Word From the Chair by Tom Dukes

Money is power. Ask any politician or lobbyist. Money buys access, media consultants, and advertising. Most of environmental opponents have plenty of money, but the Alamo Group does not.

I was painfully aware of that as I sat stamping envelopes with a leaky rubber stamp. I thought about it some more while cutting 2400 pieces of green paper with my trusty old paper cutter. One of those envelopes and one of those pieces of paper are tucked inside your Alamo Sierran this month, and I hope you'll take a long, thoughtful look at them.

Yes, I know; it's the usual plea for money, and you've probably seen far too many. But this one is different.

The Alamo Group is not only fully volunteer, it is basically selfsufficient. Only 50¢ of your annual Sierra Club dues ever reach San Antonio. Yep, that's right. The Alamo Group gets 50¢ of your dues each year: 4¢ per member per month. The Sierra Club's national and state organizations use your money wisely, so that's not the point. It's just that we need to fund our work, too.

A generous local donor has offered a \$2000 matching grant if at least 200 Sierrans will give \$10 or more. I hope we can count on you. Your gift will strengthen us in our local environmental battles.

The national Sierra Club has endorsed the candidacy of John Courage for U.S. Congressional District 21, which covers much of northern San Antonio and several other counties. Courage is a strong environmental candidate who has pledged to support higher fuel efficiency standards, more electricity from renewable sources, a moratorium on new coal plants, and greater forest protection.

Beating the Heat in Texas

What better way to beat the heat than a float down the Comal River. This is exactly what a group of intrepid Sierrans did on July 29th. The Comal starts at the largest springs in Texas and winds its way through New Braunfels 2 1/2 miles to its junction with the Guadalupe River. Our group cooled off in our tubes for a couple of hours before hitting a local barbeque spot for lunch.

Tree Ordinance Under Attack

San Antonio's tree preservation ordinance remains under siege. Developers continue to lobby for drastic cuts in preservation, and have formally submitted amendments to allow clear-cutting, eliminate 9 native tree species, and slash preservation of the understory.

Since some City Council members have indicated that they support these amendments, the danger is real. Revisions proposed by city staff are currently scheduled for a September vote, and the developer amendments could be tacked on at that time.

San Antonio may become a city with much less tree canopy and native understory unless citizens speak out. More air pollution, more flooding, and a hotter, less beautiful city could be the results of a weakened tree ordinance. Our recommendation is to defend the ordinance vigorously and encourage City Council to patch loopholes and strengthen enforcement.
