Earth Day Fest 2024

On Saturday April 20, the Crossroads Sierra Club Group had a successful Earth Day Fest 2024 in downtown Brighton with the theme "Planet Over Plastics". We were joined by several local groups who are equally committed to improving our planet: Huron Valley Sierra Club Group, Huron River Watershed Council, Livingston Land Conservancy, Friends of Highland State Recreation Area, Huron Valley Audubon, Hartland Nature Audubon Club, St Paul's Episcopal Church, Brighton Chamber of Commerce, and Quartz and Company - a zero-waste, Earth-friendly store in Howell.

The highlight of the day was the kids tent where the children could make pine cone & peanut butter bird feeders, and received white pine seedlings to plant at home. St. Paul's Episcopal handed out wildflower seed balls for everyone to help naturally beautify their yards. Earth Day Fest was kicked off with lawmakers and community leaders speaking of their commitment to the environment; we welcome their ongoing efforts. And finally, there were free samples of plant-based "meatballs" that were delicious and helped people understand that a full meat-free diet does not have to be a sacrifice.



Crossroads Sierra Club 2024 Election Overview

Curt Hamilton and Ginny Maturen, as your Crossroads Co-Political chairs, have begun planning for the 2024 election cycle. Our activities will be much the same as in 2022, with some added activities and expansion of previous activities.

Ginny has been busy soliciting volunteers to participate in various activities later in the summer: postcards, canvassing, phone calls, texting, yard signs, poll workers, etc.

During May and June, the Political-Conservation committee will be revising and creating Crossroads questionnaires for candidates seeking Sierra Club endorsement: Livingston County Commissioner and Township Trustee. Once Crossroads endorses a candidate, Ginny will submit it to the Michigan Chapter Sierra Club Political Committee for endorsement. If there are any candidates running in the August Primary, our election activities will begin accordingly.

As it becomes applicable, we will also support candidates in western Oakland County where some of our Crossroads members reside.

In early July, we will complete our Crossroads Sierra Club Election Plan followed by the Crossroads Sierra Club Coordinated Plan. These, too, will be submitted to the Michigan Chapter for compliance review. In late July and early August we will formally begin our volunteer activities.

Pioneering a Healthier Future: The Case for Michigan's HOUSE BILL NO. 4083 By Jim Gilligan, owner of Snedicor: Michigan's Green Dry Cleaning and Laundry Pick Up & Delivery Service

Perchloroethylene is a volatile organic compound (VOC) widely used in dry cleaning. Despite its efficacy in removing stains, PERC's toxic properties have been linked to serious health issues, including cancer, neurological effects, and liver damage, as well as environmental degradation. The transition proposed by HOUSE BILL NO. 4083 is not just a regulatory step but would safeguard our communities and ecosystems.

Recent discussions have raised concerns about the feasibility and implications of moving away from PERC. Critics argue that alternatives remain unmatched by PERC's effectiveness in cleaning 'hard-to-clean' clothes. However, Snedicor is a company that phased out PERC in favor of the non-toxic GreenEarth cleaning solution in 2006. We've experienced firsthand that alternatives can perform as well as, if not better than, PERC.

In conclusion, the transition away from PERC is both necessary and achievable. With the support of environmental advocates, industry stakeholders, and the broader community, Michigan can set a precedent for environmental stewardship and public health protection. We urge all Sierra Club members and residents of Michigan to voice their support for HOUSE BILL NO. 4083, paving the way for a future free of toxic dry cleaning solvents.



Power Your Plate: Choose Foods to Help the Planet, your Health, your Wallet, and Animals!

Switching to more plant-based foods is the quickest way to help the planet, as urged by more than 200 climate scientists in an April 2024 <u>Harvard report</u>.



Healthy eating may be best achieved with a plant-based diet (which encourages whole, plant-based foods and discourages meats, dairy products, and eggs as well as all refined and processed foods). Per the <u>National Institute of Health</u>, research shows that plant-based diets are cost-effective, low-risk interventions that may lower body mass index, blood pressure, HbA1C, and cholesterol levels, and may also reduce the number of medications needed to treat chronic diseases. To look up particular health questions, one of my first go to places is <u>NutritionFacts.org</u> which is where M.D. Michael Greger distills many scientific reports into English, with references to "put it to the test". Two excellent documentaries you can stream for more about how plant-based eating makes you stronger, faster, and gives you the ability to prevent - or even reverse - heart disease, cancers, and anti-inflammatory diseases, check out <u>Code Blue Documentary</u> or <u>Game Changers</u>.

