Word from the Chair

As I write this the first tar balls from BP's (British Petroleum) Gulf blow out are washing ashore. As global environmental disasters go, this massive oil spill may go down as the worst single manmade catastrophe in history. Unlike the bulk of citizens who stand by in silence or ignorance or who elect leaders committed to the evisceration of environmental regulation and oversight that led to this state of affairs, we Sierrans can take a small measure of comfort. We work to contain these threats and knew that it was only a matter of when, not if. the next big fossil fuel disaster would befall us. With the added scrutiny, the unbelievable number of regularly occurring similar, but smaller, cumulative assaults that poison our habitat and our health are revealed.

In Texas we have a once-in-a-decade chance to affect the way our state environmental agency, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality or TCEO, does its business to defend our health and the natural resources we depend upon. The Commission is under 10-year, "sunset" review by lawmakers, who will make recommendations for improvements. The TCEQ too often protects polluters, not the public. Problems have been identified in the Commission's permitting process, enforcement, public participation, and governance. Lone Star Sierrans, in partnership with many allied groups, have organized a "Make Pollution History" campaign to address these issues. We need your help to make our voices heard over the well-funded industry lobbyists that wants to keep TCEQ in their pockets. Have you got time or a story about TCEQ to share? reforms. This summer San Antonio Mayor Julian Castro intends to initiate a year-long, citywide planning summit called "SA 2020." According to the city, this effort will be the first in 25 years to bring together local vision, talent, and expertise to set 10-year goals in infrastructure, arts, education, energy, and all the basic elements needed to build a vibrant community. I urge all of us Sierrans to make time to participate, in order to assure our sustainable visions and ideas dominate all areas of discussion and debate about San Antonio's future. Community Program, which conducts workshops to discuss how communities can become more pedestrian and cycling friendly, promotes safety classes for children, and supports bicycle "rodeos."

The MPO also has a Bicycle Mobility Advisory Committee (BMAC), which provides a map of good bicycle routes in the region and has identified 280 miles of streets that could be striped for bicycle lanes. BMAC encourages implementing agencies to adopt BMAC recommendations when upgrading their streets.

In addition, the MPO is conducting a new study - using small GPS units attached to the bicycles of study participants - to record exactly which streets cyclists use. The results of the study will be provided to San Antonio's bicycle office (yes, there is one).

Kelly is herself a cyclist and an Alamo Sierran, and her enthusiasm for the subject is obvious. She is optimistic about the future of bicycle transportation in San Antonio, but acknowledges that implementation of plans can go forward only if there is "political will." She cites Portland, Oregon, as a city that long ago established a cycling and pedestrian culture.

SAT., JUNE 12: GOVERNMENT CANYON STATE NATURAL AREA BACKCOUNTRY HIKE

This hike will be jointly sponsored and led by the Friends of Government Canyon and the Sierra Club. Join us in learning about the canyon as we walk beautiful trails in the backcountry. We are planning a six-mile walk out the Joe Johnston Route, including the Overlook Trail.

GCSNA is located at 12861 Galm Rd (take FM 1560 west from Helotes to Galm Rd). There is a \$6 entrance fee (\$3 seniors) for those without a State Park Pass. Participants must be 13 or older. No pets please; minors must be accompanied by an adult. Meet at the Visitors Center at 8:00 a.m. for an 8:15 departure.

Difficulty: MODERATE. Bring two liters of water, wear sturdy shoes, and bring small snack for when we stop at the overlook. Call leader Stan Drezek (493-0939) if you require any additional information.

SAT., Aug. 14: Government Canyon State Natural Area Hike

This hike will be jointly sponsored and led by the Friends of Government Canyon and the Sierra Club. Join us in learning about the canyon as we walk beautiful Bluff Spurs Overlook trails of the Backcountry. Assuming it is a hot day, we will just walk the short 3.2 miles covering both overlooks. A great walk to get in before the day really heats up.

GCSNA is located at 12861 Galm Rd (take FM 1560 west from Helotes to Galm Rd). There is a \$6 entrance fee (\$3 seniors) for those without a State Park Pass. Participants must be 13 or older. No pets please; minors must be accompanied by an adult. Meet at the Visitors Center at 7:45 AM for departure by 8:00 a.m. with a planned completion by about 10:30 to truly beat most of the heat.

Difficulty: MODERATE (some steep sections & heat). Bring two liters of water and wear sturdy shoes, hat, and sun-block. Call leader Stan Drezek (493-0939) if you require any additional information.

Aug. 23 - 30 or 31: Grand Tetons and Yellowstone (Northern Rockies Sampler)

At press time, this hike was fully booked, but you can add your name to a waiting list.

This will be a 4-day backpack in The Grand Tetons called Teton Crest plus a 1 or 2 days of hiking in Yellowstone. Teton Crest begins near Jackson Hole (after a tram ride to 10,450 ft) and has an 11 mile stretch from Marion Lake, along the Death Canyon Shelf, over Mt Meek Divide, through Alaska Basin, and up to Hurricane Pass that is one of the best anywhere.

Then, off to Yellowstone for a very long day hike (over 20 miles) called Sky Rim (up in the High Country of the Gallatin Range), a hike along The Black Canyon of the Yellowstone (an all downhill 18 miler along the mighty Yellowstone River the whole way), or Union Falls (a 15.2 mile out and back to one of the best waterfalls in the Park). This trip can be done the other way as well, starting in Yellowstone and then going to the Tetons. All this fun begins August 23rd and lasts 7-8 days. For information contact Scott Wolfe; 724-2707.

SAT., OCT. 23: EXPERIENCE THE BEAUTY: THE NEW MEDINA RIVER GREENWAY (DOG FRIENDLY)

A first time ever walk for the Alamo Group of the Sierra Club. Walk the paved new section of the Medina River Greenway 3.5 miles (7 mile RT) from Applewhite Road to the terminus. Meet 8:30 a.m. in the parking lot just south of the Medina River on the west side of Applewhite Road for an 8:45 SHARP departure. Anticipated completion time of 12:15 p.m.

To get there take Exit 149 (Spur 422/SH 16) off south IH 35. Turn left at light toward Poteet, take left after 5.3 miles onto Lonestar Pass (Spur 66) toward the main gate of the Toyota Plant. At the main gate turn right (south) down Applewhite Road to the parking lot.

Difficulty: MODERATE. Bring one liter water as none is available. Donations to Sierra Club encouraged. Must call leader Stan Drezek (493-0939) to reserve spot. Ellen Clegg will serve as Assistant.

Recycling: Just the Facts

Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run your television for almost three hours.

Recycling all the 100 million cell phones discarded annually would save enough energy to power 194,000 homes a year.

Producing items from recycled plastic uses two-thirds less energy than making plastic items directly from petroleum.

Recycling steel saves 75% of the energy that would be used to create steel from raw materials - enough to power 18 million homes.

Every ton of mixed paper recycled saves the energy equivalent of 185 gallons of gasoline.
