Update on Quantum Loophole Construction Activities & Data Center Approvals in Frederick County

Sierra Club Catoctin Group continues to partner with Sugarloaf Alliance and Smarter Growth Alliance of Frederick County to achieve due diligence at all levels



Over the summer, Sierra Club Catoctin Group (SCCG) remained engaged in the issue of Quantum Loophole's (QL's) construction activities, and in the broader issue of data center approvals in Frederick County. The following are a few brief updates.

Broadly, we continued to partner with Sugarloaf Alliance and with the Smarter Growth Alliance of Frederick County (SGAFC) to try to achieve due

diligence at all levels. The issues surrounding Quantum Loophole specifically, and data centers generally, continued to receive considerable attention in the local press.

On June 22, County Executive Jessica Fitzwater signed an Executive Order creating a 12- member Data Center Work Group which is tasked with examining County policy and regulations related to data centers. County Executive Fitzwater has acknowledged the need to strengthen current critical digital infrastructure (CDI) regulations to insure the

well-being of the community and the environment. The Work Group is expected to present its recommendations by December 1, 2023, and the County Council will presumably promptly review and act on them.

On July 13, Quantum Loophole held a Community Information Meeting at Hood College. Many members of SCCG were present and expressed their concerns in questions and comments to company management.

On July 27, 2023, to the dismay of many, the Frederick County Board of Zoning Appeals voted to grant QL's request for a special exception to County zoning law, allowing QL to drill in the floodplain of the Monocacy River in southern Frederick

County in crossing the river with their "QLoop" fiber optic conduit.

And most recently, on September 10, in solidarity with SGAFC, SCCG sent a letter to County Executive Fitzwater expressing support for a moratorium on all data center site plan approvals until the newly established Work Group makes its recommendations and the County has had time to act on those recommendations.

It is expected that our involvement in this, including our collaborations, will continue. Such centers, built properly, may well

benefit the County, but the specific problems noted here (and in the previous Newsletter article), as well as the broader issues of energy, water and other infrastructure demands intrinsic to these facilities, have got to be thoroughly examined and addressed.

5,000,000 Trees For Maryland

In 2021, the Maryland General Assembly passed legislation in support of planting and

maintaining 5 million native trees in the State by 2031.

A key focus of this pledge is supporting tree equity through targeted planting in underserved urban communities. In 2022, Maryland released its final "Plan for Growing

5 Million Trees in Maryland" with the support of the state's Commission for the Innovation and Advancement of Carbon Markets and Sustainable Tree Plantings. As part of the initiative, native tree seeds are needed for growing trees at the Maryland

State Tree Nursery. The John S. Ayton State Tree Nursery on Maryland's Eastern Shore near Preston produces millions of trees and shrub seedlings each year for reforestation projects across Maryland and Delaware.

A Recommended Tree List

from the Department of Natural Resources includes both large and small native trees. <u>Tree List</u>

You can also get \$25 of the purchase price of a native tree at participating nurseries under the <u>Marylanders Plant</u> <u>Trees program</u>.

To grow all these trees one needs seeds.The Antietam-
