Bill Rutherford: Memories

In the fall of 1970 a few months after the first Earth Day, Bill Rutherford invited the public to a meeting at Forest Park Nature Center in Peoria Heights. The purpose of the meeting was to organize a regional Sierra Club Group. Heart of Illinois Sierra Club was born that night. But, Bill Rutherford was always a page ahead of everyone else and his underlying agenda was twofold: add a national environmental organization's support for his plan to develop and then deed to the State

of Illinois the property abandoned for rail transportation by the Rock Island Railroad, property he had persuaded the railroad to donate to Forest Park Foundation. the foundation he and his wife Hazel controlled; the second

item on Bill's wish list was to build local support opposing a project initiated by the C.A. Powley Company in East Peoria to backfill more than two acres of Lower Peoria Lake just north of the I-74-116 interchange, the space to be used for commercial property.

On that fall night 30 plus people filled the Nature Center's meeting room, Hal Gardner was elected chairman, I vice chair, and Tom Edwards conservation chair. Long before the meeting ended Bill Rutherford excused himself with a smile on his handsome face. Development of the Rock Island Trail and "Save Peoria

Lake" became the two nascent issues for HOI and unlike many to follow both would be remarkably successful, but not without setbacks and delays.

The Rock Island Trail would not open to the public for ten years, delayed by farmers with nearby property and a state legislator who pleaded fears of minority gangs from Chicago, descending on cornand-bean-land, to rape and rob the good people of Alta, Dunlap, Princeville, Wyoming and Toulon.

Bill, We thank you, we miss you, but we will never forget you. Your Good Deeds Will Live on For Future Generations.

The Save Peoria Lake campaign was much shorter and ended when the Powley Company withdrew their permit request and, within two years, declared bankruptcy.

Bill Rutherford went

to have a hand in many other HOI efforts over the last 36 years of his very full life. He died at age 91 in late November, his legacy unmatched by any other, from our part of the country. I witnessed a meeting in those first years that was virtuoso Bill Rutherford. It was a gathering of representatives from the Illinois Conservation Department (now Natural Resources). Army Corps of Engineers, HOI, The Powley Company and its attorney. Bill had managed to get himself designated as moderator of the meeting. As proponents and opponents spoke for three hours, all but one became tired and restless.

Peoria Disposal Company Hazardous Waste Landfill Issues Update

Peoria Disposal Company has appealed to the Illinois Pollution Control Board and is contesting the Peoria County vote against their Hazardous Waste landfill expansion. The Illinois Pollution Control Board Hearing on the PDC Appeal of the County Vote will be held Monday, January 8th through Thursday, January 11th, beginning each day at 9 a.m. at the Itoo Hall, 4909 West Farmington Road, Peoria.

PDC is stating that they did not receive a fair hearing and correct notification of the County Board decision, among other issues. Attorneys for PDC have subpoenaed numerous citizens who spoke out against the landfill, for a second time, and will question them before the Illinois Pollution Control Board hearing officer. or go to the Illinois Pollution Control Board website; click on COOL, the Clerk's Office Online; select "View Case Information" and search by Peoria County.

The public will be allowed to comment at some time during this process, however, at press time for this issue of *Tallgrass Sierran*, that time is not yet known. Call the Heart of Illinois Sierra Club information line at 309-637-1393 for updates on hearing times and scheduling.

Citizen comments are needed for both the Illinois Pollution Control Board, and for the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA).

The IEPA hearing will be February 28th at the Peoria Public Library downtown, beginning at 5:30 p.m. The IEPA is preparing to extend the operating permit for the Peoria Disposal Company Hazardous Waste Landfill up to ten years.

Your comments are needed! You can speak at this hearing and / or send a letter. The PDC permit extension application, the IEPA draft permit and related fact sheet is available for viewing at the downtown Peoria Public Library, 2nd floor, Business, Science, Technology Department.

IEPA has also published that PDC has applied to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to increase its existing

authority to accept waste containing PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls). PCBs are persistent organic pollutants known to have a variety of adverse health effects, including as endocrine and immune system disruptors and they are carcinogenic.

Members of Heart of Illinois Group Sierra Club and Peoria Families Against Toxic Waste requested that the IEPA consider findings of the Peoria County Staff review of the PDC landfill information, and require that PDC complete many of the upgrades and safety measures listed by the Peoria County Staff report. Examples of these safety measures include using closed collection tanks for leachate; adding leak detection monitors to manhole sumps; reevaluating the routine groundwater monitoring program and begin measuring compounds such as chloride and sulfite; and implementing an ambient air monitoring program at the

Bill, subtly and gradually took over the meeting. Starting with nuanced and carefully worded points of agreement he, astoundingly teased a concession from Powley that would, to their apparent unawareness, doom the entire project. Everyone, HOI, Conservation, The Corps, and Powley walked away happy, albeit the latter for a very short time. A few of us shook our heads in disbelief, "How did that happen?" The answer: Elmer Gantry (alias Bill Rutherford) made a brief reincarnation in East Peoria that night.

The curtain is down on the Bill Rutherford era and there may not be another with his accomplishments: Wildlife Prairie Park, Forest Park Foundation land acquisitions scatted over several countries, Forest Park Nature Center, The Rock Island Trail, Heart of Illinois Sierra Club. He will not be forgotten.

North Canton Strip Mine Applying for U.S. Army Corps Permit and IEPA Permit Donations Needed

The coal strip mine proposed for a 1,085 acre site north of Canton Lake, will impact the watershed currently providing water for Canton Lake and 18,500 people. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has published a public notice for comments, as streams going into the Illinois River will be impacted by the mine. The Army Corps states, "The decision whether to issue the Corps permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impact including cumulative impacts of the proposed activity on the public interest." While Canton is planning a pipeline to bring water from the Illinois River for their community water supply, this system is not in place. Sierra Club members have asked why a watershed should be strip mined and destroyed for just ten years of coal profits. Such short-term gains at the cost of sustainable water resources are not in the best long-term interests of the public at large and for a sustainable environment.

In early December, the Joint Commission on Administrative Rules, the bipartisan legislative oversight committee of the Illinois General Assembly, approved a plan to drastically reduce mercury pollution from coal-fired power plants. Representative Dave Leitch is on this commission and was part of the unanimous vote to require Illinois coal-fired power plants to install modern pollution control equipment. The new regulations are intended to reduce mercury pollution by 90%. This is a huge step for Illinois, and gives our state among the toughest mercury regulations in the nation. Let Rep. 
Starved Rock Winter Hike
