Apartment Recycling June 2008 Progress Report

Recently, one of our members called to ask where she could recycle her plastic, aluminum, and metal items. Like many of us in San Antonio, she does not have access to curbside recycling, as she lives in an apartment. I gave her a couple of options, but I knew neither of these were fully adequate: she could ask a friend who lives in a house if she could place her recyclables in their bin or she could drive to either Vista Fibers (3003 Aniol St, tel: 226-6371) or BFI-ACCO Recycling Center (400 Probandt St., tel: 223-2618). By the way, if you'd like to know exactly where to recycle specific items in San Antonio visit this great site www.earth911.org.

Personally, I collect my recyclables and then drive them to one of these recycling centers a few times a month. Although the City of San Antonio does provide curbside recycling for homeowners, tons of "trash" produced

Political Chair News

Right now is a tough time to be an environmentalist. With the rising cost of gasoline, everything is increasing in price from groceries, to clothing and other necessities. Many laborers are finding it very difficult to balance their budgets when they have jobs at one end of town and quality babysitters at the other. We are at the cusp of a major lifestyle change in the United States. According to Jeremy Rifkin who presented a speech at the CPS Annual Energy Summit, the United States economy was built on cheap energy. The U.S. only has 5% of the world's population but uses 25% of the world's energy. It's a simple equation of supply and demand with other countries beginning to use more energy for their developing economies.

Here in San Antonio, our elected officials are wavering over the idea of drilling offshore and in pristine places such as the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge

despite the fact that new drilling would “not produce oil for more than a decade and would not affect today’s \$4-plus per gallon gasoline price.” (San Antonio Express-News, July 18, 2008.) Office holders who have been supportive of our issues are now feeling the pressure from labor and other organizations to lower the cost of energy at any price to the environment.

We must demand of our politicians a more long term approach for energy production as we embark on a “Manhattan” type project to change the entire energy structure of this nation. The Sierra Club must take up the burden of educating our politicians and the citizenry of San Antonio. Whether we like it or not, we are the only organization that has the respect and ability to be the conscience of this city. Our city officials are belatedly grateful for our contribution to the water conservation that our citizens have adopted. We need to provide that type of leadership today with the energy crisis.

The Loan Star Chapter Political committee is making the final endorsement decisions on legislative statewide offices as this is being written. Locally this list of recommended candidates will contain some surprises. Many of you will be asking “why did you endorse this guy?” Your endorsee seems to have a dismal voting record. We had to make some tough decisions. We only endorse in contested races. In one race where the opponent is very unlikely to listen to us at all, the committee agreed to endorse an incumbent who supported us on one very important issue and even acted as the major sponsor of the bill even though his overall environmental voting record was not good. We must remember that the Sierra Club is a non-partisan organization that needs office holders that our lobbyist can access. If we can access a politician then we can educate them.

You may ask what else can I do in this election cycle as a Sierra Club member to protect our environment and natural resources. Members can help the candidates the club is endorsing by volunteering for campaign duties such as working on mail outs, block walking or phone banking to get the vote out. in apartments, condos, and private businesses is simply thrown in landfills each year. These landfills are located in areas that the city has to purchase or lease at a great cost to us. Before she hung up, the caller said, “What a shame that such a beautiful city has to be surrounded by landfills.” I wholeheartedly agree! That’s how many of us feel. When we choose to recycle we help our environment both locally and globally. We help keep San Antonio beautiful, we cut energy use, and we stop creating new landfills (and certainly nobody wants to live next to these landfills). Recycling makes environmental and economic sense. It is my hope that within the next year (or few years) we will convince San Antonio officials of the need to pass a city ordinance (as other cities in Texas have done) that requires apartments, condos, and private businesses to recycle. This takes me to our first order of business.

Although I have mentioned the Sierra Club’s apartment/condo recycling petition at our monthly meetings on several occasions, I wanted to alert our many other members who haven’t been to one of our recent gatherings that we need their help to reach the 1,000-signature mark by mid-June. We already have about 500 signatures (yeah!), but we still need to reach out to many others. You can sign the electronic petition by going to <http://alamosierraclubrecycling.blogspot.com/> and clicking on the recycling petition poster. We will continue to collect signatures after July, but once we reach our immediate goal we’ll begin discussing this important issue with our city council. These signatures are critical, as they show that many in our community care about recycling.

The final topic I’d like to address is to announce that the Sierra Club now also has a Recycling Committee. During the past few months I have been working on

recycling issues with the help of other Sierra Club members (like Loretta Van Coppenolle, thanks Loretta!) but there’s so much work to be done in this area that this seems like an opportune time to create this committee. If you’ve often thought that you wanted to be more involved with the Sierra Club, but couldn’t make our monthly meetings do consider joining us in the Recycling Committee. We meet every first Saturday of the month at 11:30 a.m. at Panera’s (located on 999 E. Basse Road). I look forward to seeing you at the next Recycling Committee meeting or at our regular ASC meeting!

What is the true cost for leaving on a 100-watt light bulb?

As for any other electrical appliance, the hourly cost of operation can be calculated by multiplying the input in watts by the cost per kilowatt-hour and dividing by 1000; for example, a 100-watt lamp operated on electricity that costs 10 cents per kilowatt-hour will cost $100 \times 10 / 1000 = 1$ cent per hour to operate.

If left on for an entire month of 720 hours, the cost for just one 100-watt lamp would be \$7.20 per month.

Remember, every thing left on draws power. Fans, phone chargers, sleep mode electronics (TVs & computers) are some of the many electronics that get left plugged in for the entire 720 hours of the month.

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
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
