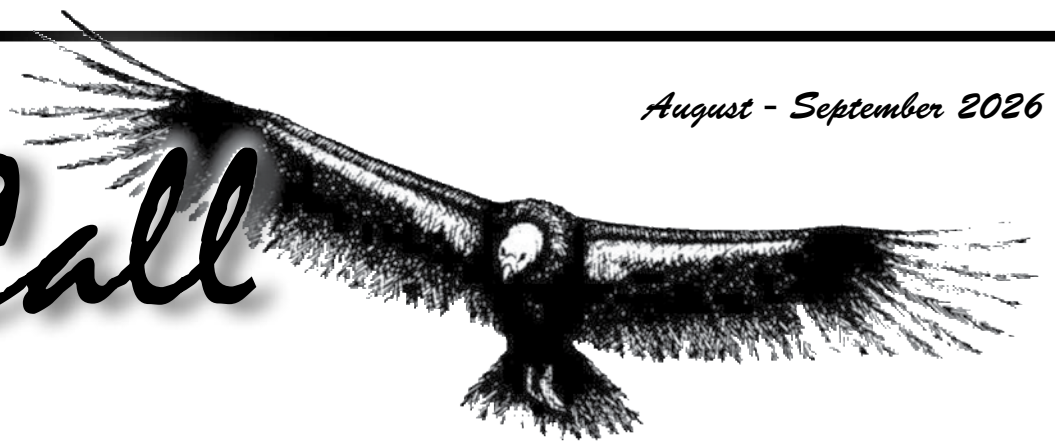

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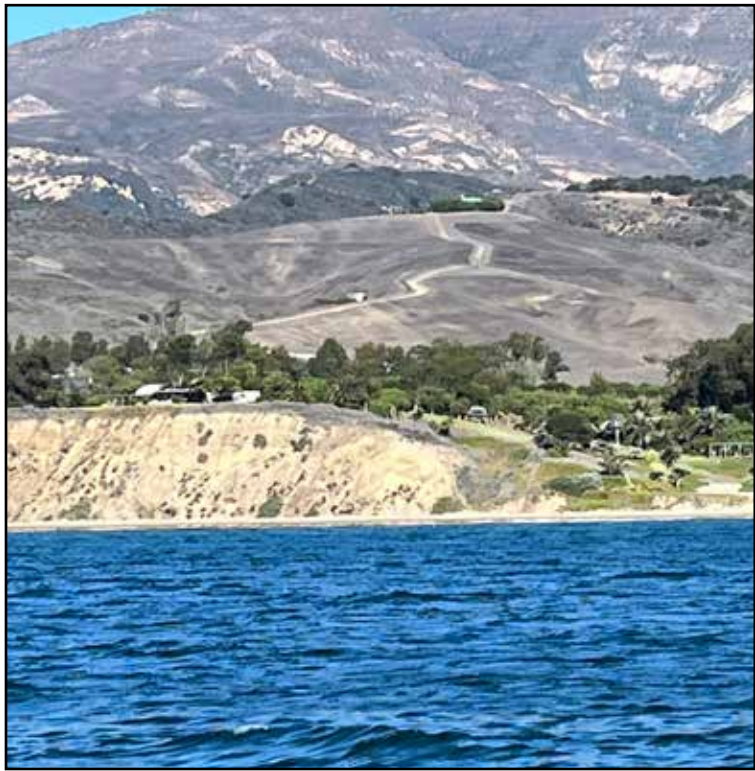

## Fight for our coast!

Last month, the Surfrider Foundation warned us that the federal government had launched a review of California's coastal management program with the likely end goal of eliminating California's authority to push back on destructive offshore drilling and other federally regulated projects along our coast.

California's coastal magnificence and economic success aren't an accident, but the result of hard-won protections built, defended, and won over decades. We're not about to give those protections up now.

The review comment period has opened. Join us in fighting for California's right to protect our coast on Aug 10-12, see deadlines below.

On June 26, NOAA published a Federal Register notice formally kicking off the public input phase of its Section 312 performance evaluation. The notice confirms what we flagged last month: NOAA is soliciting feedback specifically on California's review of spaceport infrastructure, offshore oil production, pipeline maintenance, desalination projects, and undersea cables.

