

ILLINOIS RIVER WILDLIFE REFUGE PROPOSED BY FEDS by Cheryl Pauli

During the early 1900's Thompson and Flag Lakes in Fulton County near the confluence of the Spoon and Illinois River was a vast wetland. In the 1920's this area was drained,"protected" from the Illinois River and put into intensive agriculture.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) has proposed the development of Emiquon National Wildlife Refuge in this location. The alternative preferred by USFWS (Alternative 3) would permit them to acquire from willing sellers 11,039 acres (4 times larger than Jubilee State Park). Thompson and Flag Lake would be restored to an average depth of 4 feet, thus providing the area with 2,800 acres of backwater lake habitat. Approximately 1,900 acres would be native moist soil plants and 800 acres would be restored to shallow open marsh. Another 3,600 acres would be preserved as bottomland/upland forest. About 1,100 acres would remain in agriculture with a percentage of the yield left in fields for wildlife, and 800 acres would be restored as native prairie. The proposed refuge has 89 State and Federal threatened and endangered species. It would help protect and restore natural areas unique to the Illinois river basin and aid in improving water quality within the wetlands system, not to mention the recreation potential. Illinois is deficient in 15,000 acres of wetland habitat. The proposed *Emiquon National Wildlife Refuge* (Alternative 3) needs to be enthusiastically endorsed. EAST PEORIA MARINA: Keep On Writing: We say E. Peoria needs a new permit application. Though the IL Div. of Water Resources gave conditional permit approval Jan. 26 for the 600-boat marina its fate is still on tenterhooks. A permit must also be given by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers-Gov. Edgar must release \$5 million in start-up money for the project. It's expected to take \$15 million in public investments. A greatly revised and still incomplete new plan has been substituted for the one on which the Dec. 8 hearing was called. HOI is opposing the marina because it is 1) the wrong direction environmentally, 2) public funds need to be concentrated on halting siltation, 3) the special interest public financing is wholly inappropriate ethically and economically. FAIRVIEW LANDFILL: On Jan. 26 a hearing on a permit to allow Gallatin National to dispose of ash from a municipal mass burn incinerator drew about 100 people. In 5 1/2 hours of testimony only 1 person favored it. This would be the first waste contract for the 1,000 acre landfill. Classified as "special waste" this ash can be hazardous.

PROPOSED HAVANA INCINERATOR: Opponents have organized to run for the town council. Mary Harkrader and Larry Johnson are providing campaign advice.

PEORIA'S TOXIC WASTE LANDFILL: The Main Peoria Public Library has information from the U.S. EPA on grinder-shredder permit request of Peoria Disposal Co. Comment period extended to March 5. This machine grinds asphalt & concrete. No word on public hearing for PDC's application to expand.



ACTION ALERT: A new process for siting low-level radioactive waste faciliities was passed the last day of the 87th Gen. Assembly. It 1) does away with local approval, 2) allows the contractor to select the site, 3) does not include public health, safety and welfare in site selection, and 4) allows only 30 days to file objection (objector bears burden of proof) Action to take: Write or fax Gov.Edgar asking him to veto HB 1918 or call his assistant Allen Grosboll 217/524-1395; Write: Gov.Edgar, Statehouse, Springfield, IL 62706; FAX number:217/782-3560 If he vetoes the bill it is dead, an override is not possible. (Source IEC)

LETTERS OF THANKS NEEDED: Gov.Edgar announced the purchase of 15,500 acres of land on Jan. 7. This land, located in Cass Co., contains high quality upland forests, about 100 small ponds, rare hill prairies, threatened and endangered species. Funds specifically designated for land acquisition will be used.The Governor is hearing from opponents of this purchase. <u>He needs to hear from</u> <u>supporters.</u> It will be the largest property owned by DOC and can be managed as an ecologically diverse site.
