Senate Vote on the Energy Bill Coming Soon - Arctic National Wildlife Refuge Needs Protection

Mail letters will be too slow in reaching the Senator, due to mail security steps since 9/11/01. Senator Fitzgerald has voted to protect the Refuge in the past, however, intense pressure will be placed on Senators as the Administration Energy Bill starts in the Senate during the last week of February and first of March. ## **Ilo Dillin Land: Reprise**

In 1996 Heart of Illinois Sierra Group received a letter from a Bloomington, IL legal firm informing us that Ilo E. Dillin had died and willed us 80 acres of land located two miles northwest of Armington in Tazewell County. Ms Dillin was neither a member of Sierra Club or known to any of us. HOI is technically a group within a state chapter, and a legal entity of (national) Sierra Club. Because national SC has a bylaw that does not permit owning property, we were immediately engulfed in a legal quandary.

At the outset, national SC suggested giving the land to a foundation. We found a reputable foundation in Parklands, also based in Bloomington, and made a verbal agreement that would place ownership in their custody with HOI managing restoration work. This arrangement quickly became mute when national SC, in a spasm of legal paranoia, disclaimed the

property. A \$240,000 market value. Although the land had been in the Dillin family for almost 150 years, national SC feared a toxic waste site lurked below the surface. At about the same time, the executor of Ms. Dillin's estate was accused by the Illinois Attorney General of stealing more than \$40,000 from another part of the estate. Naturally, this chain of events perpetrated a numbing headache for the courts. All of the above occurred in about one and a half years. Since early 1998, the Dillin property lay buried in legal briefs and delays. HOI was excluded from the proceedings and became disillusioned with national SC, the estate executor, and the courts. Until, a small article in the January 13, 2002 Sunday sports page of the Peoria Journal Star announced that the Ilo Dillin 80 acres had been accepted by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources as

This maybe a very welcome outcome. Pheasant Habitat Areas are new to IDNR, this being only the second in the State. Byron Paulson, District Wildlife Biologist for IDNR, says the plan is to establish fields of warm season grasses and, possibly, some tree plantings with a shrub border in the lower field along the creek. In the future a hunting season of approximately 16 days will be offered for wild birds only.

The evolution of a politician usually starts with intent to work for the public good, drifts to favors and access for money, retains that nasty trait, and adds arrogance and lying when the job becomes secure. In the U.S. Congress, job security is built into a system that favors incumbents. There are 435 House seats up for election in November of 2002. Thirty to forty will be contested. In the other 400 "contests" the incumbent has either no opposition or a token opponent. Arrogance and lying follow like flies to manure on a hot summer day.

For example, last year the U.S. House passed a farm bill that flies in the face of sound ag economics. It perpetuates low

commodity prices, over production, huge subsidies, and is guaranteed to continue the downward spiral of the family farm. It is the failed Freedom to Farm in a thin disguise. Here's what Congressman Ray Lahood (18th district) had to say, "large landowners aren't receiving the bulk of the farm subsidies." Lie! According to even the U.S. Department of Agriculture, always known to be

cozy with Big Ag, 10% of the landowners received 65% of the government subsidy in 2001. LaHood goes on to say, "It's small family farmers that benefit from Freedom to Farm." Lying again. Secretary of Agriculture, Ann Veneman says that our system of subsidies helped large commercial operations at the expense of small family farms. And LaHood would be hard pressed to find one ag economist in the country that would agree with him.

At a local level, The Chillicothe (Peoria County) City Council is wrestling with a leaf burning issue. Chillicothe allows leaf burning, but a very vocal group of citizens would like a ban. They oppose burning for health reasons that are well substantiated by medical research. After impassioned pleas by

crying mothers of asthmatic children, the Council has agreed to a survey. Mayor Don White says, "I recognize the health risks with leaf burning, but there are more people out there that enjoy burning leaves than are concerned with health issues." Regrettably, he is correct, but he goes on to say, "I totally respect the health issue, but in a democracy you've got to get the public input." He hits the lie quinella and is this a prejudiced survey? Has this man a hint about representative government?

Back to LaHood. He and his disciples, State Senators, George Shadid, Carl Hawkinson and Claude Stone, and representatives David Leitch, Ricca Slone, Keith Sommer and Michael Smith have recently raised from the grave a part of the

Corridor A bypass of the Peoria-to-Chicago expressway. A section that would begin at route 6 and connect with highway 29 at Hart Lane, about one mile north of Chillicothe. Previously, this eightsome had favored an upgrade of route 29, and before that a complete Corridor A from route 6 to I-180 north of Putnam, and before that a ring road from Mossville to route 24 near Washing-

ton. So we can see that changing their minds frequently is an expensive pattern (about 8 million in studies) with this group. LaHood was caught in a lie On Feb. 1, 2002 when he told a meeting of mostly hostile Chillicothe residents, "I am undecided on the bypass." Yet in his Dec. 19, 2001 letter to Illinois Department of Transportation secretary Kirk Brown, LaHood writes, "Our central Illinois legislative team would recommend that the Route 29 four-lane expressway should bypass around Chillicothe."

## Support the Illinois Wetland Protection Act - House Bill 6013

House Bill 6013 would restore protections to wetlands that the federal government is no longer protecting by requiring a permit from the state before anyone could destroy a wetland in Illinois. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources would consult with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to determine if the proposed activity would cause a violation of Illinois' water quality standards. H.B. 6013 would allow for the wetland protection program to be run by county governments, rather than the state, if the county chose to and had a program in place that was as protective as the state program.