If NOAA finds California out of compliance, the consequences are real. Most importantly, a hostile review is the predicate for challenging California's federal consistency authority – the tool that stopped the Trestles toll road, that lets California object to offshore drilling in federal waters, and that requires federal infrastructure projects to account for coastal impacts before breaking ground.

Additionally, the Secretary of Commerce can suspend federal financial assistance to the Coastal Commission, the State Coastal Conservancy, and the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission. These suspensions would last a minimum of six months

and can run as long as 36.

The meeting will be recorded, and a transcript will be available by emailing the address above.

### What to say:

If you live, work, surf, fish, or simply love the California coast, NOAA needs to hear from you directly. Tell them what California's coastal protections mean to your community. Point to the track record: a program that has concurred with most federal projects it reviews, while still catching the rare ones that pose real harm.

Remind them that this review follows directly on the heels of a 2024 evaluation that found California's program working exactly as intended.

### East Beach pollution abated!

Who knew that pollution was wending its way to the ocean off the popular East Beach for years?

A man named Tevin Schmitt knew after he started testing the waters, along with Jesse Swanhuysen, an attorney with Sycamore Law, Inc., who specializes in Clean Water Act cases. Tevin is also a Watershed Scientist at the Wishtoyo Foundation.

Tevin then approached Emily Engle of our club's Santa Barbara Group, who was very enthusiastic about the Sierra Club taking on the case, especially since her 11-year-old daughter Willow was adamant that we protect East Beach!

Member Deborah Williams also got involved and agreed to work closely with Swanhuysen on behalf of the Club, while member Katie Davis agreed to lead the liaison efforts with State and National Sierra Club attorneys.

"This is a great grassroots and collaboration story. It is what makes our club so powerful," commented Maureen Ellenberger, chair of the Santa Barbara-Ventura Sierra Club.

"The Sierra Club was concerned that the pollution was having adverse impacts on the environment, and so we decided to reach out and take action," said Engel, chair of Sierra Club's Santa Barbara Group.

It didn't happen overnight be-

cause water testing was happening for three years. When satisfied, attorney Swanhuysen and the Sierra Club used the Clean Water Act of 1972 to stop pollution at those sources through legal action and finally productive settlement talks.

The runoff accumulated not only bacteria but also metals — such as copper and aluminum—and other substances that can be detrimental to the health of humans and animals, notably a resident pod of coastal bottlenose dolphins off East Beach's shores.

The sources of stormwater flowing to the ocean were from MarBorg Industries, Lash Construction, and Kenny Construction, located on Santa Barbara's east side.

A responsive settlement was reached as a result of intense media-

tion efforts following a year of negotiations. Our Sierra Club and the three companies developed a plan to reduce bacteria and other forms of water contamination at East Beach.

In a joint statement, the club and the three companies announced they worked together to develop a better stormwater management plan. It also includes steps to reduce polluted runoff and increase water quality monitoring.

The agreements follow more than a year of negotiations stemming from water sampling conducted by the Sierra Club.

"Sierra Club will continue to monitor for metals and other pollutants that impact ecosystems and public health," said Williams, a Sierra Club leader who is also a lecturer in UC Santa Barbara's Environmental Studies program. She also emphasized that the three companies were willing to work toward solutions.

The agreement also includes \$95,000 funding to support Heal the Ocean's local water quality initiatives and oversight to ensure the agreements are followed.

Other measures include the companies upgrading stormwater management, installing berms and filters, and ensuring liquid waste goes into the city's sewer system for treatment.

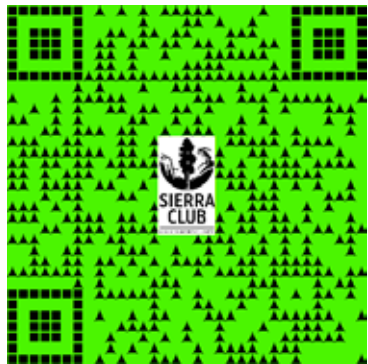
tion. I think it would be amazing to see folks on multiple beaches across Ventura and Santa Barbara and even at our lakes and rivers.

