline. Raising even more concerns about the project, the EPA released its own letter citing significant environmental threats, including drinking water supplies, sensitive geologic formations, wetlands, conservation areas, environmental justice (EJ) communities, and air quality and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

Testify at EPA Clean Power Plan Public Hearings



This summer, the EPA made climate action history by releasing the final Clean Power Plan. This essential clean air safeguard will reduce carbon emissions from power plants 32% by 2010 nationwide, resulting in fewer respiratory illnesses, missed days of school and work, and premature deaths of Americans who live near dirty fossil plants. Although the plan is final and has been published in the

Federal Register, attacks on the plan are far from over. Two weeks ago, Georgia Attorney General Sam Olens <u>added Georgia to the list of states suing the EPA</u> over the rule. Unsurprisingly, <u>Georgia Power has joined the lawsuit</u>, too.

Sierrans sent a loud and clear message to CPP opponents by turning out over 700 people for the Atlanta Climate March and EPA hearings last summer. On November 19-20, the EPA will hold another round of CPP hearings on the proposed federal plan. We have a chance to defend the Clean Power Plan and our climate from attack once more.

Join us in letting the EPA know that Georgians care about clean air, good jobs, and a stable climate.
