Amendments to H.B. 1158 and other Senate bills will waive all federal laws to allow maximum timber cutting in National Forests and BLM lands requiring road building at the expense of the government. Timber cutting will be exempt from all federal laws! President Clinton has announced his intention to sign H.B. 1158 into law. A massive outpouring of public protest is needed

to convince President Clinton to either veto H.B. 1158 or work with the conference committee to remove the logging provision from the bill. 
CONGRESSMAN LAHOOD SCORES A ZERO ON THE ENVIRONMENT by Hal Gardner

By contrast, 17th District Congressman Lane Evans scored 100% for the environment!

CLEAN WATER CELEBRATION RE-CAP

Valdas Adam Kus, Head of Region 5 U.S. EPA was elated to see 3000 high school students attending the Clean Water Celebration held at Peoria Civic Center March 22, 1995. This

was in stark contrast to the current low priority given to the environment in government these days. The event was sponsored by Southern Illinois University, the Sun Foundation, local corporations, and the National Science Foundation.

The Exhibit Hall featured environmental projects from 50 Illinois high schools as well as those from three other states. They were joined by 35 state and private agencies, including HOI Sierra Club. Available from the Sierra Club booth was information on the Mississippi Basin Ecoregion, wetland restoration at Emiquon, governmental regulation needed to protect the environment, and practical tips on how to protect clean water at home. Activities in adjacent Civic Center rooms offered the Small Change Theater Company of Minneapolis, lectures on the environment, and exhibits of aquatic animals.

Because of downsizing of the federal budget, a grant from the National Science Foundation is not expected next year, thus this may be the last year of the Clean Water Celebration. Other sources for funding are being sought. EPA's Mr. Adam Kus felt that the Celebration gave a focus to environmental sciences that will make a difference in student's attitudes. Hopefully, funding will be there for educating future minds, and steering them toward the right directions.

PROPOSED PEORIA/CHICAGO HIGHWAY

You may remember that there are four possible routes of the proposed Peoria to Chicago Interstate. One incorporates U.S. 24 through Washington, one follows Rt. 116 through Germantown and Roanoke to Pontiac, one utilizes I-74, but bypasses Bloomington-Normal and one goes north parallel to Rt. 29 to join I-80 near Princeton. Of all the proposals, the North Route running parallel to Rt. 29 is the most environmentally damaging.

The State of Illinois, in its commendable concern for wetlands cannot build a major highway where Rt. 29 is presently located because in many areas there is too little space between the bluffs and the floodplain. Illinois Department of Transportation's (IDOT) solution is to wind the highway up and down the bluffs, crossing in five different places at highly erodible streams, and passing through oak-hickory forests. In fact, we have been unable to obtain a map from IDOT of this corridor.

Oak-hickory forests like those of the Illinois River bluffs are becoming rare. This same area was considered worthy of preservation and was targeted for Conservation Leases under the Forest Legacy Program. The continuous forests of the Illinois River bluffs serve as an important wildlife corridor and flyway for forest dwelling birds and animals. Water and silt passing through these forested areas are slowed and trapped by the vegetation, preventing additional siltation of the Illinois River. If the purpose of building a Peoria-to-Chicago highway is as much for economic development as for transportation, we do not want a bluff route to open this rare and sensitive area to further development.

The north route seems to be favored by IDOT. One reason may be increasing opposition to the other alternatives. Pontiac is on record as not wanting another highway. Farmers around Flannagan are opposed to taking farmland for the road. The Bloomington-Normal area, with its water supply problems, doesn't want a highway too near Lakes Bloomington and Evergreen, its major water sources.

IDOT needs to hear from you. <u>Letters of concern and opposition to the North Route are needed!</u>

I urge you to promote reforms in the 1995 Farm Bill that would support small and medium sized farms, and provide incentives and assistance for farmers who are trying to practice environmentally sound production methods. Please support Conservation Incentives for farmers through the Environmental Reserve, Conservation Flex Option, Stewardship Incentive Payments, Water Quality Incentive Program and Conservation Compliance Provisions.

It is essential that the Conservation Reserve Program be continued. The Agricultural Conservation Reserve and Environmental Stewardship Program and Pesticide Reduction and Education programs have also made valuable contributions to caring for land. Illinois needs to continue making improvements in saving one of our most valuable resources, our topsoil. These conservation programs will in turn help reduce erosion into the Illinois River, and the great problems and expense of dealing with silting in the river.

I urge you to support sustainable agriculture programs, which are fiscally responsible, prevent costly pollution and health problems, and help small and moderate sized American family farms. Please reject efforts to cut funding for these critically needed programs, and give your Illinois voters sustainable agriculture leadership at this critical time. Your actions will mark the direction of agriculture for years to come.


HOI EXECUTIVE MEETINGS
