Proposed Wetlands Resilience 1.0 Draft Regulations

- What's Good: New DEP regulations will
 - Restrict new development in the highest-risk coastal floodplain areas
 - Require redeveloped structures to be elevated
 - Prioritize nature-based solutions for improving resilience
- What's Missing: New regulations should
 - Account for future storm severity and sea level rise projections
 - Strengthen emphasis on nature-based solutions
 - Provide clarity on retreat/abandonment vs. protection of existing structures
