## PADDLING TO WINTER: A COUPLE'S WILDERNESS JOURNEY FROM LAKE SUPERIOR TO THE CANADIAN NORTH

#### PLEASE NOTE CHANGE OF VENUE FOR THIS MEETING

The Ojibwe Ballroom is on the 3rd floor, west end of Davies Center at UW-Eau Claire, and there is an elevator!. Parking is open to the public after 6:00 PM.

In May 1999, newlyweds **Julie Buckles and Charly Ray** of Washburn launched their handcrafted red canoe from Bayview beach into the cold blue Lake Superior water beginning a 1,700-mile journey north toward the Arctic Ocean. It was an adventure that tested them physically, mentally and emotionally as they paddled through wicked weather, biting bugs, difficult portages and challenging rapids to Wollaston Lake, Saskatchewan, Canada, where they spent a winter on an isolated island cabin. Buckles chronicled their remarkable story her first book, "*Padding to Winter: A Couple's Wilderness Journey from Lake Superior to the Canadian North*", published by Raven Productions Inc., of Ely, Minn. in September 2013. Buckles will be sharing stories and presenting slides from her journey. Books will be available for sale and Buckles will be available for signing afterwards. Attendees are also invited to dinner and conversation at <u>Stella Blues</u> (306 E Madison St, Eau Claire) at 5:30 pm before the meeting.

Julie Buckles was born in the driftless region of Wisconsin near Viroqua and raised on a dairy farm. She now lives near Washburn with her Charly, two children and a team of Siberian huskies. She studied history at the UW-Madison and earned her MFA in Creative Writing from Antioch University Los Angeles. Buckles has worked as a reporter, freelance writer and as adjunct professor at Northland College, where she currently is the public and media relations specialist. Her book "*Paddling to Winter...*" was recently awarded the Next Generation Indie Award, the Independent Publishers Award, the Foreword Book of the Year in Adventure and the Eric Hoffer da Vinci Eye Award for cover design.



#### **Conservation Notes**

The spring migration of Lesser <u>Sandhill</u> <u>Cranes</u> past the Platte River near Kearney, Nebraska is over for this year but anyone who hasn't witnessed this event should make a point of going there. It's a pretty amazing show. Look up the Rowe Audubon Sanctuary for getting informed.

Speaking of birds, I don't know which event is more memorable to me, the thousands of cranes coming to roost in the Platte River at dusk or the Red Breasted Nuthatch that joined me sailing past Madeline Island a few years ago. Fearless little guy, I think he ate every spider on board, by August there tend to be some. Hopped right over my arm several times, the bird that is. Went completely through the rigging like a comb until we got close to Long Island when he decided he was full and rested enough to move on.



Julie Buckles will be visiting our group at the May meeting. She'll be talking about a trip she and her husband Charly took in a canoe they built for the purpose of paddling from the Bayfield Peninsula on Lake Superior through the Canadian arctic. If you haven't read the chronicle of that part of her life titled Paddling to Winter you should. Day to day accounts of miles made good with the right blend of anecdotal background draws the reader firmly into her narrative.



I attended the <u>Conservation Congress</u> meeting In Menomonie and introduced two resolutions for a vote. I was only permitted two of the four proposed by Sierra. Both were well received.

## Conservation Congress Results Show Citizens Want Mining Safeguards and Review of Tar Sand Pipelines (forwarded by Steve Scoll)

Madison: Final results from the annual statewide Conservation Congress Spring Hearing held on April 13 demonstrate significant statewide support in favor of mining safeguards and environmental review of Enbridge's proposed tar sands pipelines. Overwhelming majorities supported resolutions for: repeal of 2013 Act 1 – the law written by Gogebic Taconite for its now-abandoned iron mine proposal; a statewide moratorium on new frac sand mining permits until the state acts to strengthen state laws; to require an Environmental Impact Review of Enbridge's tar sand pipelines proposal; and to support the Mining Moratorium Law in effect for metallic mining. Each of these resolutions was approved by 3-to-1 margins or more across the state. The DNR tabulation of results can be using the link "2015 Citizen Resolution Results" at:

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#### **Earthgreen Award 2015**

STEVE BETCHKAL APRIL 14, 2015 Tonight is the occasion for the Chippewa Valley Sierra Club Group to present its annual EarthGreen Award. Karen Voss came up with the idea for this award in 1986. She and other group members worked on the concept of giving annual recognition to individuals, organizations, or businesses for their efforts to protect, preserve, or promote the environment in the Chippewa Valley region. As a videojournalist for over 27 years, Steve Betchkal has produced more than 10,000 stories on news and life in the Chippewa Valley. He is presently the senior videojournalist at WQOW in Eau Claire. Steve has won numerous awards

for his work, including the first-ever Emmy Awards won in Eau Claire. Steve is particularly proud to have covered birds on TV since 1987. His bird stories, now totaling 100, started at WEAU when Steve was a contributor to Dave Carlson's show. In 1990, Steve produced a 3-part series titled "Flight to Nowhere" about the plight of neotropical migrant birds. It was the first story of its kind on television in Wisconsin. Bird and environmental stories continue to be woven into his current work for the news department at WQOW. Steve has written bird and wildlife travel articles for the Leader-Telegram - 144 articles in all. He has written for several magazines as well. He is a published poet and author of several books. Steve took hold of an idea from Jane

Schley to establish an on-line source to connect birders in the Chippewa Valley. With the help of Paul Wagner, Steve has established an e-mail based forum for birdwatchers in the Chippewa Valley. There are now more than 100 members with amateur birdwatchers of all levels of experience alongside UWEC ornithology professors and DNR wildlife biologists. The Chippewa Valley Birding Group is a convivial and informative source for current bird sightings and information on bird-related topics. The creation of this group, I believe, has been the catalyst to connect and fully invigorate our local birding community. The Gaylord Nelson Audubon Society is holding its Second Annual Eau Claire Welcome Back Bird Day on Wednesday, May 20. Come witness the return of songbirds to Wisconsin from their wintering grounds in the tropics. Join expert birders from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at five sites across the City of Eau Claire to view migrant birds and learn about their incredible northward journey. \*Footnote - The Chippewa Valley Group has run an outing to the Governor Knowles State Forest most years going back to 1984, not long after the campground first opened and not long after our group first started. This is the standard writeup used for three decades. It still works with one exception. On July 1, 2011, hurricane-force winds struck east-central Minnesota and northwest Wisconsin, causing severe damage over an extensive area. There is no longer a "quiet oak woods" on the bluff above the St. Croix River. Virtually every tree in the campsite and the immediate vicinity was blown down or severely damaged. The DNR has finally completed cleanup work and the campground is being reopened this spring. Our group will be the first to use it. It is difficult to envision how different it will be. There will be no more scarlet tanagers or nightsinging ruby-crowned kinglets among the oak trees leafing out in spring green. However, there will be the same quiet and peacefulness, removed from the crowds of a holiday weekend. The night sky will be more visible and expansive. We'll have a good campfire. And, we might still hear the howl of a distant wolf.
