San Joaquin River Cleanup by Richard Sloan

On Earth Day, Tuesday April 22, 2008, members of the Tehipite Chapter helped to remove over 1,000 feet of barbed wire fence located on the San Joaquin River Conservancy property know as Ball Ranch. The fence served no purpose and was a danger to animals and human users of the property. The fence was unusually hard to remove because there were four or five strands of barbed wire on top of hog wire, buried about a foot into the ground. The fence was fairly old, since square nails were found on a few of the posts. One volunteer brought an electric-powered prototype wheelbarrow, which proved most useful to haul fence posts and wire to where it could be removed by truck. *****

California Wilderness Legislation

Late yesterday, Senator Barbara Boxer and Rep. Buck McKeon introduced legislation in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives (H.R. 6156/S. 3069) to protect significant portions of the Eastern Sierra and San Gabriel Mountains as wilderness, and to protect portions of three rivers as wild and scenic rivers. The areas and rivers are listed at the end of this message.

Together the proposed wilderness comprises nearly half a million acres of lands that Sierra Club and our coalition partners in the California Wild Heritage Campaign have been working to protect for many, many years. A bill of such significance is truly a remarkable achievement for two Members of Congress who usually do not fall close together on the political spectrum, and is the result of intensive grassroots organizing, phone calling, meeting and hearing attendance, letter writing, and persuasion of elected officials over the past several years by many, many constituents. As staff, we are so proud of our members and those of other organizations, and of the organizers who have worked in this region over the past several years to make this possible.

This bill is also the result of tough negotiations by Senator Boxer and Rep. McKeon and their staffs. While we haven't fully digested the contents, which are just being divulged today, we do know that there is about 51,000 acres from portions of some BLM WSA's that are released in the bill using standard wilderness release language. There is a provision to allow snowmobile access in Leavitt Bowl, which we have opposed vigorously, but with language to manage the area as wilderness in non-winter months. There is some wilderness management language, such as fire-related language, which we may not support.

We recognize that the bill has not been reviewed by any Sierra Club committees yet and that it will need to go through that process. Nonetheless, we believe that this is a very strong package of protections that we must mobilize in support of immediately because we believe the opposition from off-roaders will be large and loud. We feel it is essential to contact our members in the district and urge them to call Rep. McKeon to thank him for introducing this strong package of wilderness and wild rivers. We will be calling all our members in the district over the next few days with a recorded message, telling people about this bill and asking them to call Rep. McKeon in support of it. We will also be sending email alerts to

our activist lists.

There will be plenty of time later to work on refining the language and working for improvements. But right now, we need to be ready to show that support for the bill in the 25th district far outstrips the opposition, so we will be organizing to achieve that goal in the short term.

Stay tuned for more details, and thank you all for your efforts on behalf of

wild places, wherever they may be.
