



MARTA Vision Needs Your Support

Transportation is the biggest problem facing the metro Atlanta region according to a poll conducted by the Atlanta Regional Commission and announced at the 2015 State of the Region Breakfast. For the secondstraight year, residents have named the issue as their top concern, and over 91 percent of respondents said that improving public transit is important to metro Atlanta's future. With such a strong show of support for transit, it is evident that residents are ready for a substantive investment in a truly regional transit system that gives people a real alternative to sitting in their cars on congested roads.

Unfortunately, state and local leaders have not always been on board. In the past, when discussing solutions for our



transportation problems, our leaders have focused on investing heavily in roads while underfunding transit infrastructure. As recently as this year, lawmakers <u>passed</u> <u>a transportation bill</u>, HB 170, which raises nearly \$1 billion for roads each year, while providing only a one-time allocation of \$75 million for transit throughout the state. This consistent lack of funding for transit infrastructure and overemphasis on road building has lead to disconnected, sprawling development which perpetuates a dependence on cars.

Help put an end to this road by letting our elected officials know you support transit!

MARTA has unveiled a <u>vision that would expand the system</u> northward to Alpharetta, eastward to Stonecrest, and to Emory University. Their \$8 billion proposal would be funded by an optional transportation sales tax provided in HB 170, and requires legislative approval before it can proceed. While this development is promising, the plan has already met with friction. Fulton County's mayors and commissioners <u>recently met to discuss pursuit of a transportation sales tax</u> <u>referendum</u> that would likely be invested primarily in road projects, and the City of John's Creek dealt another blow to MARTA's plan when its council <u>passed a</u> <u>resolution last week opposing any referendum vote</u> or legislation that would provide for increase in taxes for MARTA.

While not much is certain at this point, one thing is clear: building more roads is not the way forward. Any further investment in transportation should go towards building out our regional transit system, and with a tri-county service area, MARTA is best positioned to do just that. Under CEO Keith Parker's leadership, MARTA is both increasing and improving quality of service, as well as demonstrating fiscal responsibility. And the emergence of groups like the <u>MARTA Army</u>, which aims to improve ridership experience, and <u>Advance Atlanta</u>, a citizen-driven advocacy coalition dedicated to building support for greater regional transit access, bolsters MARTA's efforts. Now, as our decision makers consider the various transportation funding options before them, it is critical that they hear from you.