Plant-based eating costs less than the Standard American Diet with meat, eggs, and dairy per the <u>National Institute of</u> Health. Savings estimates vary from 16% to 29% according to different reports from the National Institutes of Health.

And not least of all, animals grown in Concentrated Animal Farm Operations (CAFOs) provide the worst lives for animals and produce suspect quality of food. The majority of people get their meat, eggs and dairy from CAFOs. The 3 page Sierra Club Grassroots Network Food and Agriculture Team/National CAFO Sub-team's August 2023 report outlines the stress placed on animals in intensive confinement, high levels of disease transmission, mutilations, barn fires, explosions, heat strokes, mass suffocations, and overall suffering animals endure.

So what to eat, what to do? Take VegMichigan's 30 day pledge to add more plant-based/vegan meals to your routine, focus your meals around whole grains, fruits, vegetables, beans, greens, nuts, and seeds - and get The Friendly Vegan Cookbook to help you get started. Focus more on "adding in" instead of "cutting out" by only learning new plant-based recipes - the more new things you try, the more new foods you will find to love, as talked about at <u>Vegan.com</u>. And, check out <u>MinimalistBaker.com</u> and <u>ItDoesntTasteLikeChicken.com</u> for many great tips and recipes.

All That Glitters

"All that glitters is not gold," wrote William Shakespeare. And how prescient he was: Glitter today is a mix of plastic and aluminum.

These sticky, scintillating specks appear in wrapping paper, holiday decorations, greeting cards, craft projects, and even personal cosmetics. Almost anything that sparkles likely contains plastic-based glitter. Since glitter particles are so small, they're considered <u>microplastics</u>: a major source of ocean, air, and soil pollution.

If the thought of giving up glitter altogether seems untenable, consider newly created biodegradable glitters. These teensy flecks use plant-based fibers, made using modified regenerated cellulose often sourced from eucalyptus trees, as an alternative to plastic sheets. Other biodegradable materials include mica (a naturally occurring silicate mineral) and synthetic mica. <u>Bioglitter</u> touts itself as the world's only certified freshwater biodegradable glitter brand. And the global leader in glitter production, Meadowbrook Inventions, now sells <u>biodegradable glitter</u>.

Addressing the glitter issue is a "small" way of getting the "big" issue across.

Getting Involved in Crossroads

The Crossroads Group of the Sierra Club is a dynamic organization serving Livingston County and western Oakland County. We are dynamic because our leadership team is large and diverse and committed to protecting the environment. We warmly welcome all newcomers who soon learn that they are among friends who work together to make our community a better place to live. Below you will learn about some of the things we do and opportunities for involvement.

Conservation Committee of The Crossroads Group.

The focus of the Conservation Committee is addressing local environmental issues such threats that come from oil and gas pipelines, new aggregate mines and PFAS contamination. We also advocate for things such as expanded transportation options and expanded parklands.

Being a committee member involves monthly Zoom meetings to discuss and strategize on issues the Group is working on. Committee members may bring up new issues that they are familiar with or concerned about, for discussion. It also involves participating in actions that the committee decides to undertake. This at times means assisting local community groups in their environmental activism. Our work is only limited by the volunteer capacity of the committee!

Political Committee of The Crossroads Group.

The focus of the Political Committee is getting environmentally friendly candidates elected to office and supporting environmentally friendly legislation.

Being a committee member involves monthly Zoom meetings to discuss and strategize on current issues. Activities can include vetting candidates and making recommendations about endorsement to the Crossroads Group Executive Committee, and then on to the Michigan Chapter for final consideration. If an endorsement is completed, the committee works on strategies to help endorsed candidates get elected. Committee members are also encouraged to attend lobby days organized by the Michigan Chapter.

Outings Committee of The Crossroads Group.

The focus of the Outings Committee is to fulfill the first two parts of the Sierra Club motto- *Explore, Enjoy and Protect the Planet*- in hopes that it will encourage the third part as well.

Our team plans and leads a variety of outings such as hikes, bike rides, boating trips and service events. We usually meet by Zoom but occasionally in person to plan outings. We typically hold two or more outings per month. At every outing, we need at least two leaders - one to lead, and one to sweep.

Members of the committee lead the outings by taking charge of the logistics, welcoming all participants and providing a bit of Crossroads background. For people who don't feel comfortable leading the outings, we can always use "sweepers" - people who stay at the back to help out.

Other Ways to Get Involved in the Crossroads Group

In addition to the above committees, there are other opportunities to find a home with Crossroads. We have a membership committee, a program committee and a newsletter team that may be of interest to you. Many people join our leadership team without becoming part of a committee.
