# Word from Chair

San Antonio Water System (SAWS) has drafted a new Conservation and Water Management Plan (through 2039) that raises concerns for Alamo Sierrans. Some issues are procedural, others substantive. The Plan was set to go before SAWS' board on Oct. 3, yet there had been inadequate time for stakeholders to comment, and project details were still unavailable for study. Conservation, the program that made SAWS trusted and famous, appears limited, and costly new water projects are proposed. Club water experts, such as Jerry Morrisey, Ken Kramer, George Rice, and others, met with SAWS in September in order for the Alamo Group to craft a position.

SAWS tried to do a good job of justifying the changes; however, Sierrans are not sanguine about them. Kramer explains, "The most problematic of the proposed revisions to the Water Management Plan are the so-called 'regional water supply projects' that would transport ground-water over long distances at probably substantial costs, with potential adverse impacts in their region of origin (including the potential endangered species issues and spring flow impacts of at least one of those projects). Most of these projects are not 'turn-key' operations at this point – they are not necessarily permitted, not all regulatory hurdles have been met, and the costs are not certain. Pursuing one or more of these projects may have major impacts on water rates and certainly undermine the conservation and drought management approach traditionally taken by SAWS." Rice sums it up adding, "We will all pay substantially higher water bills so some can water lawns during droughts".

On conservation, Morrisey notes, "SAWS current efforts may have peaked and will not drive the per capita consumption down much in the future unless there are more effective regulations and sufficient funds for incentives to reduce landscape usage and to continue year round water conservation efforts". We feel that future water rates can be kept lower by expanding conservation. Unfortunately SAWS still allocates less funding for conservation water than for new water, conservation is only voluntary, and many local regulations still promote water waste. SAWS and City and County leaders must take brave steps to enact new measures that will enhance our water conservation toolkit. We especially need methods to insure water-efficient land uses and scapes.

The issue boils down to an environmental justice case—the more affluent use water more freely, and many do not adopt conservation measures, especially water wise landscapes, although they can most afford them. A SAWS study also showed those opposed to drought restrictions tend to be more affluent. All this forces pressure on this vital resource—fewer restrictions, less availability, and higher procurement costs. This leads to sacrifice and resentment that cascades down the rate-payer income scale. Opting for new water fuels more growth, and more conventional, adding to other resources pressures and cost increases.

### State Climatologist to Discuss Drought October 16

On Tuesday, October 16, State Climatologist John Nielsen-Gammon will discuss the present and future impacts of Climate Change on drought in Texas.

In addition to being the State Climatologist, Dr. Nielsen-Gammon is a Regents Professor at Texas A&M University. He has a Ph.D. from Massachusetts Institute of Technology from 1990, an S.M. from Massachusetts Institute of Technology from 1987, and an S.B. from Massachusetts Institute of Technology from 1984.

Dr. Nielsen-Gammon's weather-related work involves jet streams, extreme rainfall events, and land and sea breezes. His air quality research includes field forecasting support, numerical simulation, and diagnostic analysis of ozone events in Houston and Dallas for the Texas Air Quality Studies in 2000 and 2005-6. Dr. Nielsen-Gammon has also worked on drought monitoring and forecasting, air pollution climatology, and improvements to the climate data record. He teaches courses in weather analysis, weather forecasting, climatology, and atmospheric dynamics.

Dr. Nielsen-Gammon received a Presidential Faculty Fellow award (now known as PECASE) from the National Science Foundation and the White House in 1996, a Distinguished Achievement Award in Teaching at Texas A&M University from the Association of Former Students in 1996, and was named a Fellow of the American Meteorological Society (AMS) in 2011. He is Past President of the International Commission for Dynamical Meteorology and is past chair of the AMS Board on Higher Education.

### National Plug-In Day: A First in San Antonio

According to the Plug-In website, over 10,000 folks were introduced to plug-in vehicles on National Plug-In Day held on Sunday, September 23, in over 60 cities across the country. This was the second year of the event and the first for San Antonio, which was held at Wonderland of the Americas mall at Loop 410 and Fredericksburg Road. Nationally, the event was created by Plug-In America, the Sierra Club, and the Electric Auto Association. Locally, the Alamo City Electric Auto Association, ZWheels, IES Solar, and the Alamo Sierra Club put the event together, with substantial help from marketing at Wonderland. It was difficult to count the number of folks who attended overall but our Sierra Club booth had a steady stream of folks asking questions.

It was an exciting day. There was a Chevy Volt to test drive around the mall or on the highway, Madison H.S. students drove their solar designed car-- solar panels on wheels-- and the Green Society at UTSA was actively involved. Tommy Adkisson read Mayor Castro's statement proclaiming September 23 as National Plug-In Day atop a solar stage. Hertz car rental from Austin brought a Nissan Leaf that is part of their program. And to cap things off, Tesla owners brought red Teslas to admire.

There were Food Trucks, music, and booths. CPS Energy highlighted their recharge stations at the mall (there are 12). Clean Cities was there. The Green Society at UTSA had a booth, as well as Madison H.S. students and their teacher. The local organizing groups mentioned above had booths, plus the Hertz car rental with its Nissan Leaf.
