## A Word from the Alamo Group Chair

This year has been quite a roller coaster of never ending conservation campaigns. In 2014, Alamo Group volunteers have educated and advocated on many issues-- water, waste, transit, air quality and climate change, land use planning, development codes, and wildlife preservation.

While we still have much unfinished business, the following are some achievements the Alamo Group contributed to and for which we are thankful.

It still needs some private contributions, but apparently a deal is done that preserves the land adjacent to Bracken Bat Cave owned by Galo Properties, once slated for more than 1,500 homes. See *Property purchase has bats flying free*.

The City of San Antonio appears to be finally moving forward on banning toxic coal tar sealants. For more than two years the Alamo Group has lobbied the City, after a report prepared by Citizen Environmental Advisory Committee Member Steven Kale. We had expected a ruling in December, but City staff has been directed to study a prohibition on coal tar-based asphalt sealants as part of a comprehensive water study for action next spring. When we met with Doug Melnick, the new director of the Office of Sustainability, one concern we expressed was the 2040 Comprehensive Plan's siloed subcommittees and lack of sustainability leadership. The City later announced that the update structure will have an overarching sustainability committee with representation from all the other committees. This is a step in the right direction. We pray experienced, influential sustainability experts will sought out for these appointments.

CPS Energy's initiative to leverage its renewable energy investments and boost the local clean energy economy was just reported to have increased its economic impact by 29% in the last four months, to a total of \$808 million. Because San Antonio's energy utility has this focus, we now receive high levels of recognition for leadership in clean energy and jobs creation, most recently from the Pew Charitable Trust and, on Forbes.com, the Environmental Defense Center. Alamo Sierrans should be proud that, without our energy campaign, CPS Energy would not be in this enviable position of accolades and respect. ### **Building Sustainable Communities One Block at a Time**

The Alamo Sierra Club is recognized by the South San Antonio Independent School District for its \$500 donation to the South San Main Street Project (SSMSt) and Dwight Middle School Learning and Community Garden project. The SSMSt Project partnered-up with Dwight Middle School to build a Learning Garden for the students and Community Garden for the residents of the Quintana Community. The idea originated from the competition by the Texas Public Radio 2012 Lighter! Quicker! Cheaper! Neighborhood Revitalization Project, which the SSMSP was the runner-up.

Co-Founder of the SSMSP Gilbert Morales said the motivation to pursue the gardens arose from the need he saw in the community to become more sustainable and the opportunity to revitalize it. "The Quintana neighborhood has been historically underserved of public green spaces and grocery stores are few and far between," Morales said. "We felt a community garden would accommodate both of these needs."

The learning garden will be part of the Middle School's seventh grade science curriculum teaching students about the advantages of growing local and seasonal fruits and vegetables, and having the opportunity to sell the produce to the community to help sustain it.

Andy Castillo, co-founder of the South San Main Street Project, said projects like this one help create stronger-more educated communities. "The idea is to get the community involved and to educate the students at Dwight Middle School of a healthy way of living," Castillo said. "Small projects like this unite and educate communities of healthier lifestyles, creating neighborhoods its residents can be proud of."



The catalyst that got the project rolling was the Lowe's Toolbox Grant the Middle School received along with the amp support from the community, organizations and public officials, District 5 Councilwoman Shirley Gonzales and District 4 Councilman Rey Saldana. "We are very fortunate and grateful for the Alamo Sierra Club's contribution. The money helped us complete the first phase of the project, which is the foundation," Morales said.