# Developer wants housing on Carpinteria bluffs!

The so-called “Farm Project” is a 27-acre housing development that envisions building 191 total dwelling units, comprising 94 townhomes and 97 single-family dwellings on a section of the Carpinteria bluffs that would include the existing Tee Time golf driving range.

If the April public meeting is any indication, along with internet and newspaper comments, the residents are strongly opposed to it.

“There is something of a divine mandate to keep this land undeveloped — this is the soul of Carpinteria,” said the landscape artist Arturo Tello, a member of the Citizens for the Carpinteria Bluffs who has fought to protect the bluffs for decades.

“I’ve been in love with the Carpinteria Bluffs for [more than] 40 years,” he said, adding, “There have been many proposals here, and of all the proposals, this is the very worst one — it’s the most dense.”

On the other side was the development team, led by Paul Brenneke who bought the land for \$15 million, and has since invested additional funds into the planning process. The developer envisions four acres of open space, recreational trails and habitat restoration.

A comment period was already held from June 11 to July 10, which would be part of an Environmental Impact Report.

Residents have seen this ‘movie’ before, with campaigns to “Save the Bluffs” beginning in the ’70s. The community acquired the Carpinteria Bluffs Nature Preserve in the 1990s. The community also saved the Carpinteria salt marsh, now part of UC-Santa Barbara’s purview.

The developer would include three distinct common spaces: a Passive Park, Demonstration Garden, and the Play Park. In any case, details and updates are located here:

# Town hall embraces roadless warriors

Los Padres ForestWatch and regional partners -- including the Sierra Club -- invite the public to learn what proposed changes to the Roadless Rule could mean for public lands across California's Central Coast, notably the Los Padres and Angeles National Forests

A public town hall is set for Wednesday, Aug. 26 at Dos Vientos Community Center, 4801 Borchard Rd., Newbury Park from 6-8:30pm. Details here:

For 25 years, the Roadless Rule has protected millions of acres of national forest lands from new road construction, large-scale logging, and mining. The rule currently safeguards more than 635,000 acres within and surrounding Los Padres National Forest, helping to preserve wildlife habitat, clean drinking water, and recreation opportunities throughout the region.

The Trump Administration is proposing to roll back those protections while dramatically limiting public participation in the process. Organizers say the U.S. Forest Service is expected to open a short public comment period—potentially as brief as 15 or 30 days—without holding a single public hearing.

"This is one of the most important forest conservation protections in the country," said Jeff Kuyper, Executive Director of Los Padres ForestWatch. "The Roadless Rule exists because millions of Americans demanded protections for backcountry forests. The public deserves transparency, public hearings, and a meaningful opportunity to participate."

Hosted by Los Padres ForestWatch in partnership with Sierra Club, others include Concerned Off-Road Bicyclists Association (CORBA), National Park Conservation Assn., Conejo Climate Action, CalWild, and The Wilderness Society.

The event is part of a broader series of community meetings held across California's Central Coast. Previous meetings have already taken place in Ventura, Ojai, Santa Barbara, and San Luis Obispo.

First adopted in 2001 following more than 600 public hearings and 1.6 million public comments—the largest public response to a federal rule in U.S. history at the time—the Roadless Rule continues to receive broad bipartisan support. A 2019 na-

tional poll found that 75 percent of Americans supported maintaining its protections.

The rule does not prevent public access. Despite the name, roadless areas already contain existing roads and recreation infrastructure, including 349 miles of designated roads and motorized and non-motorized trails within Los Padres National Forest alone.

"The Roadless Rule simply prevents new permanent roads and the most intensive forms of logging in some of our most intact backcountry landscapes. Recreation, trail access, and wildfire mitigation projects are already happening in these areas," noted Ben Pitterle of ForestWatch.

"The issue isn't a lack of roads," Pitterle added. "It's that we're struggling to maintain the roads and trails we already have," such as a nationwide road maintenance backlog exceeding \$5.6 billion.

Attendees will hear from conservation advocates and organizers about what the proposed rollback could mean for forests, wildlife, watersheds, and recreation access across the Central Coast, as well as ways community members can engage once the public comment process begins.

