March Monthly Meeting Wetlands of the Penokee Hills Wednesday, March 4, 7:30 PM Unitarian Universalist Church 421 S Farwell St, Eau Claire

Presenter: **Tracy Hames**, Executive Director, Wisconsin Wetlands Association

This science-based presentation will introduce you to the beautiful, diverse and abundant wetland resources of the upper Bad River Watershed. You will learn about the types of wetlands present in the upper watershed, their current ecological condition, and the important role these wetlands play in helping maintain watershed health all the way downstream to the Kakagon/ Bad River Sloughs estuary along Lake Superior. Information will also be given on what is known about a proposal to develop a large taconite mine in this area, and the potential impacts of such a project. A discussion period will follow the presentation.

Wisconsin Wetlands Association is a non-partisan, science-based, statewide non-profit organization dedicated to the protection, restoration, and enjoyment of Wisconsin's wetlands. Tracy Hames and staff have spent much time assessing the wetlands of the proposed mine project area in the Bad River Watershed of the Penokee Hills. Tracy obtained a BA from Macalester College and an MS in Natural Resources from UW-Stevens Point. Before returning to Wisconsin in 2011, Tracy worked for over 20 years protecting, restoring and managing large wetland projects on the Yakama Indian Reservation in Washington state.

Stoughton's mission statement reads "The City of Stoughton and Stoughton Utilities have elected to lead by example in pursuing green power consumption, promoting water and energy conservation, reducing our local carbon footprint and encouraging environmental stewardship." Their electricity providers are WPPI Energy, and on-site generation. Many of the green businesses use RECs, renewable energy credits, that are invested in non-fossil renewable energy companies because local or on-site green energy may not be available to them. I buy Evergreen renewable energy credits from my power supplier Dunn Energy Cooperative and they buy some electricity from a wind farm in MN. All the electrons in generated electricity from nonrenewable and renewable get mixed together in the

"THIS CHANGES EVERYTHING" by Naomi Klein

Book Review by Eleanor Wolf

I and many of my friends, are fond of saying "I'm glad I'm old and won't live long enough to experience the catastrophic consequences of Climate Change." Therefore we avoid reading books about this depressing subject, because after all, there is no hope. However, I'm urging you to read this one book that captures the remarkable combination of idealism and determination that we need to adopt. Klein's book demands a radical rethink of our understanding of how to make a new political system and how to make progress and win battles in an all-out effort to save the planet and humanity. She beautifully wraps it all up with these words: "We are products of our age and of a dominant ideological system; one that too often has taught us to see ourselves as little more than singular gratification-seeking units, out to maximize our narrow advantage, while simultaneously severing so many of us from the broader community whose pooled skills are capable of solving problems big and small. We're facing a battle of worldviews requiring a rebuilding and re-inventing the commons, the civil and the civic after so many decades of attack and neglect. We must delegitimize the current worldview. Changing the system requires rapid-fire lawmaking. The right calls it "shock therapy". The left calls it "populism". We lack the collective spaces in which to confront the raw terror of ecocide, the end of the world as we know it. The task is to articulate an alternative future... imbedded in interdependence rather than hyper-individualism, to cope with lowering emissions and the disasters we can't avoid. We have a choice: civilization or barbarism. Our goal is to change deeply entrenched values....akin to ending slavery. Use moral arguments instead of economic arguments. Say there is no acceptable price for allowing entire countries to disappear, for leaving millions to die on parched land." Enbridge Pipeline Plans

With all eyes on Keystone, another tar sands pipeline just crossed the border, threatening Wisconsin. Enbridge's Alberta Clipper pipeline, also known as Line 67, can now pump up to 570,000 barrels thick sticky tar sands crude from Canada across the border into the U.S. without a permit. By the middle of 2015, Enbridge plans to transport 800,000 barrels of crude per day through Line 67. By comparison, the much-contested Keystone XL pipeline is projected to move 830,000 barrels per day. The Alberta Clipper expansion requires a Presidential Permit, issued by the State Department. However, a State Department staff member, Patrick Dunn stated, in a letter to Enbridge, that their new interconnections and pump upgrades did not legally require federal authorization. Environmental and Native American groups claim Enbridge's move is illegal and are suing the State Department for violating the National Environmental Policy Act and its own regulations by approving the expansion project with neither a permit nor an environmental assessment. Doug Hayes, a staff attorney for the Sierra Club says, "What Enbridge is doing is building an entirely new pipeline in the same right-of-way and calling it 'maintenance.. Frankly, I don't think this has ever happened before, where the State Department is deep into doing its full analysis while simultaneously allowing the project to go forward before they're done with their review process. "Why should we be concerned? Enbridge has a disgraceful history of spills. From 1999 to 2010, Enbridge was responsible for more than 800 spills that released 6.8 million gallons of hydrocarbons, including the worst onshore oil spill in U.S. History, the 2010 Kalamazoo River disaster. Areas threatened by the pipeline expansion include forest, farms, lakes and streams in North Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin. It also puts Lake Superior and the Mississippi River at risk for a devastating spill. Take action: Go to http:// sierraclub.org. Click on Beyond Oil, then click on Alberta Clipper. STEWARDSHIP FUND IMPERILED

I'm writing today with an urgent message from Gathering Waters to all Wisconsin TPE (The Prairie Enthusiasts) members. As you may have seen in the news, Governor Walker has proposed a moratorium on Wisconsin's Knowles Nelson Stewardship Program. For years, almost all of TPE's acquisitions in Wisconsin have been funded in part by the Stewardship Program. Some recent examples of Stewardship funded projects include:


- Hauser Road: Just last year TPE purchased this 25 acre remnant, a part of the Empire Prairies that stretch across northern Dane County, WI. This property conserves critically important grassland bird habitat for grasshopper sparrows, field sparrows, eastern meadowlarks, and bobolinks.
- . <u>Borah Creek</u>: This expanding complex of remnants near Fennimore, WI in Grant County has been funded twice by Stewardship grants. In addition to state funding, this site includes a significant population of the federally threatened Prairie Bushclover, which has enabled the Stewardship funds to be leveraged by US Fish & Wildlife Service funding for threatened and endangered species.
- Mounds View Grassland: The largest complex of property TPE owns and manages, at nearly 600 acres, has been the result of several Stewardship grants over multiple years. This has enabled TPE to create a landscape level restoration project which continues to preserve remnant prairies, create highly diverse prairie plantings, and supports habitat for a wide variety of plant, insect, bird, and mammals endemic to Wisconsin and exemplary of our prairie heritage.

As someone who cares about protecting the places that make Wisconsin special, we need your help. Please contact your state legislators and the governor's office today to express your concern and share why the Stewardship Program is important for your community. You can use these message templates for Legislators to help in creating a letter to send to your elected officials. Please visit Gathering Waters website gatheringwaters.org for more details about the Stewardship Program and additional information about how you can help. Together we can let our legislatures know how important the Stewardship Program is to all of us and the things we care about-like ensuring the perpetuation of prairies, oak savannas, and associated ecosystems here in Wisconsin.
