




Bring your favorite food to share and a dozen or so slides from your latest trip or event, for a holiday time get-together. The Nature Center will be decked for the season, and this is a great

Campaign Finance Reform and the Environment

In early September the U.S. Senate voted against the McCain-Feingold bill that would have outlawed unlimited

and unregulated "soft money" contributions that polluters and irresponsible developers have long used to buy votes in Congress. "Soft money" includes contributions to political parties and political action committees (PAC's). Although a majority voted for the bill, including Illinois' Moseley-Braun and Durbin, it failed to get the sixty votes needed to break a Republican filibuster.

McCain-Feingold had previously passed in the House, no thanks to Ray LaHood. Mr. LaHood voted against, but for a bogus bill introduced for the sole purpose of giving anti-reform Congressmen a "talking point" back home. Lane Evans voted for McCain-Feingold.

So what's the connection between campaign reform and the environment? Much of the anti-environment legislation proposed and passed into law is written, and sponsorship paid for with the "soft money" contributions of polluters and reckless developers. Cut off this flow of money and their influence is greatly reduced. It would also help to level the field between environmental groups and big business.

Call President Clinton! Monstrosity of Budget Bill Hurts

Forty pounds of paper, thousands of bills, and "Only God knows what's in this monstrosity!" said Senator Byrd (W. Va.) on the omnibus spending package.

The giant budget bill passed by the 105th Congress contains many anti-environmental riders. Efforts by the Clinton Administration to clean up the worst provisions amounted only to damage control. Sierra Executive Director Carl Pope is asking that we call, write, fax, or e-mail President Clinton to demand that he begin the next Congress with a declaration that there will be no tolerance for anti-environmental riders. These pieces of legislation are tacked on to unrelated bills without regard to due process, public input or debate.

Some of the most destructive riders in the Budget Bill are the Quincy Logging Bill, which will double the timber cut in three National Forests in California's Sierra Mountains; a provision that prevents the Interior Department from requiring that companies repair damage to lands they have mined; a measure

that betrays the Clean Air Act by mandating a four year delay in the phase-out of the pesticide Methyl Bromide (a chemical with damaging health effects and which depletes ozone); a provision that prohibits the Department of Transportation from improving fuel economy standards; and there are others.

The good news is that the Clinton Administration and environmental leaders in Congress removed or moderated some anti-environment provisions including a bill that would allow helicopters in Alaskan protected wilderness; a bill that would stop salmon restoration efforts by requiring Congressional approval for changes in dam operations; and a bill that would grant officials of the International Monetary Fund power to tell Third World countries which environmental laws to eliminate as "trade-barriers."

Your letters and calls to the White House help! Send a message that you strongly oppose sneak attacks on our environment!

IEC Releases Environmental Voting Record of 90th Illinois General Assembly

The IEC (Illinois Environmental Council) has released the Environmental Voting Record of the 90th Illinois General Assembly. Key environmental bills were selected from both the 1997 and 1998 sessions in compiling the voting record. Except in rare circumstances, the Record excludes consensus action on

Included below are the voting records of central Illinois legislators. Congratulations go to Ricca Slone, one of only two House members with perfect 100% pro-environmental voting records.

From a central Illinois perspective, if one could pick a key vote it would be the Livestock Mega-Facilities bill, an amendment to the currently inadequate Livestock Management Facilities Act. A bad, industry supported version unanimously passed the Senate (and hence excluded from the Environmental Voting Record). In the House, with the sponsorship of Representatives David Leitch, Ricca Slone, Michael Smith, and Donald Moffitt, the bill was amended to provide a good start toward some common sense regulation of livestock mega-facilities. The amended bill passed the House but unfortunately did not make it out of the Senate.

The IEC is the only Illinois environmental organization working full-time to educate citizens about the legislative process and voting records of the members of the Illinois General Assembly. The Illinois Environmental Council is a not-for-profit coalition of individuals and organizations (including the Sierra Club) committed to a healthful environment, stewardship of natural resources, and public participation in the decision-making processes of the state. The IEC does not make financial contributions to, nor receive them from any political party.


While I am not an activist and am not in a position to take part in many activities, I do try to attend most meetings and have been the Sierra Club Heart of Illinois treasurer for a number of years.

Peoria County Board Candidates Get High Marks on Environmental Survey

A survey on local and regional environmental issues was sent to each of fifteen Peoria County board candidates in September by the Heart of Illinois Sierra Club. The results were announced to the press at the HOI Group meeting on October 21. Eleven of the fifteen candidates responded. All eleven candidates indicated strong support for environmental stances. Every candidate checked the "environmentally correct" answer to at least nine of the twelve questions. Mike Mason (Democrat-18th district) scored a perfect 100%.

The question that drew the greatest number of opposing answers and the most comments concerned the construction of the Peoria to Chicago interstate highway. Nine of the candidates favored the highway. Several of these expressed, in their comments, a preference for the location having the least environmental impact. Sierra Club opposes the highway, but recognizes that some corridors are more environmentally friendly than others. In particular, Sierra Club strongly opposes the North corridor that would cut through the west river bluffs at several points.

Four candidates did not respond to the survey. They were Junior Watkins (Democrat 2nd district), Terry Weitzel (Republican 6th district), Carol Trumpe (Republican 12th district), and Brian Elsasser (Republican 14th district).


