Sierrans opt for nature on Black Friday, joining national movement

In sharp contrast to the hustle and bustle of the traditional day-after-Thanksgiving shopping spree, a group of Sierrans opted for a mellow Black Friday hike in Jacksonville's Tillie Fowler Regional Forest.

"This was the third year we've done it," said Bill Armstrong, the Sierra group's outings chair.

About 19 people attended. Other Jacksonville conservation-

focused organizations were outside as well, enjoying a picture-perfect day and a feel-good antidote to the start of the shopping season.

Black Friday hikes were started three years ago by the outdoors chain REI with the hashtag #optoutside,

In contrast to most to businesses, REI stores were closed and employees were paid for their time enjoying nature.

Our values show in final tallies from election

The mid-term elections showed a clear and positive trend for the environmental issues that represent the Sierra Club's core values.

Although the U.S. Senate and Florida governor posts were won by candidates not known for their environmental concern, one significant constitutional amendment—the ban on offshore oil drilling—passed overwhelmingly.

Environmentally aware candidates whom we endorsed did win the state agricultural commissioner's race as well as local offices in St. Augustine and in Jacksonville Beach.

Keep in mind that our club does not make endorsements based on political party. Our election recommendations and endorsements center on the people and issues we think will work towards protecting the environment.

Our Sierra volunteers put in time, money, and work to elect people who will stand up for the environment. We won some and we lost some. We set a good, positive precedent for our cause.

Next up, Tallahassee

The state legislative session starts March 3 and we will have a presence there.

Before the session begins, however, club representatives will

Getting to know the ExCom candidates

The annual election for group's executive committee is this month.

The committee, which functions as the board of directors, meets monthly and handles all of the policy and governance aspects the group.

Three candidates have said they will serve on the committee. Here are brief biographies of each.

John Pilecki

Dec. 21.

John T. Pilecki is an organizer and participant in the North Florida environmental movement. He lives in Vilano Beach and is active in Sierra Club efforts centered in the St. Johns County area. He is a former English and special education teacher in Quakertown, Penn. In 2013, five years after he retired, John and his wife, Laura, moved to Vilano. John founded the Democratic Environmental Caucus of St. Johns County in 2017 which works to promote climate issues in the political arena.

Barbara Gubbin

Barbara Gubbin has been a member of the Sierra Club for many years—her membership card says 1990—but she became active before that when she lived in Houston, Texas, in the mid-1980s. The Sierra Club has educated her on environmental issues and given her the opportunity

to speak up about the environment; on the local level she has always enjoyed hiking, exploring, and getting to know people with similar interests. Earlier this year Barbara went to Tallahassee to lobby the legislature on environmental issues. She helped research and interview two candidates for Sierra Club endorsements and was glad to see both were elected! Beyond hiking, Barbara looks forward to being an advocate for environmental issues on the local, state and national levels

Robert Blade

Robert Blade is the current newsletter editor of our group's monthly newsletter, the Sierra Sentry. For the first half of his working life, Robert was a reporter, editor, and columnist for newspapers in Quincy, Mass; in Lima. Ohio: and in Jacksonville at the Florida Times-Union. For the second half of his working life, he taught journalism, communications, and English at Florida State College at Jacksonville. He retired in 2012. Hadrian's Wall was a defensive fortification in the Roman province of Britannia. It was started in A.D. 122 in the reign of Emperor Hadrian and was the northern limit of the Roman Empire. It is a UNESCO World Heritage site. The program will be held in the Clubhouse of the Ocean Grove Condominiums at 1, Arbor Club Drive, Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida, 32082. - Monday, Jan. 14, at Lakewood Presbyterian Church, Jacksonville: 6:30 p.m. to socialize; the meeting starts at 7 p.m. Dr. Jim Moore will speak on "Wild Plants: a Fresh Perspective." Moore, a former physician who has concentrated on urban biology since 2015, will focus on wild plants and ways to integrate them into our lives. This will be an interactive program with microscopes and live specimens. There will be a seed dispersal at the end.

Naturalist program

meet with the area's legislators to help them understand the importance of environmental issues. We call this process "legislative advocacy" because it is educational and collaborative with our legislators. Later, during the session, we will lobby for or against specific bills.

Right now, we need volunteers to go with us to visit the legislators in January and February. Of course we, as the Sierra Club, represent significant significant blocs of voters in their respective districts, but it really helps get their attention when we have a constituent with our advocacy team. If you are available during the day please let us know. Training will be provided ahead of time on the process, issues and talking points. If you are good at scheduling, we could use help in setting up our appointments with the legislators.
