

DSC Backpackers Celebrate Trek in New Mexico

Hikers enjoyed their August week of backpacking in the New Mexico mountains. Our happy hikers trekked from the north edge of the Pecos Wilderness to a camp at elevation 12,100 feet near Truchas Lake. In the scenic West Fork Rio Santa Barbara valley, the group shooed cows from their meadow campsite and approached a Mountain Sheep ram on a switchback above the tree line. The hike distance was thirty miles in four and a half days with more than 3,500 feet of elevation change. We then celebrated the trek at a Las Vegas, NM taco café. The Pecos Wilderness in the Santa Fe and Carson National Forests is one of Dallas Sierra Club's perennial favorite destinations!
