Word from Chair

The Sierra Club has long recognized population issues, but for many years now the Club has pushed population to the back burner. The Lone Star Chapter and Alamo Groups do not have population committees or contacts monitoring the issue. Texas is experiencing unprecedented population growth. The US is expected to double population in this century. The tumultuous history of the Sierra Club population policy indicates how infighting and political sensitivities have almost eliminated the Club's attention to this key component of environmental deterioration.

Early on the Sierra Club recognized both the key role population plays in environmental degradation and the need for population stabilization in the US and around the world. The first strong policy was adopted in 1965. But just one year later the policy was overturned. With the rise of the Environmental Movement and the sweeping national environmental legislation, the Sierra Club was able to reinstate a strong population policy, for zero population growth, and maintain it from 1970 to 1996. As US population soared, an immigration position was included and updated in 1989 to state that "Immigration to the U.S. should be no greater than that which will permit achievement of population stabilization in the U.S." In 1996, the Club Board reversed the policy, stating "Sierra Club, its entities, and those speaking in its name, will take no position on immigration levels or on policies governing immigration into the United States." Some members have tried since then to restore the policy. The dispute has come to a head several times in board elections, referendums on policy, and efforts to restrict policy referendums. The Club tried to calm the division by vowing to address the root causes that impel populations to migrate.

The arguments on both sides of the debate proliferated around the highly charged 2004 Sierra Club Board elections— the last time population rose to such prominence in the Club. Larry Dill, in *New Hope Journal*, presented a heartfelt opinion on both sides of that debate at that is still available online at http://www.newhopejournal.com/sierra.html.

Since immigration issues are now center stage nationally, it is important to know the Club will not take a position on immigration. In 2007 the Club crafted an updated population policy, at http://www.sierraclub.org/policy/conservation/population.pdf, that clearly states this. Internal documents from the review of that update process indicate that the participating leaders are still divided on many points on what to do about population. One comment was "The proposed policy is unobjectionable, and that may be its biggest flaw." The analysis found that "Almost all commenters believe the Sierra Club ought to do far more to address population."

Report from the Conservation Chair

1. Save Texas Parks Campaign

Texas Parks are endangered. Betty Dabney, PhD sent this information.

If you have ever enjoyed visiting one of the 91 Texas state parks, historical sites and natural areas, you may be surprised to learn that they are in danger of losing funding under the current State budget proposal. Texas parks are entitled by law to receive up to 94% of the sales tax revenues from sporting goods, but have never received that amount. In the past few years Texas Parks & Wildlife has received less than a quarter of that amount, and the current budget proposal does not provide enough money for current operating costs. If nothing is done to prevent this action, 20 State Parks may be closed. One of them may be your favorite.

Www.Keeptexasparksopen.com is organizing a series of Town Hall meetings around the state to educate people about the crisis and what we can do to keep our Texas parks open. One of these meetings will be April 29 at 7:00 pm in the SOL Center at University Presbyterian Church. There will be a panel of distinguished speakers. Admission is free and open to all. Please come on April 29th and learn how you can protect Texas parks!

The Conservation Committee needs to get this information out. We have discussed the possibility of having a press conference in the near future. The Committee will discuss ways to approach the Park issue including attending the Keep Texas Parks Open Town Hall meeting.

2. Water Conservation in the face of Climate Change

We will be discussing ways to attack the issue of water shortages and ways to address the shortages created by pollution from various industries including fracking and nuclear energy. We will also consider ways we can partner with other organizations to address the issue.

Transportation

In this day and age of higher gas prices combined with the real threat of CO2 emissions adding to global warming, the Conservation Committee will be looking at ways to promote mass transportation and conservation of our limited resources.

Energy

The Sierra Club must face the challenge of educating the public about sustainable energy. As the Conservation Committee of the Alamo Group, we need to find ways to promote our club's stance on solar, wind, geothermal and other green forms of energy. How we will be working toward educating the public will be another topic this month.
