City Hike East Boston: Wood Island to Maverick

Turn the Tap Off on Toxic PFAS Chemicals

Urge the Joint Committee on Public Health to pass An Act to Protect Massachusetts Public Health from PFAS!

PFAS are a class of over 12,000 chemicals that are toxic at low levels and are used in many everyday items, like clothing, dental floss, food packaging, cookware, personal care products, and more. **These chemicals have contaminated drinking water throughout our state.**

The solution? There is legislation pending in Massachusetts to ban PFAS from a wide range of consumer products:

An Act to Protect Massachusetts Public Health from PFAS (S.1356/H.2197). This bill will:

- Get PFAS out of many products by 2026 and even more by 2030
- Cut industrial discharges of PFAS to water
- Set up a fund to help communities test for and treat PFAS in drinking water, soil, and groundwater

Passage of the bill will significantly reduce our exposure to toxic PFAS and prevent contamination from getting worse.

New Sierra Club Rail Report

A Sierra Club team of advocates focused on improving rail in the US released an updated report, outlining a series of recommendations to improve both passenger and freight rail, as well as expand rail electrification. The report is a resource for policymakers, government officials, and advocates on how investing in rail can help create good jobs, provide equitable mobility, reduce traffic congestion, and cut climate emissions.

The MOR-EV Program to now offer Rebates for Used Electric Vehicles

Massachusetts announced three important changes to the MOR-EV rebate program for electric vehicles (EVs) that will support greater adoption of EVs and make them accessible and affordable for more people. The Sierra Club has been a <u>longtime advocate for these changes</u> which were signed into law in the 2022 climate bill.

MOR-EV program changes:

- Income-eligible residents now qualify for a \$3500 rebate for used EVs with a final purchase price of \$40,000 or less
- A \$1500 rebate adder for income eligible residents to purchase new and used EVs
- Rebates will now be available at the point of sale with participating dealership instead of customers being reimbursed later

Initial Assessment Report on Massachusetts Electric Vehicle Charging Network Released

The interagency Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Coordinating Council (EVICC) released their Initial Assessment with recommendations on policy changes to build an interconnected, accessible and reliable electric vehicle charging network in Massachusetts. Sierra Club submitted Initial Assessment report and will continue to track development in this space.

The initial assessment report found that 10,000 public fast charging ports, 35,000 public Level 2 charging stations, and 700,000 residential and workplace charging stations will be needed to achieve the vehicle electrification targets in the 2025 and 2030 Clean Energy and Climate Plan (CECP). With approximately 6000 public charging ports, Massachusetts has a long way to go to bridge the gap. The EVICC will use the recommendations in the report to further refine its assessment of charging station needs and location, evaluate and manage grid impact, and develop a plan for the use of \$50 million in the Charging Infrastructure Deployment Fund



Housing and Climate Justice Lobby Day
