A Word from the Chair by Jerry Morrisey

The Alamo Group has many accomplishments to be proud of this year. We have worked diligently on communications. We continue to improve and regularly update our website, http://alamosierraclub.org. We have a larger Action Alert list that allows us to quickly inform members of conservation issues where their actions can make a difference. We have reduced our carbon foot print because hundreds of members have converted to an electronic newsletter. Thanks to those who have participated and to those who will join the effort in the coming year.

Our major conservation thrust has been in the area of energy policy. As a result of our Cool Cities Campaign, mayors Phil Hardberger of San Antonio and David Marne of Shavano Park signed the U.S. Mayors Climate Protection Agreement. Two Group members were on the CPS Energy Citizens Advisory Committee that recommended a more aggressive energy efficiency program, later adopted by CPS. About 25 members participated in the Energy Summit sponsored by CPS Energy. We developed Energy Policy recommendations for CPS Energy and the City of San Antonio that were presented by Loretta Van Coppenolle at a press conference on November 13. We will continue to promote energy efficiency and renewable energy sources as alternatives to nuclear power. Recognizing our momentum, the national Sierra Club has hired staffperson Ana Paredes to help us advance this campaign. Thanks to those who have contributed words and actions in support of better energy policy.

Other accomplishments include a series of very informative programs at our general meetings and an increased number of enjoyable outings and social events during the past year. You are invited to attend our largest social event of the year, the festive potluck dinner and auction. Best wishes for a peaceful holiday season.

The Not-So-Great Wall of Texas

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security is forging ahead with plans to build 700 miles of massive barriers along the U.S.-Mexico border, including two main Texas segments - one from Del Rio to Eagle Pass and another from Laredo to Brownsville. The damage to cities, farms, and wildlife habitats along the Rio Grande will be profound if they succeed.

These walls would consist of at least two parallel layers of reinforced fencing. They were authorized by the Republicandominated Congress in 2006 (Secure Fence Act). Existing barriers are built of concrete and steel plates standing 15 feet tall, bordered by 50 feet of barren earth on each side. According to U.S. Customs and Border Protection, they

only delay people attempting to cross by five minutes.

Normally, federal environmental laws would provide some protection to the 20 threatened and endangered species and hundreds of other plant and animal species that inhabit the diverse Rio Grande corridor. Tragically, the Real ID Act passed in 2005 allows the Secretary of Homeland Security to ignore the Endangered Species Act, Migratory Bird Treaty Act, National Environmental Policy Act, Coastal Zone Management Act, Clean Water Act, Clean Air Act, and National Historic Preservation Act, thus fragmenting and isolating riparian woodlands, parks and wildlife refuges, endangering native cats like the ocelot and jaguarundi, cutting off river access, removing historical archeological sites. Surely this is not the way to control illegal immigration or terrorism. Please sign the petition in the fall 2007 Lone Star Sierran, or contact Valley Nature Center, 301 S. Border Ave., Weslaco, TX 78596. The draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the border wall is available at www.BorderFenceNEPA.com or call (877) 752-0420. Please comment on the DEIS.

Alamo Group's Energy Plan: Enlarging the Conversation

The Alamo Group of the Sierra Club has compiled a list of recommendations for CPS and the city of San Antonio to help reduce energy use. Our energy plan can add to progress already made by CPS. It is our hope that it will spur broader and more active participation by the community. CPS should embrace our suggestions as an alternative to building more nuclear plants in South Texas. The Alamo group's major recommendations for CPS are listed below.

1) Set goal stating that 30% of CPS Energy's demand will be met by renewable energy by 2025. 2) Establish an ongoing source of clean energy funding. 3) Establish a citizens' conservation committee, make education/outreach a permanent strategy, maintain and expand successful rebates, establish innovative

funding methods for residential and commercial investments in efficiency. 4) Track effectiveness of CPS internal and external CPS-supported energy conservation projects. 5) Provide additional conservation and comparison information on bills. 6) Implement a timebased tiered rate structure for residential and commercial electricity to reduce peak demand (charge less during off-peak time). 7) Diversify more to include solar, geothermal, combined heat and power, and expanded wind power. 8) Re-establish tree canopy of 35%.
