Community Forum on Beneficial Fire

Lake Group's first community forum of the fall will be held virtually at 6PM on Tuesday September 14. We are looking forward to welcoming Lindsay Dailey, cofounder and Executive Director of the Lake Countybased intertribal nonprofit organization Tribal EcoRestoration Alliance (TERA), who will join us to discuss the growing movement to bring back the use of low intensity, anthropogenic fire as a tool to manage the health of our fire-adapted lands. We will discuss the importance of "good fire", the role of tribes in revitalizing this work, and how TERA is helping catalyze a Native-led resurgence of good fire in Lake County.

Although the meeting is free and open to the public as always, registration is required: everyone who signs up will receive confirmation and Zoom connection details, and a followup email a day or so before the event. Eel River Progress Report

As previously reported, PG&E's license to operate its "Potter Valley Project" on the main stem of the Eel River expired on April 14: with no party willing to take over the antiquated, seismically vulnerable Scott and Cape Horn dams, PG&E then proposed a schedule for license surrender that drags out for 30 months rather than moving urgently to protect salmon and steelhead listed under the Endangered Species Act.

Dam removal will eventually provide access to more than 280 miles of prime spawning and nursery habitat for imperiled fish, make the Eel the longest free flowing river in the state and reconnect its headwaters in the Snow Mountain Wilderness to the coastal redwoods in Humboldt County. By allowing PG&E to prolong the status quo in this lackadaisical manner and failing to require new license conditions recommended by the experts at the National Marine Fisheries Service in the meantime, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission is abdicating its responsibilities, so it's not surprising that on August 15 five non-profit conservation organizations led by Friends of the Eel River filed suit, alleging excessive and unlawful "take" of ESA-protected fish species below Scott and Cape Horn Dams.

A coalition of Tribes, conservation groups, and businesses working together for a healthier Eel River has recently set up a new website as a central clearinghouse for information on this evolving story: please bookmark *freetheeel.org* to keep track of what's going on.

Save the Date: Talk on Oak Restoration November 10

Please mark your calendars: on Thursday November 10 Anderson Marsh Interpretive Association board member Henry Bornstein will join us to provide a progress report on the reforestation program underway at the Park. A collaboration between State Parks, the City of Clearlake, and AMIA, the project will result in 100 or more native Valley Oak (*Quercus lobata*) saplings being planted and cared for until established. This virtual event will be free and open to the public as always, but advance registration is required; to register, visit the Lake Group website. *sierraclub.org/redwood/lake*, and click the link in the embedded calendar.

The oak restoration project is financed by fees paid to the City of Clearlake under its Native Tree Protection Ordinance, which requires developers who cut down native oaks either to replant trees of the same species or pay a fee to fund replanting by the city. Projected development projects are expected to result in substantial additional resources over the next few years: what do you think is the most effective way to mitigate for loss of these trees? Unfortunately it takes many years for young trees to begin to sequester meaningful amounts of carbon. Should replanting be required at a higher ratio? Should destruction of healthy trees be forbidden altogether? Would it be helpful to use some of these funds to subsidize tree care on public or private land to minimize future losses? How about a countywide ordinance similar to the one in the city?


