

Permitting Restoration Projects in the Bay

- Frequently time consuming, costly, and complex, which impacts project schedules and budgets.
- Sea level rise creates need to restore tidal wetlands at an accelerated pace and scale.



Creating the BRRIT

Purpose is "to improve the permitting process for multi-benefit habitat restoration projects and associated flood management and public access infrastructure.."



















Funding the BRRIT ~ \$1.2m/year

What has the BRRIT done so far?

- BRRIT has 18 priority projects, has permitted 4 projects, is close to permitting 1 other project, and has 10 projects in the active preapplication consultation phase.
 - Projects that were already at a permitting phase in 2019 did not have benefit of pre-application discussions with the BRRIT and had permitting challenges.
 - Permitting challenges to date have provided for learning lessons that will benefit future projects.

What We've Learned So Far

- BRRIT encountered challenges to rapidly permitting a complex project without the benefit of a preapplication phase. Moving forward, the BRRIT expects to be most useful when it can engage with applicants during the pre-application phase.
- Recognition of ongoing challenges for the restoration community. BRRIT is open to receiving feedback from applicants after pre-application meetings
- BRRIT members now provide a unified, coordinated comment letter to project applicants after the preapplication meetings.



The Policy & Management Committee (PMC)

- Developed the Permit and Policy Improvement List - issues identified as limiting the flexibility of design and/or permitting of multi-benefit restoration projects - and are working to resolve the identified issues.
- Review substantive issues raised by the BRRIT or others in project specific cases and propose resolutions at a management or policy level where appropriate.
- Manage the financial agreements needed to support BRRIT staff.



How to get on the BRRIT Project List?

- Sign up for the SFBRA email list! SFBRA staff asks for project submissions approximately two times per year via email.
- Projects must qualify for funding under the SFBRA's definition of multi-benefit wetland restoration projects and their associated flood management and public access infrastructure features.
- A project does not have to be receiving SFBRA funding.
- Projects need to be in EcoAtlas or added to EcoAtlas.
- SFBRA staff determines Measure AA eligibility and adds projects to the BRRIT's list.



What You Can Expect from BRRIT

- Pre-application meetings with the BRRIT team.
- Coordinated questions and comments in writing from all the agencies on your project design and suggestions for permitting pathways.
- Feedback while your project is in the planning and design phase.
- Site visits as a team (impacted by Covid).
- Prioritized, coordinated review of your permit applications.
- BRRIT may elevate issues to the PMC as needed.



What BRRIT Expects from You

- Engagement in the pre-application process.
- Sufficient information describing the current conceptual approach to your project.
- As much detail on the project as possible in writing as the project develops.
- Identification of how agency feedback was incorporated or explanations if it wasn't.
- Complete applications, all required attachments, and permit fees.
- A mutual understanding that permits will be issued in a timely manner if adequate time has been invested in the pre-application phase resolving issues that the agencies have identified.










Disadvantaged Communities Criterion