# The hoax folks are losing

*Editor's note: During the Trump administration, U.S. solar energy policy saw a sharp reversal from the Biden-era push for renewable expansion, with multiple legislative, regulatory, and administrative actions aimed at slowing solar and wind project development.*

On his first day in office, Trump paused new leasing and permitting of wind energy projects on federal lands and waters pending a federal review. Within six months, the so-called "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" was passed, which ended subsidies for wind and solar energy projects years earlier than planned.

Yet the President who believes that climate change is a 'hoax' is losing. We are winning; take a walk on the clean power side:

~ More than 90% of new power being installed worldwide is solar power. Millions of people are getting electricity for the first time, thanks to the sun. It's now the fastest-growing energy source in the world.

ever could.

~ Clean energy jobs grew more than three times faster than the rest of the U.S. economy in 2024, adding almost 100,000 new jobs and bringing the total number of clean energy workers in the U.S. to at least 3.56 million in 2026.

~ Putting solar panels on your roof is one of the best things you can do for your health and your family's future. Places that get most of their power from solar energy report fewer asthma attacks, clearer skies, and quieter neighborhoods.

~ The number of Americans working in clean energy-related occupations today now exceeds the number of jobs in oil, gas, and coal by more than three to one.

# Our underwater preserve is home to spectacular sea life

*Editor's note: This column about the Channel Islands National Park -- surrounded by the Pacific Ocean -- was printed in Condor Call on January 28, 2010! We decided to reprint it, as is, to emphasize its history and value to our home, and to ward off any onerous actions by the federal government.*

Greetings, friends

We often look out across the Santa Barbara Channel and see portions of the five islands which make up the well-known Channel Islands National Park. But less well known and just as interesting are the waters surrounding the park.



Whales are just some of the largest denizens of the deep off our shores; other species are small and some miniscule. And did you know the Channel Islands and ocean are considered a Whale Heritage site, one of only a handful worldwide. (Photo contributed)

These waters make up the federally protected Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary. This underwater preserve was created in 1980 and is rich with some of the most spectacular sea life found on our planet. The protected zone of the sanctuary extends for six nautical miles around each of the five park islands...for a total of 1400 square miles.

The autumn season offshore brings large pods of blue whales, the largest mammal ever to inhabit our planet. Scores of jellyfish, dolphins, numerous sea lions, seals, including the largest breeding colony of the massive elephant seals in the Pacific Ocean, as well as over 60 species of seabirds. And the vast kelp beds are

teeming with fish life.

Spend some time boating, kayaking, diving or general wildlife viewing and you will be amazed at the biological richness of this area.

History abounds in the sanctuary waters...famous shipwrecks such as the "Winfield Scott" and the Panama-bound mail freighter "Cuba" are found in the rocky outcroppings near the islands.

Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary is a world-renowned research site for studying undersea life. Scientists come from around the world to study in the sanctuary. These waters are one of the favorite places that Jean-Michel Cousteau (who heads up the Cousteau Society) likes to visit and explore. The sanctuary has been featured in Cousteau Society, National Geographic Society, and Discovery Channel films.

In addition to exploring the sanctuary waters above and below the surface, the Sanctuary has a visitor center in the Santa Barbara Harbor and one in the Channel Islands Harbor in Oxnard. Great places to start and plan your visit to the sanctuary.

The marine world of the Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary makes for an ideal day of boating and exploring in an area which is truly unique to our region.

Your public lands ... enjoy and protect them.

# Grizzlies in trouble

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) just proposed weakening Endangered Species Act protections for grizzlies in the Lower 48 by revising the rules that regulate when these bears can be killed, injured, or harassed.

The agency wants to create new, vaguely explained processes involving "Memoranda of Understanding" and "Technical Letters of Assistance" to lift restrictions on killing grizzlies and shift important decisions to states.

According to the internet, there are no grizzly bears in Santa Barbara or Ventura now (since 1926), and while the region has high-quality habitat, reintroduction is hypothetical.

However, in 2016, the California Grizzly Research Network was established at UCSB, and the feasibility study builds on the multidisciplinary work begun by a visionary network of environmental pioneers.

