California/Nevada Wilderness Committee

The weekend of October 13th, I traveled to the James Preserve, a Southern California mountain retreat just east of Idyllwild, to meet with the Wilderness Committee. The Wilderness Committee is an interesting group of wilderness and forest advocates getting together quarterly to discuss California and Nevada wilderness issues. The new Bono bill was high on our list, along with the Boxer bill for Sequoia National Park, a potential Feinstein bill for desert areas, the San Gabriel Mountains campaign, and a Tejon Tehachapi proposal, all in California. Vicky Hoover, Chair, always provides lunch, dinner and breakfast for us.

Sunday included a hike in one of the regions we have discussed for wilderness. The day turned bright and sunny, after a fogged-in Saturday, and the hike to Cahuilla Mountain gave us a good view of these desert mountains in the proposed wilderness of the same name.

The next meeting will be February 10-11, 2008 in Shoshone (southeast of Death Valley National Park). Anyone interested? You are invited. *****

New Wilderness Bill

In September, Senator Barbara Boxer and Congresswoman Mary Bono introduced the California Desert and Mountain Heritage Act in both the Senate and the House of Representatives. (HR 3682 in the House.) The new bill is an expanded version of the Bono bill introduced just at the end of the last Congress. The California Desert and Mountain Heritage Act will protect over 202,000 acres in four new wilderness areas. Six additions to existing wilderness areas, and four additions to the San Jacinto-Santa Rosa Mountains National Monument. The bill will also add 31.5 miles to the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System by protecting four important streams. The bill includes a wide range of ecosystems of Joshua tree forests, groves of cedar and pine, oak woodlands, steep river canyons, chaparral thickets, and cactus gardens.

Oppose Initiative Effort to Skew Presidential Elections for Partisan Advantage

Sierra Club opposes an initiative proposal currently in circulation that would change California's method of apportioning its electoral votes in presidential elections. The Golden State, like 47 other states, awards all of its electoral votes to the winner of the state's popular vote. The initiative would award one electoral vote to the leading vote-getter in each congressional district, as is currently done in Maine and Nebraska.

While reforming the electoral college is a very legitimate topic for debate at the national level, this particular initiative is a transparently partisan ploy undertaken by Republican political operatives who are trying to offset the Democratic advantage in California without doing anything to address the Republican advantage in other big winner-take-all states, like Texas. As an environmental advocacy group that engages in the electoral process, we urge our members to decline to sign petitions for the measure, which is entitled "Presidential Electors. Political Party Nomination and Election by Congressional District." *****

The weekend of October 6-7, John and Marcia Rasmussen joined a volunteer work party in Sequoia National Park. The project involved carrying–by hand–hundreds of pounds of concrete mix along a steep, slippery trail to the mouth of Ursa Minor Cave. The volunteers spent the weekend constructing a carefully-engineered cave gate, which will protect the cave from curious tourists and deliberate vandals. Ursa Minor is a cave of world class beauty, discovered in August, 2006. It is currently open only for scientific study. *****
