Richard Tangum, Ph.D, UTSA Professor of Architecture and Planning, and Director, Center for Urban & Regional Planning Research, will speak on The Urban Form: Transit, Complete Streets, and Pedestrian Systems at the Witte Museum auditorium, 3801 Broadway, at 6:30 pm. Parking is available at Ave B and Tuleta.

City Planning and the Urban Forum

On Wednesday, November 28, at Lion's Field, 2809 Broadway at Mulberry, at 6:30 pm, the city's Director of Planning and Community Development John Dugan will provide an informal talk on aspects of urban form as a follow up to the November 20 Sierra Club program at the Witte Museum. He has more than 30 years experience leading planning and development functions at local, county, and state agencies, and has a Master's from Harvard University. Free and open to the public.

Climate Change and Texas Drought: October General Meeting

State Climatologist John Nielsen-Gammon ended his presentation to the October general meeting with a tongue-in-cheek musing as to whether climate change was "bad". After all, he reasoned, the mass extinction of species 65 million years ago ultimately led to the ascendancy of mammals with their greater intelligence.

Dr. Nielsen-Gammon spoke to a sizable crowd on the topic of Climate Change and Texas Drought, noting that the year ending September 27, 2011 was the driest in Texas history. On that date, virtually the entire state was drought-stricken, with most of it in the "exceptional" category, the most severe classification. Only 11.5 inches of rain fell, eclipsing the record set in 1956 when ≈14 inches fell.

Wildfires decimated large areas of the state, and reservoir levels were severely lowered. Some have never recovered, with Lake Buchanan still at less than half of capacity. O. H. Ivie Lake near San Angelo was extremely low and, until recently, had less than 9 months of water supply. Lake Meredith hasn't had water since 2010 and the City of Amarillo has given up on it as a water resource. Although the drought is over in East Texas, large areas of the state are still in exceptional drought when measured over the past 24 months.

Twenty-eleven gave us the hottest Texas summer on record, and we barely lost out to Oklahoma for the hottest in US history. The combination of high temperatures and lack of rainfall constituted a huge deviation from norms. Although rainfall was similar to the record drought of the 1950s, temperatures were about 4° higher. As a result, our state suffered agricultural losses of \$7.6 billion, wildfire losses of \$1.5 billion and 301 million trees died.

Dr. Nielsen-Gammon explained that a combination of factors caused the record heat:

- sea surface temperatures,
- global warming to a lesser extent, and
- random weather.

Furthermore, he expects average or below average rainfall this winter and dry conditions into next year. Over the next 3-15 years, he expects an extended period of drought susceptibility because ocean surface temperature patterns are favorable for continued drought.

There are many factors, such as solar variability, volcanic eruptions, and other natural phenomena, that affect climate. While Texas rainfall has increased about 15% over the last century, natural variability will be the primary driver of rainfall for the next few decades.

However, anthropogenic greenhouse gases are becoming the dominant factor driving temperatures. Long-term predictions are for higher temperatures, such that the blistering temperatures of 2011 will become more frequent as time goes on.

Dr. Nielsen-Gammon anticipates the impacts of climate change will include:

- a shift of ecosystems to the east
- greater plant growth if sufficient water and nutrients are available
- more wildfires
- reduced streamflows
- slowly rising sea levels

He characterized reduced streamflows as a "double whammy", since increased populations will further stress riparian ecosystems along with bays and estuaries like Laguna Madre. He thinks societal impacts on Texas will include:

- shifts in agriculture
- increased susceptibility to tropical diseases
- potentially reduced fossil fuel use
- a possibility of fewer, but more powerful hurricanes
- other unknown impacts dependent on El Niño and La Niña

While prescribing no solutions for anthropogenic warming, Dr. Nielsen-Gammon thinks that for any remedy to be acceptable, it must be cost-effective and minimally disruptive to our economy. He thinks environmentalists need to explore ways to make the problem easily solvable.
