At 6PM on Wednesday January 18, 2023 recently-appointed Lake County Community Development Director Mireya Turner will join us to discuss future directions for her department: this is a wonderful opportunity to explore ways to collaborate to ensure that healthy ecosystems and outdoor recreation are included as essential parts of community planning and development. ## Pleistocene Park Screening January 29

At 2:30PM on Sunday January 29 Lake Group is partnering with the Soper Reese Theater and Middletown Art Center to sponsor a special screening of the film *Pleistocene Park*, which tells the story of "a Russian scientist – part genius, part madman – a vanished ice age ecosystem, a climatic timebomb, and a crazy plan to save the world" by restoring the Ice Age "mammoth steppe" ecosystem and avoiding a catastrophic feedback loop leading to runaway global warming.

Award-winning locally-rooted filmmaker Lucas Griswold-Tergis will join us to discuss the film and its implications: a Lower Lake High School graduate, Griswold studied cultural anthropology and ethnographic film at University of California, Santa Cruz, and currently resides part time in San Francisco and part time in Haines, Alaska. His first film, Smokin' Fish, played at film festivals around the world and

was broadcast nationally on PBS. *Pleistocene Park*, recently released, has already won prestigious awards at numerous film festivals. For more information and to see a trailer, visit https://javafilms.fr/film/pleistocene-park/

Audiences will leave this film not only with a feeling of immersion in another world and an emotional connection with the characters, but also with a stronger understanding of arctic system science and a deeper visceral sense of the urgency of climate change.

We hope this will be the first in a series highlighting many Lake County grown artists, scientists, engineers, educators, and innovators of many kinds who will share their work and accomplishments with the community to inspire others.

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# Federal Funding for Middle Creek

Just in time for Christmas, on Friday December 23 Congressman Mike Thompson announced that nearly \$4 million in funding Lake County projects had been included in the final 2023 appropriations government funding bill.

This includes \$750,000 to enable the Army Corps of Engineers to move forward with the design stage of the Middle Creek Flood Damage Reduction and Ecosystem Restoration Project, which will restore 1400 acres of wetlands at the north end of Clear Lake, simultaneously to reducing flood risk, improving water quality, and restoring vital wetlands habitat with cultural significance for the surrounding tribal project communities. The considered to be the most important single action we can take for the long-term health of the lake and its watershed, and this financial commitment is key to future progress—so good news indeed!

## **Molok Luyuk Update**

As was reported throughout 2022, the goal of achieving permanent protection for the sensitive habitat and cultural signicance of Molok Luyuk advanced considerably. As the year drew to a close the Berryessa Snow Mountain Expansion Act had passed out of the House in the National Defense Authorization Act, and out of the Senate Energy Committee by unanimous, bi-partisan vote. The coalition working on the campaign was hopeful that the bill would be included in a public lands package or other must-pass legislation during the lame-duck session, but this did not take place.

The bill will be reintroduced in the new session of Congress, with an improved chance of Senate passage paired with probably gridlock in the House. In the meantime, the campaign plans to work with President Biden and Interior Secretary Haaland to achieve long term protection and tribal co-management for Molok Luyuk through the Antiquities Act if Congress does not take action. We can make this happen – with your help – in 2023!