Despite lacking transparency and defined guardrails, these new processes will be used to hand over decisions about lethal removals to states, exempt killing that occurs from the trapping of other species, and lift restrictions on mortality and injury that occurs incidentally during activities not targeting the bears themselves.

Send a comment by August 17 to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service telling them to keep grizzly bear protections strong and stop any weakening of safeguards for these iconic bears.

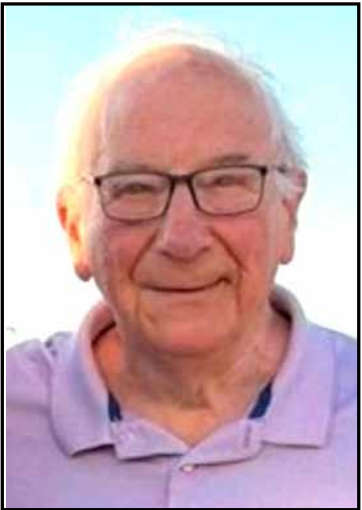

Condors plucked from extinction

In one of the most fascinating and controversial endangered species stories, the last 22 wild California Condors were literally plucked from the Santa Barbara-Ventura wilds in 1987 and sent to zoos for breeding.

And now look at them, literally 600 or more, from their home at Fillmore's Hopper Mountain or the Bitter Creek National Wildlife Refuge and elsewhere where they've been released, like Arizona, Oregon and the Grand Canyon.

"The idea that a bird once declared functionally extinct in the wild is now gliding again over the canyons of California feels almost unreal. For years, the California condor existed more as a cautionary tale than a living creature, a symbol of how badly humans could damage the natural world," noted the Animals Around the Globe website.

"Yet today, this giant scavenger . . . is reshaping how conservationists think about saving other species on the brink," it concluded.

Enter Debbie Parisi and Friends of the Condor Wild and Free (since 2009), all volunteers. Parisi gave a stimulating, illustrative talk to the Sierra Club's Ventura Network monthly event, which features speakers about our environment.

The Friends also conducted an environmental event on June 13 at Fillmore's Sheills Park, which featured their booth along with the Hopper Mountain National Wildlife System, our own Sierra Club and even Bat Rescue!

Parisi's been with the condors since 2009, and she told the Sierra Club audience that "They are so cool. They are such great parents, taking care of their chicks," with both the male and female sitting on the eggs.

She got involved when a friend at the L.A. Zoo told her about condors. "I thought, how could we make such a majestic bird go extinct? So, I had to do something about it."

The first successful breeding pair was in 1988, and the female is still alive in the breeding program. "We're dependent on the capture breeding program. We're losing more birds than we can raise them in the wild."

Despite its success, "There are more birds and fewer people, unfortunately," Parisi said. "Since 2008 we've doubled how many birds we have in the wild, but Fish and Wildlife staff was cut by half."

The California Condor stands 3 to 3.5 feet, has a wingspan of 9 to 9.5 feet, weighs between 17 and 25 pounds, and has a lifespan of 60

**California Condors**  
*Path from Egg to Adult*

- 1. Courtship**  
The new year brings courtship displays in both established mated pairs and condors searching for a mate. For their display, typically the male condor will partially extend his wings, bow his head, and rock side to side. Mated pairs will also perform synchronized "pair flying."
- 2. Egg Stage**  
Condors nest in caves or redwood tree cavities and do not build nests like many other raptors. Pairs alternate incubating a single egg which hatches 54-58 days after the egg is laid.
- 3. Chick Rearing**  
Condor parents share chick feeding and brooding (warming) duties equally. Chicks are fed partially digested food from the adult's crop, the throat storage sack.
- 4. First Flight**  
Chicks fledge (take their first flight) from their nests when they are about six months old. Fledglings are the size of adult condors, but they have black heads. They spend the next year with their parents learning important life skills: how to find food, where to roost at night, and how to be a part of the condor flock.
- 5. Maturity**  
Year 1-3, Year 4, Year 5, Year 6

years. They have been around for 40,000 years. A condor skeleton 35,000 years old was found in La Brea Tar Pits and beyond the West Coast.

