Several members of the Alamo Group attended two workshops in Austin on November 14 and 15. Barbara McMillin, N.J. Menchaca, and Loretta Van Coppenolle attended the Bullseye Media Training put on by the Sierra Club and other organizations on Friday the 14th. The workshop taught communication strategies for activists as well as use of new media - blogging, social networking sites, and how to make Youtube videos.

Randy Carroll-Bradd, Hector Gonzalez, Dave Klar, N.J. Menchaca, Karen Seal, Loretta Van Coppenolle, and David Wells participated in the Sierra Club's Legislative Workshop that took

COSA Sustainable Community Workshops

The San Antonio Office of Environmental Policy held a series of four workshops October 27 through 30 to, in its own words, "elicit the ideas and best thinking of experts and stakeholders about actions and best practices" to enable the city's Sustainable Development Plan. The plan, announced by Mayor Phil Hardberger last June, will be finalized in January 2009, around the time of the City's State of the City address.

Each workshop had a different slant, though there was overlap. Workshop 1 focused on "Greenonomics:" How to incorporate industrial ecology, green

place on Saturday the 15th. Attendees learned how the legislature works, how to influence it, and what to expect from the coming legislative session that begins in January.

There will be a Citizen Lobby Training session on February 17, 2009, again in Austin, featuring Van Jones. The theme will be "Making Texas a Winner in the Clean Energy Economy." The training will be followed by lobbying and conferencing the next day.

The Texas legislature meets every two years for only 150 days per session.

jobs and education into the city's plan. Workshop 2 had as its focus, "Clean and Efficient Use of Energy and Water," encompassing local government, utilities, agencies, businesses and households. Workshop 3 dealt with "Efficient Access and Mobility:" transportation issues and solutions appropriate for San Antonio. The final workshop, on "Sustainable Building," elicited ideas on how to attain green construction and retrofitting for the private as well as the government sector.

Present at the workshops were two sustainability consultants from California and two from Vermont. Both states are regarded as among the most progressive in the country on issues of sustainability. Workshop participants included members of the public, government, and private sectors with some expertise or interest in issues of sustainability. Five Sierra Club members, Bill Barker, Barbara McMillin, Russell Seal, Loretta Van Coppenolle, and Jane Ward, attended the workshops and gave input.

The ideas that came out of the workshop were many and varied. Most were ideas known to have worked in other communities. Participants urged that the public be kept informed and educated on green initiatives and that there be some system of reward and punishment for businesses that comply or do not comply with city directives. Incentives for compliance were proposed. Enhanced recycling, to include recycling facilities nearby and return-to-manufacturer provisions, was

discussed. A goal of reducing local energy demand by 15 percent by 2015 was proposed. It was urged that the greater San Antonio area be included in sustainability efforts as well as school districts, universities, etc.

A summary of ideas generated by the workshops is available from the Office of Environmental Policy. Those who did not attend the workshop and would like to offer suggestions to the city may do so. I also translated the bylaws, contributed to regular campaign matrix and strategic planning, helped organize the Student Coalition and its training, membership outreach, and social and conservation campaign activities. Ihope to contribute this wealth of experience to the Alamo Group.

Wendell Fuqua

I have been a Sierra Club member for three years, am an avid hiker and backpacker, ride the bus to work every day, drive a Honda Civic, hang out my clothes to dry, and am a strong advocate of the Sierra Club's environmental efforts. She believes that it all boils down to having respect for this planet that we live on and a responsibility to the generations that come after us. If elected, she will support this effort as well as the whole of the Alamo Group of the Sierra Club's agenda.

Sierrans Named to CPS Committee

Randy Carroll-Bradd and Loretta Van Coppenolle were recently named to the newly formed CPS Energy Green Ribbon Committee on Efficiency and Conservation. Carroll-Bradd will represent the CPS Citizens' Advisory Committee and Van Coppenolle the Sierra Club. The committee is composed of about 18 members representing various sectors of the community.

The purpose of the committee, which had its first meeting October 22, is to provide "input to CPS Energy's energy efficiency, demand response and conservation efforts," according to the utility. CPS Energy has publicly committed itself to meeting 60% of peak demand growth through efficiency by 2012 and to reducing electricity demand by 771 MW by 2020.
