Cohousing speaks to people who want to own a home but not feel lost in an impersonal city. That's the starting point for Dallas Cohousing. We're growing a community of like-minded folks who'd like to live cooperatively and sustainably in urban Dallas, close to a DART station. Our goal: to retrofit an existing office building or warehouse into condos, with common space for gardening, cooking & shared meals, work space, child care--whatever we all choose together.

Future viable works of landscape architecture are enhancing the beauty, meaning, and performative aspects of landscapes from an ecological perspective. Professor Hopman also is the manager of the first extensive green roof constructed in North Texas.

# **Recent Recycling News - June 2011**

### **Electronic Recycling**

With technology in the hands of more people than ever, electronic recycling is getting more attention than ever. For 19 years, HOBI International in Dallas has been recycling electronics while implementing the three R's: Reduce, re-use and recycle.

Craig Boswell, president of HOBI International, said recycling electronics is similar to what people do when they recycle plastics and paper in their home. But first, they'll see if the product can continue to be used.

"We are going to take the product and we are going to try to reuse it or get materials out of them and put them back into the recycling stream," said Boswell.

Many companies either sell their old electronics to HOBI International or pay them to safely recycle their old computer equipment, cell phones and TVs. Each year the company recycles up to 15 million pounds of IT equipment, 4 million cell phones and millions of other electronic devices.

# It's Time to DOO the Right Thing

The weather is warm, the flowers are in bloom, and the grass is green in North Texas. For many pet owners, this means extended walks with their dog. While enjoying this time with your pet, it is extremely important that you clean up after them whether it's at home or on a walk. Pet waste can cause many problems. Not only is it unsightly, it can harm the environment, pollute water, and cause disease.

Pet waste that is left on the ground can be carried away by storm water runoff and deposited into nearby creeks and lakes. The water we recreate in and use as a drinking source becomes contaminated with the bacteria and any waterborne diseases the feces may harbor. These can cause illness and even death in humans and in other animals. With approximately 1.2 million dogs in the North Central Texas area, waste can quickly become a water quality and health concern.

Leaving pet waste on the ground can also affect your dog. For example, Parvovirus is a serious, highly contagious disease that affects puppies and young dogs who are not vaccinated. Adult dogs can be carriers and not show signs of being infected. It can be transmitted through infected dog waste directly or indirectly through soiled shoes, car tires, and anything else it touches. The virus can remain infectious on the ground for six months or even longer! For these reasons, it is

essential to not leave pet waste on the ground. Keep people and pets safe and healthy by picking up after your dog. Here are some simple tips:

- When walking your dog, always carry a plastic baggie to scoop up droppings
- Dispose of baggies in the trash
- Clean up droppings around your yard at least once a week, and either flush them down the toilet, or dispose of in a trash can

Pledge to DOO the Right Thing and pick up after your dog. NCTCOG and the Stormwater Public Education Task Force offer an online pledge for owners who will commit to cleaning up after their dogs. Those who take the pledge during the months of May, June, July, and August will have an opportunity to show off their dog in the online 2011 Top Dog Photo Gallery. The top 12 dogs will be featured in a 2012 one-page calendar and will be mailed a pet waste bag dispenser to attach to your dog's leash.
