Rock Island Trail Extension in Danger


Your Calls and Letters to Peoria City Officials Needed

The southward progress of the Rock Island Trail from Pioneer Park is in danger of being stopped. A vital 9 mile link, along with a previously approved Peoria Park district grant of \$200,000 in state trail funds, and \$150,000 of design and engineering work will be lost if the Peoria City Council does not vote to stop operations on the Peoria, Rock Island and Pacific Rail line. (The city owns the railroad. A 20 year lease agreement allows the city the option of discontinuing service to Pioneer Park customers at any time after a 30 day notice.) The city may decide the fate of the rail line as early as March 4th. Your letters and calls to Peoria City Council members and Mayor Maloof are needed as soon as possible to ask that the city of Peoria cease operations of the branch

rail line from Pioneer Park to downtown Peoria. This vital link will enable progress in connecting the riverfront trail system to northern Peoria and Peoria Heights, and the hundreds of recreational trail users along the way.

At a February Railroad Commission meeting, Steve Van Winkle, Director of Public Works for the City of Peoria and member of the Peoria Railroad Commission, recommended that the city cease operations of the branch line from Pioneer Parkway to downtown Peoria. This line is the intended extension of the Rock Island and Pimiteoui Trail system. It has been losing money as a short line railroad for the city for several years, as only two businesses use it. Public Support for the Environment is Confirmed!

Last year the 103rd Congress led by Newt Gingrich tried to undo 25 years of environmental progress. Worse yet, Congress was poised to give away hundreds of millions of acres of public lands. Except for large scale logging of our National Forests (the logging without laws bill), other schemes to rape our public lands largely failed. The Congressional plotting failed because of public protest. Most of the nasty bills were stopped by the Senate or



the President. But there are indications the 104th Congress may persist in dirty tricks (despite Newt's born-again environmentalism). The environmentally defunct Senators and Congressman from Alaska will certainly continue pushing for clear-cut logging in the Tongass National Forest and oil-drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. And, we will see how Congress reacts to mining reform. Thanks for the letters you wrote last year, and keep up the pressure!

is in such poor condition that an estimated \$2.4 million is needed to make repairs, and trains are limited to 10 mph because of the hazardous conditions.

Other options for the two businesses using the rail line exist. Funds might be found between business and government to connect the Union Pacific line from the west, which lacks only 1,800 feet of trackage to link into Pioneer Park. An estimated \$405,000 would be needed for this. The city might be able to help the two businesses, Carver Lumber and Gateway Milling, by paying the difference between rail and trucking costs for a set time. Carver received 42 railcar loads and Gateway received 177 railcar loads in 1996. The businesses could also opt for truck delivery, as other businesses in Pioneer Park do. Guy Brenkman, President of Pioneer Rail Corp., 1318 S. Johanson Rd., Bartonville, runs several short lines, and is challenging Steve Van Winkle's recommendation. Mr. Brenkman is prepared to ask the City to vote this issue in his favor. He would like to have the personal option on running the rail line, and says he will be successful. Carver Lumber and Gateway Milling say the higher freight costs will close their businesses. Please call and write. Ask the Mayor and City Council to cease operations of their branch railroad line from Pioneer Park to downtown Peoria. For more information call George Burrier, 698-5512.

Clean Water Celebration

HOI Sierra Club will again participate in the Clean Water Celebration on March 10 at the Peoria Civic Center. This will mark the 4th annual Clean Water Celebration, a coming together of more than 100 groups seeking to promote education of middle and high school age students in Central Illinois. Last year the number of visitors and participants was over 3,000.

Once again our booth will have as its theme, sedimentation and erosion. But, this year we will focus on one Illinois River feeder stream, Senachwine Creek in northern Peoria County. Specifically, we will display two settling cones, one filled with water from upstream of a clear-cut logging site and one filled with water from downstream of the site. A printed handout interpreting the display will be offered to interested students and teachers. The handout will also explain the history of the logging operation, its destructive pressure upon erosion and what can be done to halt this environmentally harmful practice. Four questions related to the display and handout will be printed in the Clean Water Celebration program. Many teachers require their students to answer these questions as an assignment. This requirement has proven to be a meaningful educational experience for the students, teachers, and Sierrans working in the booth. Some art work, photo blowups and our HOI banner will add to the attractiveness of the booth.

Reform the 1872 Mining Law!

Ask Ray LaHood to Support "The Mineral Exploration and Development Act of 1997"

Finally, the overdue reform of the 1872 Mining Law! HR 253, "The Mineral Exploration and Development Act of 1997", provides five key reforms: 1) It eliminates the patenting process which enables companies and individuals to purchase public lands outright; 2) It provides for citizen participation by requiring mining companies to advertise their plans and to hold a public hearing before beginning any work; 3) It eliminates the free ride for mining companies by requiring them to pay an 8% royalty to the federal government; 4) It provides for the eventual reclamation of mine sites by

requiring companies to post bonds or otherwise set aside funds and by establishing strong environmental standards; and 5) It requires companies to submit detailed plans for all mining operations and authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to deny permits based on poor plans or inappropriately situated mines.

Representative Ray LaHood promised to support reform of the 1872 Mining Law in the HOI debate last fall. Please write or call him, remind him of this pledge, and ask that he support (or even cosponsor) H.R. 253. His address and phone number are in the box on the left.

Of Transportation that we are opposed to this route. Why? Because it has the second largest population of a federal-listing candidate Hill's thistle and other rare species, such as Indian paintbrush. Other burns include a large prairie at Jubilee Park, two private sites, and the Rock Island Trail Nature Preserve. If you enjoy working to preserve native plants from being overcome by alien plant invasion, we are the group for you. Protect the Tongass

The Tongass, the last best remnant of a vast sea of green forest stretching from northern California to Glacier Bay, Alaska, needs your help. For 50 years timber company contracts have allowed 400 year-old trees to be purchased for the price of a cheeseburger. About one-half million acres of prime Tongass timber has been clear-cut. The cancellation of one long-term contract, along with the closing of the Ketchikan Pulp Company mill now open an opportunity for a new management plan to be put in place. Your calls and letters are needed to urge protection for the Tongass for its long-term sustainability as a complete ecosystem. The following points need to be made: the long-term contract with Ketchikan Pulp Company must be cancelled; large, protected biological reserves must be established within the Tongass; significant resources within the forest ecosystem must be protected; complete buffer areas for beaches and river edges must be established; and management actions must be monitored and evaluated.