One bird named Topa Topa from Ojai has fathered 39 birds, and there are over 300 in his family. "So, he's really important to us, and he celebrated his 60<sup>th</sup> birthday this year," Parisi said.

They nest in caves and tree hollows. They can fly up to 15,000 feet and reach a speed of 55 mph. Males dance for the females.

They only eat carrion, and they wash up afterward, Parisi said. "In the Grand Canyon, search and rescue found a missing hiker because they followed the condors. So yeah, if it's dead they will eat it."

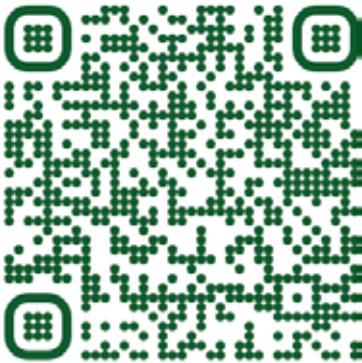

It started 4-5 years ago, with a single Canadian Goose, standing alone in the scruffy grass on the shore of the Pacific Ocean, opposite the Andre Clark Bird Refuge in Santa Barbara.

He or she parked there, alone for more than a year, when another Canadian Goose happened along, (I never saw the other one), but they met and mated in the quiet of the night, and re-appeared as a couple, across the street, on the shore of the Bird Refuge lake, in a narrow strip of six feet or so, between the lake's edge and the popular walkway of the park.

She laid nine eggs; the couple brought the chicks to maturity. As they were parked at the lake's edge, when threatened by people or dogs, the family would slip into the water and swim away. After many months of living on the popular lake, the young learned to fly, and the family migrated North.

Next Spring, the family reappeared at the lake's edge, near the parking lot at sundown. I happened to be down there, walking my dogs at the back of the lake, when I heard the melodious honking of the geese. Upon investigation, I found each goose lined up at the lake's edge, singing their hearts out, celebrating their successful return!!

The parents took up residence near their previous site and raised another family of seven. Congestion this summer was beginning to tell, Geese of the previous summer were aggressively defending the family space from people, dogs and bicycles, and with the approach of winter, the group again flew North.

The next Spring, I was personally anxious for them to appear again. With the growing size of their family, there was little space for

them around the lake. A few members of the family appeared at the parking lot, again. We never saw the entire family.

Eventually, that Summer (2025), I walked the dogs down to the edge of Lake Cachuma, and, lo and behold, I broke into tears at the sight of approximately 20 Canadian Geese, happily resting in the ripples of Lake Cachuma.

A great new home for a brave and intelligent bird!

# Harmon Canyon scores \$1.2 grant

There's a lot happening at the Ventura Land Trust, topped off by a \$1.225 million grant from the Wildlife Conservation Board to restore habitat at Harmon Canyon Preserve.

The project, named "Beans to Biodiversity," will restore areas previously disturbed by decades of lima bean farming, which displaced native vegetation and allowed invasive plants to spread.

It also includes removing tamarisk (*Tamarix ramosissima*),

a highly invasive, water-intensive plant that threatens riparian ecosystems.

Harmon Canyon Preserve contains the headwaters of the last tributary to the Santa Clara River. By removing tamarisk from upper Harmon Creek through comprehensive surveys and multi-year treatments, we have a unique opportunity to eradicate this invasive species before it spreads downstream, protecting both the tributary and the Santa Clara River.

The Trust is also making progress toward lasting public access at Ventura Hills. Earlier this year, Chevron and Aera Energy (California Resources Corporation) filed a lawsuit challenging the Trust's use of Hall Canyon Road to access the new Ventura Hills Nature Preserve trailhead and parking lot.

The companies sought court orders that would have effectively closed the preserve to the public, but both their

request for a temporary restraining order and a preliminary injunction was denied.

Since then, Ventura Land Trust has continued working with Aera, Chevron, the City of Ventura, and legal counsel to ensure safe public access while pursuing a

long-term solution. The parties are currently exploring the creation of a designated pedestrian corridor along the northwestern side of lower Hall Canyon Road as an alternative to continued litigation.

The Trust remains committed to negotiating in good faith to secure safe, reliable, and lasting public access to Ventura Hills Nature Preserve. The public has shown support and patience as discussions progress.

