Navigation Expansion: It's All About Money and Water Forest Park Nature Center, 7 p.m.

Mark Beorkrem, the Navigation Policy Director for the Mississippi River Basin Alliance, will address the consequences of expanding commercial barge traffic on the Illinois and Upper Mississippi River. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is spending \$50 million to study the feasibility of expanding the navigation system and it is the Sierra Club and MS River Basin Alliance position that expanding navigation only puts further pressure on a severely degraded ecosystem and that enough compromises have been made in the name of economic progress. Additionally Congress should explore eliminating the \$140 Million per year operating subsidy taxpayers pay for operating the navigation system to the benefit of multi-billion dollar asset companies like ADM, Cargill, Monsanto and Amoco. *All are welcome! R.I. Trail Depot Restoration

Restoration of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Depot along the Rock Island Trail in Wyoming, IL. is complete. The exterior and interior surfaces have all been restored and painted with historically accurate colors. Electrical service, heating, and air conditioning have been installed. Those familiar with the depot will be amazed to see the refurbished baggage room. Melinda Kitchens, Site Superintendent of the Rock Island Trail State Park, has moved her office into the depot, and is working to furnish the depot with railroad artifacts and other items of historical and environmental interest relating to the trail. Interactive exhibits for children include a working telegraph and drawers with "touch and feel" items similar to those popular in children's museums. The depot exterior boasts new sidewalks, benches, bicycle racks, and a handicap accessible entrance.

For those Rock Island Trail bikers who normally do not get to see the north end of the Trail, consider a drive to Wyoming to check out the restored depot, and then a leisurely four mile round trip bike ride to the scenic Spoon River Bridge north of town.

Homes For Rare Trees?

To the 500 Heart of Illinois Sierrans who did not attend the March meeting: You missed an opportunity to see and hear a CONSERVATIONIST who we can all

admire and hold up to the public, and ourselves, as a model of dedication for a better environment. Jim Anderson (Peoria) brought to us his crusade to restore to Illinois some of the rare and endangered trees that once were common, but have since been decimated by disease, development, logging and agriculture. American Chestnut, Butternut (White Walnut), Paw Paw, Persimmon, Pecan, Wild Hazelnut, Wild Plum; names from the past, now rare and desperately in need of human help. Mr. Anderson has answered an inner call to restore these once magnificent trees to the woodlands, pastures, vacant lots and lawns of Illinois. He travels the State in search of seeds, plants the seeds in his tree garden, and a year later gives the seedlings to anyone willing to give them a good home. He does presentations (like the one for HOI) to as many groups, large and small, as will listen. He passes out free literature (recycled paper) to all: how to plant and care for seedlings, tree descriptions, starting from seeds, planting a windbreak, history of the trees. Ironically, the one thing Jim needs most, HOI could have given, 20 acres to plant and grow his trees. Remember the Ilo Dillin land that was willed to us....and lost by the bureaucrats in San Francisco. Still a bitter memory to many of us. But, what's meaningful here is that we give Jim Anderson an enormous THANK YOU, not just for speaking to our group, but more importantly for the remarkable work he is doing. Improvements Coming for Central Illinois Bike Trails

The Illinois Department of Transportation has released its construction program for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1998. Included are \$6.5 million for trail development in central Illinois. Half the funds, \$3.2 million, will go for bikeway development and aqueduct repair on the Hennepin Canal Trail in Bureau County. Tazewell County will receive over \$2.5 million for three projects: \$886,000 for the River Trail extension into Morton, \$523,000 for engineering and bridge repair on the Pekin Park District Trail, and \$1.1 million for bike and pedestrian bridges on the East Peoria River Trail. The Bloomington Park District will receive \$850,000 for landscaping, pedestrian bridges, and bikeway improvements on the Constitution Trail.

The City of Peoria has released a public notice that the riverfront bike trail will be extended north from Hamilton Blvd. as part of the extension of Constitution Avenue to Irving Street. The bike trail will be on the east side of the railroad tracks and will be developed with the Rex Plex in the area north of the Murray Baker Bridge.

