XPANSION SOUGHT FOR PEORIA TOXIC WASTE LANDFILL: ERMIT TO EPA: WASTE TRAINS FROM EAST COAST POSSIBLE

Toxic ash from toxic waste incinerators as far away as the East Coast could be coming to Peoria for burial if a permit request of the Peoria Disposal Co. is granted by the Illinois EPA. PDC is seeking a "modification" of its existing permit to allow it to dispose of such material in addition to the variety of other toxic materials it is already handling at its landfill off Rt. 8 at the west city limit.

It is one of 20 landfills in the nation licensed to receive toxic waste in general, according to owner Royal Coulter. The permit addition for toxic waste incinerator ash would be for the entire 90 acres of

the landfill, he said.

A permit change is also being sought to expand the landfill by piling the waste material 10 feet higher

in part of the area.

The waste, after processing, is deposited in pits (called "cells") that are currently "about 40 to 50 feet deep" and lined with an "80 mil thick" plastic liner, Coulter explained. (80 mils is a little less than one-tenth of an inch.) Each pit is about"6 or 7 acres" in area and is covered when filled.

PDC's current permit was reported to have been

issued in 1987 and expires in 2005.

In an article about PDC in the June 'Waste Age Magazine, the magazine stated, "Another area PDC hopes will be profitable is rail haul. The company, with easy access to many rail lines, is just starting to offer this form of transport to some East Coast customers. Through arrangements with (3 railroads), PDC could accept more volumes of hazardous and industrial waste from new and distant clients, while saving them money."

A "public meeting" to air the permit requests was held Aug. 4 at the PDC office at 4700 Sterling. Notice of it was about half way down in the fine print legal notice section of the July 3 Journal

Star.

Charlene Lemoine, by chance, came across the notice July 31 in a copy of the permit request at the library, and attended the 8:30 am meeting with a friend representing PEACE. Only others there were 5 PDC officials, nobody from the EPA.

You can make the difference by writing and calling elected officials about bills & issues listed below or in Sierra publications. MONTANA WILDERNESS?? "Keep the pressure going!" is the word from our Montana Sierra friends. The BAD Montana Wilderness bill still needs opposition. S.B. 1696 (no House version of bill as of 7-30) protects little wilderness and sets dangerous precedents. Urge your Senators & Congressman to develop & support legislation which 1) protects over 5-million eligible acres of wilderness, 2) protects vital water flows in the area, & 3) preserves citizens' rights to take the Forest Service to court over its management of Mortana's ntl. forests. Shirley O. Northern Spotted Owl Preservation & Northwest Stabilization Act - S. 1762. This is not an environmentally sound law because 1) only 1/2 of the forests necessary to protect the Northern Spotted Owl would be available, 2) forests surrounding Olympic Ntl. Park, the N. Cascades Ntl. Park, as well as coastal forests from the Columbia River in Oregon to the Golden Gate Bridge would be logged, and 3) it would weaken the Endangered Species Act, Ntl. Forest Management Act & Federal Land Policy & Management Act. It appears Sn. Gorton's bill (or some version of it) will be voted on ASAP and that it may be attached to a critical bill the Senate must pass during this Congress. URGENT!!! Call your senator (202)224-3121 or write to oppose this bill stating we need a strong Endangered Species Act!!! within the next 2weeks. For update on status of bill call C. Pauli 446-9792 or S. Club D.C. office (202)547-1141. *Adams/Leahy Ancient Forest Bill would call for a study of ancient forest reserves with protection of some E. Wash & Oregon ntl.forests during the study. It would establish ancient forest reserves, watershed protection & create a fund to assist the timber workers & communities in their transition away from old-growth logging. Also, the Cranston Sierra Nevada Amendment would protect S. Nevada forests in a similar plan as the Adams/Leahy Bill.
