# GCSNA Questions Answered at Nov. Meeting

John Koepke of the Government Canyon State Natural Area treated club members to an indepth question and answer session about the area at our monthly meeting Nov. 15 in the Witte Museum. Koepke spent the better part of an hour providing us with information about GCSNA's history, mission, staffing and budget challenges, and long-range plans.

GCSNA is feeling the effects of the current drought. "We've already seen an impact on the insect population, which affects other populations." Koepke said. In particular, he noted the number of monarch butterflies migrating through the area is down over previous years.

Koepke explained that the mission of a state natural area differs from that of a state park. A natural area's top goals are resource protection and public education. The mission of GCSNA is to protect the karst recharge area of the

Edward's Aquifer, he said, and to educate the public about the need to protect this resource. Karst is a porous limestone topography that allows water to percolate down into a fast recharge aquifer, and the quality of the water can be adversely affected by development over the recharge zone.

Government Canyon is one of the nation's largest karst preserves, Koepke said. In addition, he added, GCSNA provides vital habitat protection for the endangered golden cheeked warbler and for a number of "karst invertebrates," meaning cave dwelling bugs and spiders.

GCSNA currently maintains numerous hiking trails, but does not allow overnight camping. "We will see camping in my lifetime," Koepke joked, "but you would be surprised what it takes to put in camping." He went on to describe the difficulty of bal-

ancing the public's desire for camping facilities with GCSNA's mission to protect the natural habitat.

GCSNA's more than 12,000 acres also contains over 100 significant archaeological sites, some of them dating back to the Hill Country's earliest human occupation. "Many of the sites have been heavily looted over the years," Koepke said. He added that the destructive rooting up of the ground by an exploding population of feral hogs now presents a serious threat to the sites.

And, amidst all these requirements to protect the land, endangered species, archaeological sites, and to educate the public, GCSNA, like all state organizations, has suffered budget restrictions. "Our staff has been cut in half," Koepke said, indicating projects like archaeological site analysis, and a new master plan may have to be placed on hold.