Poet and biologist Sandra Steingraber, the internationally acclaimed author of "Living Downstream, An Ecologist Looks at Cancer and the Environment" and her husband, Boston sculptor and installation artist Jeff de Castro, will speak at the Peoria Art Guild on Sunday May 24, from 6:30-7:30 p.m. She will read several of her poems and talk about her book. He will show slides and talk about his latest projects. The event is free, the public is cordially invited, dress is casual, and the presentations will be less than an hour. Proposal for the Grand Kankakee Marsh National Wildlife Refuge

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing a way to restore up to 30,000 acres of the Kankakee River watershed over the next 30 years by creating the Grand Kankakee Marsh National Wildlife Refuge. This Refuge would restore important fragments of wetlands, oak savanna and prairie lost to farmland and urban sprawl. The Kankakee River was once one of the most productive wildlife habitats in the country, and had major breeding grounds for migratory waterfowl. Much of its marshlands were drained, and wildlife habitat has declined dramatically. The primary goal for the Refuge would be to restore habitat for more than 75 state-listed and five federally threatened and endangered resident species, including the Sandhill Crane, copperbelly watersnake, Mead's milkweed and the Mitchell's Satyr butterfly. Your letter is crucial to keep this project alive. As a citizen of Illinois and a person concerned about the environment, your comments can really help in making this Refuge really happen. Letters Needed to Help Save Our Forests: PLEASE SPEAK UP ON BEHALF OF THE TREES

The Clinton Administration and U.S. Forest Service are proposing changes in the management of Roadless Areas. Your letters are needed to stress the following important points:

The Greater Salmon/Selway Ecosystem is the only place left in the lower 48 states with all the native plants and animals it contained before the United States was formed. The U.S. Forest Service is destroying this valuable habitat with timber sales like the Cove/Mallard sale. Timber sales cost the U.S. taxpayers, and the U.S. Forest Service is losing about \$1 billion per year. The Forest Service must end logging and roadbuilding on public lands. The Forest Service should cancel the Cove/Mallard timber sales and all other Roadless Area sales greater than 1000 acres. The Forest Service must do a Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement for the Cove/Mallard sales and request public commentary. The United States should save its National Forests for species habitat, watersheds for the provision of clean water, and our National Forests should not be used for private profit through logging. Less than 4% of timber supplies in the U.S. come from National Forests and this small percentage can be stopped without damage to the U.S. timber industry. Full support should be given to U.S. House of Representatives Bill 2789, the Zero Cut legislation to save what is left of our great national forests for our children, for our future. Keep Hog Waste Out of Illinois' Waters! Support House Bill 3165!

Please call your State Legislator today and ask him or her to support House Bill 3165 to keep hog waste out of Illinois' waters. Be sure to also ask that your Legislator oppose industry efforts to weaken existing hog factory farm regulations. Your help is needed now! House Bill 3165 has several important safeguards that are greatly needed. It will ban megahog farms in floodplains and high groundwater areas. It will also limit the amount of manure that can be dumped on farm fields, so that the ground will not be over-used and a hazard for rain runoff of the manure. H.B. 3165 also has stronger standards for building waste storage pits or lagoons that will help prevent leaking. Your calls and e-mail, fax or other quick action is urgently needed to support House Bill 3165. Act now!

Illinois Senate Bill 1707 Really Stinks!

As the megahog factory farm fight heats up, some pretty stinky legislation has been proposed to appease the public. Do not be fooled! Even though area Senators Hawkinson and Shadid are part of S.B. 1707, it is a bad bill. Contact your state Senator and tell your strong opposition to Senate Bill 1707. This bill is basically written by the hog industry and will weaken the already inadequate and too few rules that exist regarding megahog factory farms. S.B. 1707 allows an increased amount of manure dumping on farm fields. This will be a real threat to surface water contamination and a longer term threat to overloading the soil with phosphorus and other substances. Act now! Call your Illinois Senator and oppose S.B. 1707.

As a new State Representative, Ricca Slone deserves our thanks for her exceptional efforts on behalf of environmental issues. She is an activist in the megahog farm battle and she has helped sponsor several bills that we can all appreciate. The Slone/Andrea Moore Illinois Smart Growth Task Force Bill 0365 would create a task force to examine the causes and consequences of converting agricultural land to other uses and make recommendations for the continued use of land for ag purposes. Her H.B. 2995 would have amended the Illinois Pesticide Act to require applicators to annually report to the Illinois Department of Agriculture the types and amounts of pesticides and herbicides applied. The Department of Agriculture would then have to compile a report that would be publicly accessible to see the volume of pesticides and by county and watershed. Thanks for all your hard work, Ricca!
