Clean Water Celebration a Success

An estimated 3,200 students and teachers participated in the third annual Clean Water Celebration, held March 18 at the Peoria Civic Center. The Sierra Club display was on sedimentation. It consisted of three metric cones that had been filled with Illinois River water at different time intervals. Students had to use the metric scale to determine how much sediment had accumulated at the bottom of the cones. The display also had six different types of sedimentary rocks which students could examine. Sedimentation will also be the theme at the Club's display at next year's Clean Water Celebration.

SAVANNA NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE by Hal Gardner

The Savanna Army Depot is scheduled to be decommissioned, and this action will make 13,000 acres along the upper Mississippi River available for disposal. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) initially wanted 11,000 for a wildlife refuge, but a local committee appointed to determine the fate of the Army Depot initially opposed the FWS proposal. Happily, Ed Britton, the new manager of Savanna Fish and Wildlife Refuge, told us at our April meeting that an agreement was reached to transfer 9,300 acres to FWS (everything of ecological significance). --> SEE SAVANNA, PAGE 2

Only a few months ago the issue seemed to be headed for a grim ending as a developer's paradise with proposals as diverse as mega hog farms, nuclear waste dumps, prisons, and housing sites (non mutually exclusive). The matter seemed to come to a head at a March meeting and "public hearing" of the local committee. At the afternoon meeting, a Salt Lake City lawyer hired by the committee apparently made a big scene about how the whole of the depot should be turned over to local developers (shades of the "wise-use" movement also coincidentally based in Salt Lake City).

Rudy Habben and I attended the evening meeting after this big scene occurred. It became immediately obvious that there was considerable tension among the committee itself as well as the audience. Disorganization seemed to reign, and initially there was no public comment taken. Getting irritated, I held up my hand until recognized. Then I expressed my desire to save the extremely rare sand prairie that exists on the site, as well as the bottomlands. I said that FWS is a very professional organization capable of doing a good job of managing these valuable ecosystems for future generations. To the local committee's surprise (and mine) the audience broke out in applause. The committee took testimony from three others, including Rudy Habben who also spoke in favor of the refuge.

Possibly because testimony was going against the committee, the "hearing" was abruptly terminated. The committee then wanted to go into "executive session", but someone said this violated Illinois law. They decided to do it anyway, but for several minutes did nothing in the hallway because of the legal challenge. Some of the committee members even approached Rudy saying that "other alternatives" needed to be considered. And the "other alternatives" were indeed considered when the local committee came to a satisfactory agreement with FWS before the March 28 deadline.

LCV SCORECARD FOR FIRST SESSION OF 104TH CONGRESS

The League of Conservation Voters just released the environmental scorecard (0 to 100%) for the First Session of the 104th Congress. There are issues not scored by LCV, but the LCV rating does give a good cross-section to evaluate performance.

Congratulations and high praise go to 17th District Congressman Lane Evans (100%), Senator Paul Simon (100%), and Senator Carol Moseley-Braun (93%).

However, 18th District Ray LaHood received a failing 23% score. Congressman LaHood voted incorrectly on the following:

- (1) Voted for "logging without laws" (a section of the infamous Rescissions Bill, HR 1158) where the taxpayers lose twice: their forests, including ancient forests, and federal subsidies to logging companies.
- (2) Failed to appropriate money to the Park service to open the new Mojave National Preserve.
- (3) Voted for "takings" legislation (HR 925)--provides for government compensation to landowners if impacted by Clean Water Act, Endangered Species Act, or other laws; otherwise laws can be violated with impunity.
- (4) Voted for "regulatory reform" where cost-benefit and risk-assessment must be done before environmental regulations can be instituted, and additional opportunities are afforded industry to legally challenge government rules.
- (5) Voted for combined "regulatory reform" and "takings" bill (HR 9).
- (6) Voted against funding renewable energy (Klug Amendment to HR 1905).
- (7) Voted for a rollback of the Clean Water Act, dubbed the "Dirty Water Act" (HR 961).
- (8) Voted for 17 nasty environmental riders attached to the EPA appropriations bill (HR 2099), but then he reversed his vote to drop the 17 riders in conference.
- (9) Voted against international family planning (Smith Amendment to HR 1868).

Congressman LaHood did vote correctly to prevent the closing of certain National Parks (no on HR 260). On the issue of mining on federal lands, LaHood twice voted incorrect, and once correct. Congressman LaHood also voted to delete a rider that would override environmental laws to increase logging in Alaska's Tongass National Forest. If my son received a 23% score from his school, I would hit the ceiling. Are you satisfied with your representative to Congress, or do you deserve better?