## House power grab wipes out local authority over Sable oil

"In a power grab corrupt and odious . . . the House of Representatives has approved a measure to wipe out all state, local and other legal authority over Sable Offshore oil company's operations in Santa Barbara County," reports News-makers, a local "all-star panel of top local journalists."

The Independent's Nick Welch said, "The amendment language would make such authorization irrevocable and irreversible, no matter how various state and federal courts, now deliberating over various legal controversies surrounding Sable's production plan and jurisdictional supremacy, might rule."

In another plus for the rogue Sable, the hearing board of the Santa Barbara County's Air Pollution Control District unanimously granted a 90-day variance to Sable Offshore Corp. on July 17, which exempts the oil company from meeting various air pollution regulations on its platform near the Gaviota Coast.

"None of these criteria received independent scrutiny," challenged Maureen Ellenberger, who chairs the Sierra Club's Santa Barbara-Ventura chapter. "The findings simply repeat Sable's claims, word for word. The board should not be a rubber stamp."

Sable exceeded the volume of unplanned flaring in May and argued that it was out of its control.

The decision allows the oil company to continue pumping oil at its Santa Ynez Unit despite exceeding environmental regulations. Plus, as above, it has the backing of the Trump Administration.

But it has come under intense opposition from local environmental groups since operations off Santa Barbara's Gaviota Coast began four months ago, including the pipeline that caused the 2015 Refugio oil spill.

Since restarting without full permission, Sable has been involved in a slew of legal battles at the county and state level, with involvement from groups including the Sierra Club and the Environmental Defense Center.

Our elected officials covering Santa Barbara and Ventura counties are in the thick of things, obviously oil and gas by Assembly member Gregg Hart for AB 2461 "Holding Polluters Accountable for Cleanup Costs and AB 1448 "Protecting Coastal Lands from Oil and Gas Development."

Assembly member Steve Bennett has introduced AB 1986, "Establishing Home Hardening Premium Insurance Quotes." In fact, Bennett told the public in an event Feb. 21 at the Ventura Museum touting AB 1986, calling it "the most comprehensive wildfire-prevention package in California's state history, notably with a "home hardening certification program" among other companion bills: AB 1934, AB 1960, AB 1964, and AB 1971.

"For Sierra Club California, this next phase will require both offense and defense: advocating on priority support bills, while continuing to oppose bills that would roll back climate, clean air, water, coastal, and environmental review protections," wrote Miguel Miguel of Sierra Club California.

At a time when so much divides us, public lands are shared by all of us – they are our true common ground.

These places are some of America's most popular areas for exploring nature while conserving landscapes, cultural areas, clean water, and wildlife for the future.

So this year, while the Trump Administration is funneling the entry fees Americans pay to National Parks to his pet projects in Washington, DC, trying to sell off public lands, and attempting to erase parts of our history, let's get back to what makes us *us*: spending time in the public lands we cherish with people we care about.

The Bureau of Land Management, the National Park Service, and Fish and Wildlife Ser-

vice launched five 60-day public comment periods (through August 14) to gather feedback on federal wilderness policies, including Wilderness Areas, Wilderness Study Areas, recommended wilderness, and lands with wilderness characteristics.

The Trump administration isn't just trying to sell our public lands, but it's also giving away what's underneath them.

The Administration recently announced a renewed effort to strip the public's voice out of the oil and gas leasing process and make it cheaper and easier for oil and gas companies to acquire our public resources.

This new rule will eliminate scoping and public comment on oil and gas leases, reduce bonding to levels set in the 1960s, and eliminate leasing preference criteria (like competing uses, wild-

life value, or cultural resources).

This involves millions of acres, and here's just one that affects our region:

The Bureau of Land Management has approved new oil and gas management plans that reopen almost a million acres to oil and gas leasing—including lands in Fresno, Kern, Kings, Madera, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Tulare, Ventura, and surrounding counties.

This move prioritizes short-term extraction & pollution over California's climate goals, public health, and the long-term stewardship of some of our most treasured public lands.

The Sierra Club is currently in talks with coalition partners to determine next steps, including litigation and creative ways to amplify this with public officials.
